One interesting fact is that there are no snakes in New Zealand. There are several interesting birds, one being the kea, a small bird that is quite tame and very inquisitive. He is credited with having a keen sense of humor and gets into all sorts of mischief. Cyrus Frost Re-elected Mayor by Commission

City commissioners last night re-elected Cyrus Frost to serve as mayor, giving the Eastland attorney his third term as the city's top post.
Frost pledged a continuation to work for "good government" and he also said the commission would continue "living within our means."
Tom Wilson was elected vice-chairman of the commission, Jack Germany treasurer and Robert Perkins vice-treasurer. Milton Fullen, newly elected commissioner, met with the group for the first time and took his oath of office, as did Perkins and Germany, who were re-elected. Fullen, Chevrolet agency dealer here, takes the place of Virgil Seaberry, who did not seek re-election.
Commissioners had a very brief meeting with only the financial report on the official agenda. At the suggestion of Mayor Frost commissioners agreed to push a paving program here. They urged any group of citizens interested in getting their street or block paved to contact City Manager Jimmy Young. Young was asked to work out a rate schedule and publicize it in the Telegram.
The financial report showed the City has collected \$54,000 of the \$66,000 in taxes for the past year. The remainder of the tax roll is now delinquent.
Young told commissioners three personal tax suits, which the City lost in justice court, have been appealed to District Court.

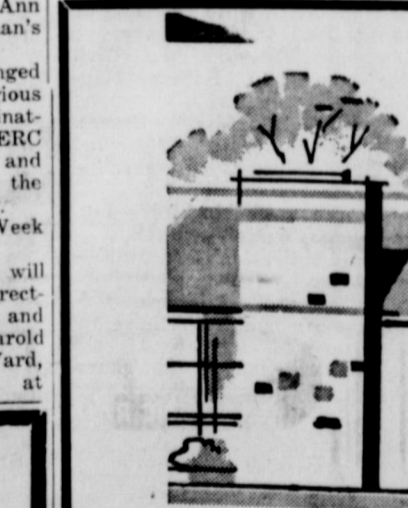

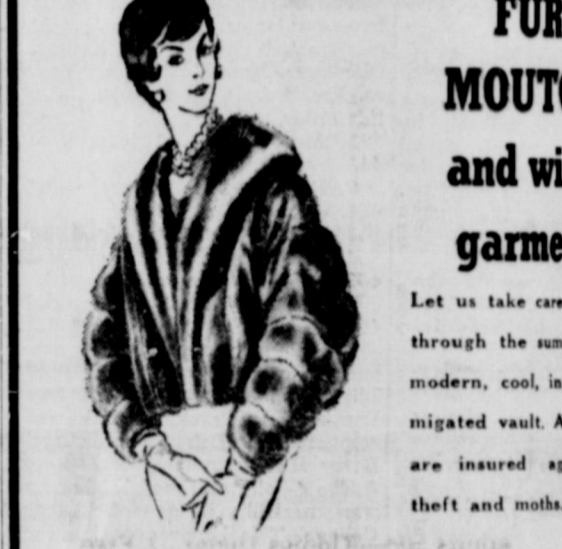

TRACTOR TALK

Carburetor Float Setting Can Affect Spark Plug Performance
When working on tractor carburetors, don't overlook the float setting as a possible source of poor overall engine performance. According to Champion Spark Plug Company's Technical Services Department, an improperly set float may cause trouble in either the high or low speed adjustment, and can actually contribute to both spark plug overheating or fouling, depending on whether the float setting is too high or low.

Champion advises that spark overheating frequently occurs when the float is set too low, since the engine may be starved for fuel. Also, the engine may fail to respond when accelerated and difficulty may be encountered in maintaining satisfactory carburetor adjustment.

Both spark plug fouling and excessive crankcase oil dilution may occur if the float level is too high, since here too much fuel will enter the combustion chamber. This condition also may cause the carburetor to leak.

Causes of a high float level are:
1. Wrong float setting

2. Leaky float
3. Dented float
4. Fuel inlet needle not seating properly
5. Needle seat improperly installed
6. Excessive fuel pump pressure

Hot Starting Tip
Hard starting of hot engines generally is caused by excessive fuel vapors present in the intake manifold, a result of percolating, spill-over from the carburetor fuel bowl and other conditions. This means a deficiency of oxygen in the intake manifold.

If encountering this trouble on your tractor or truck, open the throttle wide to bring in oxygen and "flush" the manifold—but be sure not to pump the throttle. This merely dumps more fuel into the manifold and worsens the condition.

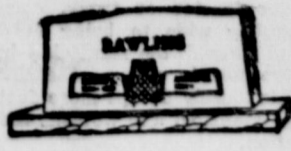

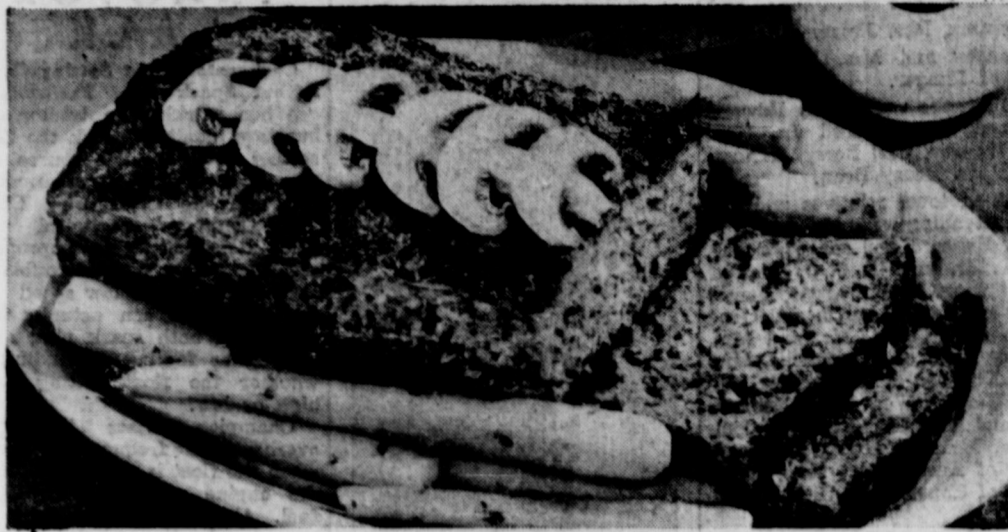

| 2 eggs, beaten | 1 1/2 cups finely diced fresh tomatoes |
| 1 3/4 teaspoons salt | 2 medium fresh mushrooms, sliced |
| 3/4 teaspoon ground black pepper | 2 teaspoons butter or margarine |
| 1/4 cup chopped ground black pepper | |
| 1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley | |

Thoroughly mix all ingredients, except mushrooms and butter or margarine. Pack firmly into paper-lined, greased 9 by 9 by 3 inch loaf pan. Bake 1 hour 15 minutes in preheated moderate oven (350 degrees F.). Turn out onto warm serving platter.

Saute mushrooms lightly in butter or margarine. Arrange on top of loaf. Garnish with fresh carrots and parsley, with melted butter over them.

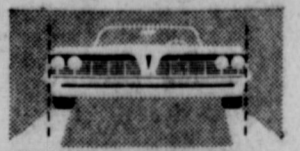

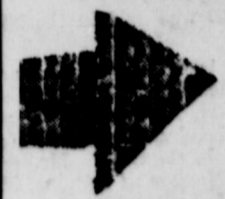
