file an application for a patent with the U.S. Patent Office.
Under the patent laws of the United States, an application for patent must be filed, if at all, earlier than one year after date of first public sale or use or published disclosure of the invention.
If this deadline is met, then the person who first conceives a new and novel patentable idea is entitled to it, provided he thereafter pursues a course of reasonable diligence in reducing his invention to practice or filing a patent application thereon. Therefore, if conflicting claims arrive as to who is entitled to a patent, it is necessary to establish who first had the idea, and not just who filed the first application for patent.
Since an inventor is automatically given credit for a date at least as early as his application, without having to introduce any proof, an early application date is advantageous though not conclusive. But if an inventor protects himself while he is making tests and perfecting his invention, he can get credit for a date earlier than his date of application.
To do this, he should, as soon as he conceives the idea, make a written record of the facts, including a general statement of the nature of his invention, a recitation of the structural elements or steps of the process of his invention, and a rough drawing if possible. Preferably the written record is photocopied. The photocopy of the record should be dated and signed by two witnesses who have read and understood it and who can be called upon later to certify that they read and understood the photocopy of the record of the dates besides their names.
While some inventors mail written disclosures of their inventions to themselves, such procedure is not necessary if the foregoing preferred procedure is followed.
By taking the above precautions, an inventor establishes a

preliminary date showing the time when his original idea was conceived. After that he can continue with his work, perfect his idea, and after it is perfected, make application for a patent, if he feels that he has a patentable idea. But the inventor must also keep records of his continued work, and the continued work should be disclosed periodically to a witness who is not a co-inventor.
While an inventor should seek a patent as soon as possible after he conceives his idea and works out structure or process steps for the practice of the idea, if he keeps complete records of his work and has his work witnessed periodically by someone who can later be called upon to corroborate the inventor's story, then the inventor may protect himself clear back to the date of his original conception.

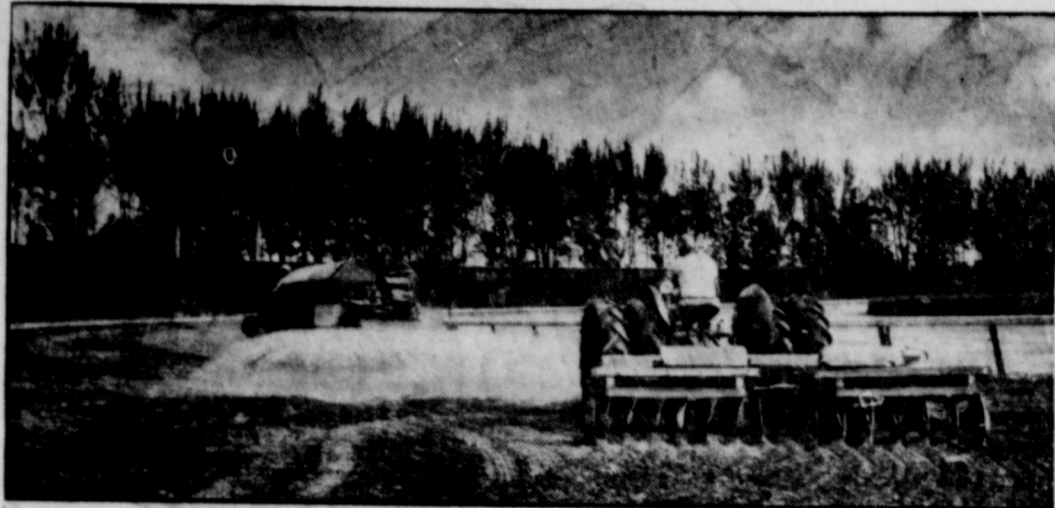

WOMEN AND WHEELS

Winter Shopping List Good for Your Car

Last week we told the sad tale of Betty. Her car battery let her down on a freezing winter morning because she had neglected to have it checked over for cold weather driving.

By this time of year, your entire car should be checked with care to see if it can stand the burden of winter driving. Most service stations and car dealers advertise special "winterizing" jobs at a flat rate. If you can spare your car for a half day, your station can do the whole job at one time.

This week, we'd like to list the important parts of your car that should be checked before winter comes. This is because the automobile has a much greater burden placed on it in the cold months, and it has different needs at this time.

