# FOR LIBERTY WHEN JURY SAYS DEATH

Slayer of Wallace Sent to Lethal Chair By Jury. Trial Replete With Tragedy Winds Up In Dramatic Finish. First Death Verdict Here.

The crowd, which for three days had jammed exery available inch of room in the court room, listened with tense expectancy to the voice of the clerk as he read the verdict returned yesterday by the Bergdorf jury:

"We, the jury, find the defendant guilty as charged, and assess his punishment as DEATH." An awesome hush fell over the throng, a death like still-ness fell over the packed chamber, broken after a few

moments by the voice of Judge Fritz R. Smith as he asked the jury, "And so say you all, gentlemen?"

A barely audible mumble of affirmatives came from the lips of the twelve men, who had decreed that A. A. Bergdorf

must, for his crime in wilfully taking the life of Charlie Wallace, forfeit his life to the State.

A dramatic scene ensued. The wife of the accused man ushed forward to the rail, sobbing wildly, threw her arms around the neck of the doomed man and hung there weeping. For a moment Bergdorf responded to her embraces, then eemed to take a sudden resolution and throwing off the embrace of his wife, turned towards the door of the court



Passage of a bill introduced in the Texas Legislature by Represen-tative Parrish of Lubbock and de-signed against geological trespass would put a serious curb on oil development in West Texas and the State as a whole, according to Fort Worth geologists, who have seen the measure.



#### ON THE DOPE TRAIL

Representative La Guardia of New York cants congress to investigate the traffic in hercotics. There has been an alarming in-rease, he says, in the unlawful sale and use of such drugs. He thinks they are being smuggled into the country at the rate of more than \$1,000,000 worth a week. They are distributed by underground routes, but do not all go to the underworld.

Here is an evil comparable to the contraband liquor evil, though less extensive. It s far worse in its effect on the user than bootleg booze, bad as that usually is.

Victims of "dope" are most numerous in big cities, but they are found almost everywhere. Many of them are innocent victims, acquiring the habit unknowingly, or lured into it by drug peddlers. One dope victim is likely to make others. The traffic is harder to detect and stop than the liquor traffic. But every possible effort should be made.— Cisco News.

#### A QUEER ATTITUDE

A number of people in this land are unable to distinguish between a legal technicality and a clear ethical standard.

Bert Buckley, state treasurer of Ohio, was convicted in the federal court the other day of conspiracy to violate the prohibition law. Following his conviction he announced that he would not resign. To be sure, he had been convicted; but he pointed out that he had appealed, and said that the matter of his guilt would not be settled until the appeal has been passed on.

The governor, fortunately, ended the mess by ordering him to resign. But his attitude is interesting. Because of a legal techni-cality, the man actually thought that there was no moral obligation on him to give up There is a good deal of fuzzy thinking

One of the biggest problems of Herbert Hoover's administration probably will be one which is entirely overlooked by most presentday political reporters. It is the problem that wil larise in connection with the expiration of the 10-year treaty for limitation of naval armaments, signed at Washington in

It was under this treaty that the United States, England and Japan scrapped millions of dollars worth of warships and agreed to build no more batleships. In this treaty England for the first time admitted another nation to naval parity. Through the treaty, Japan and the United States were brought into more corrial relations than ever before.

In 1931 this treaty expires, and another conference of the nations involved must be called to renew it or find a new one to/replace it. That conference may well be one of the most important events of Mr. Hoover's regime-if not the most important.

Probably most of us do not realize how far-reaching and beneficient in its effects the original Washington conference was. It choked off a naval race of extremely serious proportions; Japan, England and the United States were vying to see which couldd assemble the greatest fleet of battleships and battle cruisers, and such a race inevitably would have had serious consequences sooner or later.

In addition, European diplomats hold that the conference averted a war between the United States and Japan. The United States was then on the verge of building great for-tifications at Manila, but in the treaty agreed not to do so. Well-informed observers say that Japan would have declared war the moment such fortifications were begun.

Despite the recent flurry about cruisers, the years since the Washington conference have been years of good feeling. It is highly important that this peaceful era be continued after 1931. Now is not too early to begin thinking about it. The people of this country must insist that the fruits of the first conference be preserved at the second.