CHECK LIST

For example, you will need lighter oil in your engine. Heavy summer-weight oil, when cold, is difficult to move, and becomes a drag on the starter. So have your gas station change the oil to the weight that is good for your particular driving habits (whether you drive a lot or a little), for your particular car (is it new, old or middle-aged?) and for the kind of winter weather you can expect in your part of the country. All of these things determine what weight of oil you'll need.

Your battery is very important, and as we mentioned last week, should be carefully checked for the added strain of winter use.

The spark plugs should be inspected too, and as these sometimes wear out, some might have to be replaced to ensure a car that really starts on winter days. Your garage might do well to check the wiring system to

see that the wires are neither frayed, cracked nor oil-soaked. Where winters are damp you can have these wires sprayed with special moisture-repellents.

KEEP WARM AND SAFE

And, of course, anti-freeze must be put in your car's radiator to prevent freezing. There are two kinds. Most authorities agree that the "permanent" type is best for really cold weather driving. You just need one large dose, and it lasts all winter long. For milder climates, a less expensive alcohol-type anti-freeze should see you through. Again, consult your service station for your particular needs.

Your heater and defroster will be important to your comfort. Be sure these are both in good working order. And take a look under the instrument panel yourself to see that all fresh air vents are tightly shut.

The brakes and the clutch should be in good working order, and these can be checked at the same time.

CAR COSMETICS

And if you are proud of your car's appearance, a very good investment just before winter comes is a wax finish to protect the paint and chrome surfaces, and keep your car looking shiny and new.

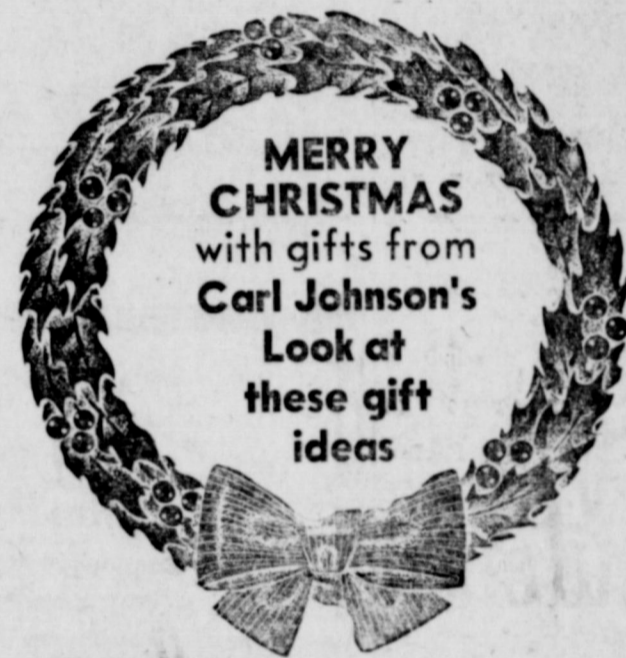

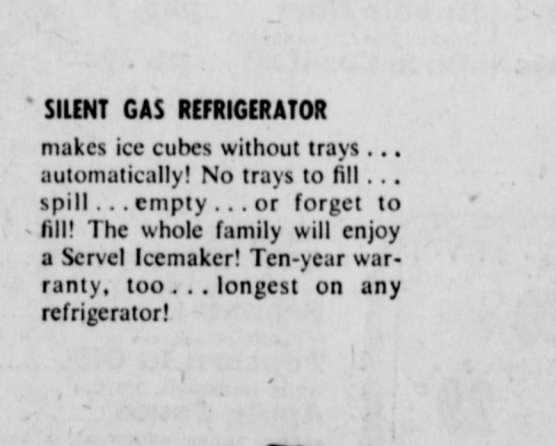

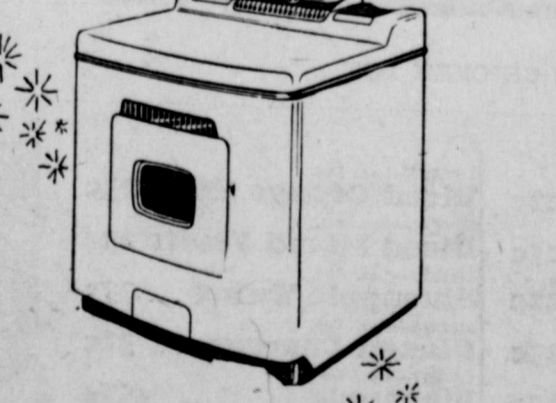