#### THE MODERN MERCURY

Lindbergh is a doer. His flight through Central and South America last year was more than casual good-will. It was trailblazing. Wherever he flew, he saw opportunities for air lines and made others see them. He came back prophesying an early linking of the United States with its Latin Neighbors by means of airplanes. And already his prophecy is being realized—large-ly because he goes ahead himself with the realizing. His pioneer mail flight from Miami to the Panama Canal Zone via Havana and the intervening Central American states is the first link in the new chain. The enthusiasm it has aroused all along the route assures its continuance. Nations farther south are now clamoring for an extension of the service. Surely it will not be long until this chain of air communication circles the whole continent of South America. Eventually the planes will carry passengers as well as mail. That should make the good will continuous and enduring. The postman is always welcome; and when he comes by air like Mercury, messenger of the gods, he has an added glamor.-Cisco News.

#### THE FARMER WANTS HELPING NEXT

paint-up program as well.

It is asserted that the farmer wants a tariff on jute. He will probably get it. Everybody is after tariff protection now. The Democratic party is in poor position to resist it with regard to jute. The Republicans are in no position at all to refuse. So there will be a tariff on jute.

The tariff will be effective, of course. It will be prohibitive. And as the jute crop of this country is nil, jute can be slaughtered domestically without any jute raisers storming the executioner's quarters.

Of course the amount of jute consumed by the city man isn't very great. The whitecollar boys don't need much jute. The man who buys jute is the farmer. The cotton farmer will profit some. He will profit out of the pockets of the wheat and oats farmer, and to some extent out of those of the corn farmer. Potatoes and a few other crops will pay tribute to the cotton farmer also. And when the cotton farmer goes to the gin he will pay extra for the privilege of wrapping his bale in cotton bagging instead of jute bagging.

The assumption is that when the farmer sells his bale he gets pay for the bagging and ties. But he doesn't. For the man who is buying lint, bagging and ties are but nec-essary evils. The price of the lint is de-pressed enough to take cars of any excess cost in the wrappings in which the bale comes. Any business man understands that. The farmers understand it, too.

On his bagging made of cotton, then, the farmer breaks a little less than even, because somebody has to make profit on the bagging, and the more invested in bagging the bigger the profit, of course. But if he raises only cotton and handles, no grains or sacked vegetable products, he comes out ahead on a tariff against jute. As a sop to the one-cropper in the South, therefore, jute exclusion has qualifications. But as farm relief for the rest of the country it is going to arouse question. It robs Nebraska and Kansas Peters to pay Texas and Arkansas Pauls. In its theory of ethics, therefore, it is a typical protective tariff. The only un-usual thing about it is, Paul lives down this way.-Dallas News.

#### TIME TO STUDY THE TARIFF

It is rapidly becoming evident that the next session of Congress will see one of the most thorough-going revisions of the United States tariff schedules that has been attempted in many years.

From all parts of the United States manufacturers are demanding higher duties. The comparatively recent Fordney-McCumber tariff act was considered fairly high, but now, judging from the clamor that is pouring in upon Congress, it is considered far too low. Rates that will absolutely prohibit all imports are being demanded by some indus-

All of this is discussed at considerable length in a striking article by Theodore M Knappen in the February issue of the Magazine of Wall Street.

"We are off," he says, "to a new regime of higher tariffs on high tariffs and new tariffs where there were none. It's only a question of making a rate high enough, without much, if any, thought as to whether it may be too high. By July 1 the United States' traiffs will no longer be high, but regular 1929 skyscrapers.

Agriculturists, manufacturers and big industrialists, he says, are calling for protection against the greater European "carteis" or international trusts, on the ground that they cannot successfully compete with them. Yet, he points out, there are certain dissent-

The lumber industry-fourth or fifth rank in the country—wants no high tariff on lumber, since many American lumbermen own forests and mills in Canada, and a lumber tariff would hit them where they live. The paper industry is in a similar boat. The automobile industry also is out of it; indeed, automobile men are frankly alarmed about the prospects for a general upward revision of the tariff, fearing that their overseas sales will suffer if overseas nations are unable to sell goods to us.
All in all, it looks very much as though the

tariff, for years one of our leading political issues, would shortly regain its old standing as a topic for argument. Thoughtful Americans will be obliged to give the mater a great deal of study. Our national prosperity may depend on using the tariff wisely.

We have been crying for a brick factory and it now appears that it is within our power to secure one without any great sacrifice at that. And the main point is, that material heretofore considered worthless can be used to make "A-No. 1" brick.

The real test of whether Big Spring is going to continue to be a good little town or become the big city of West Texas will be decided during 1929. Are you ready to do your part to make Big Spring the big city?




