Water Board Elects Officers

The Eastland County Water Supply District Board of Directors met Tuesday night to canvass the results of the recent election of directors and to elect new officers for the current year.

Four directors were voted into office in the district elections held Tuesday, April 5. From Eastland T. M. Fullen and Charles Freyschlag were re-elected to the Board of Directors, and in Ranger C. B. Pruet and E. H. Mills were re-elected.

Following the canvassing of the election results and other routine business the board elected Wilson Guest of Ranger as president of the Board of Directors, and Charles

Freyschlag of Eastland as vice president.

D. D. Pickrell of Ranger was re-appointed secretary of the Board, and Lester Crossley of Ranger was re-appointed Treasurer.

Guest has been a member of the Board of Directors for several terms, having served the Board as treasurer and as immediate past vice president.

Freyschlag was re-elected to his second term on the Board at the recent election.

T. M. Fullen of Eastland is the outgoing president. The new officers will serve until the second Tuesday in 1961.

Eight Volume Set Is Given To Library

The Dept. of Public Welfare and the Eastland Library will receive the eight-volume set comprising the official publications of the 1960 White House Conference in Children and Youth. In all 8,000 books are being given to Texas libraries by Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Meadows of Dallas through a Meadows Foundation grant of \$12,000.

The gift was arranged by Fred M. Lange, executive vice-president of the Dallas Community Chest Trust Fund and volunteer consultant to the national finance committee of the White House conference. Lange said four volumes have been completed by the Columbia University Press. Four others including a digest of Texas research are to be printed between now and July.

A special committee of Governor Price Daniel's White House Conference Committee has designated the libraries as follows: 272 public libraries; 115 college and university libraries; 34 philanthropic or hospital libraries; 300 social agencies, production departments and child care institutions; and 197 public and parochial high schools. Remaining sets will be distributed as new libraries are founded in coming years.

The books, representing the combined findings and thinking of the nation's outstanding leaders in the field of child care, will be a source of authoritative information on the nation's children for years to come. An estimated half million citizens interested in the welfare of children have joined the nation's foremost educators and child care authorities in the gathering of information which will be condensed and incorporated in the books.

The White House Conference, just completed in Washington, D. C., was attended by 7,000 delegates from every state in the union. The conference is called every ten years by the President of the United States to consider issues concerning children and youth.

Governor Price Daniel acknowledged Mr. and Mrs. Meadows' gift to Texas libraries. He said, "In a democracy such as ours the people must have sufficient facts upon which to base wise decisions concerning the future of our children and youth. By contributing this vital set of books to a thousand libraries in our state Mr. and Mrs. Meadows, through the Meadows Foundation, are rendering a great public service in this regard."

Dr. Guy Newman, president of Howard Payne College and chairman of the Texas White House Conference Committee, also expressed appreciation to Mr. and Mrs. Meadows for their interest in the future of the children of Texas.

"Making these books available to teachers, juvenile authorities, other child welfare leaders and the public at large will be invaluable in planning future state programs involving children and youth," Dr. Newman said.

Three Eastland men will be among the 400-500 delegates attending the 42nd annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in San Angelo Monday.

The convention begins at 10:30 a.m. in the Cactus Hotel with a meeting of the organization's board of directors and ends following luncheon on Tuesday.

Special recognition will be given to members of the WTCC who were present at the Dec. 21, 1918, or the Feb. 8, 1919, organization meetings of the chamber.

Also present will be the first manager of the West Texas Chamber, Porter Whaley of San Antonio. Mrs. Fred Bussell of Abilene, who completed her 40th year with the regional chamber staff in February this year, will be present.

Absentee Voting To Begin Monday

Absentee voting for the first Democratic primary begins Monday in Eastland County and the rest of Texas.

Absentee votes may be cast in person at County Clerk Johnson Smith's office or by mail. Persons voting absentee in person should take their poll tax receipts to Smith's office. He will give the voter an application for an absentee ballot, and when it is completed the applicant will receive his ballot.

The law pertaining to absentee voting by mail was amended when the changes were made in the election code. The law provides that a mail application for a ballot must have a postmark from a point outside the county. The ballot can be mailed only to points outside the county and the ballot must be mailed back to the county from

Fishing Rodeo Is Just Week Away Anglers!

With the Fort Worth Anglers Club fishing rodeo just one week away—it is scheduled for Sunday, April 24, area fishermen were reminded today that they can enter the contest if they wish.

To be eligible to participate anglers must be members of the Fort Worth Club. They can join the club for \$2 and the entry fee for the rodeo is also \$2. Application

blanks can be secured at both the Eastland and Ranger chambers of commerce, Quarles Lodge, Chock-A-Block, Eb Richardson at the Lake Leon dam, Vaughn's Service Station in Ranger, or at Wayne Jackson's, Western Auto or Higginbotham's in Eastland. Deadline for entering the event is Friday at 6 p.m.

The lake will be closed to skiers Saturday and Sunday. Regular permits for fishing will not be required both of those days.

Trophies will go on display this week at the chamber offices in both Ranger and Eastland and at the Commercial State Bank in Ranger and the Eastland National Bank.

Teams of two anglers will participate in the rodeo beginning at 4:30 a.m. April 24. Weighing-in will end at 3 p.m. that day. A big fish fry is scheduled for the night of Saturday, April 23. Most fishermen from Fort Worth are expected to begin arriving at the lake Friday.

There will be a black bass division and a crappie division. Championship and runnerup trophies and prizes for additional places will be

awarded teams on the basis of the heaviest individual and the heaviest legal string of black bass and the heaviest individual and heaviest legal string of crappie weighed in by any registered team. An angler team will be eligible for only one pair of trophies or prizes in each division.

The weigh-in station will be at Lake Leon dam. Fish must be fresh caught and will be weighed live weight.

More than 150 teams entered the event last year, and more teams than that are expected this year.

Determination to Give Service Is Cited by Judges

The Eastland library this week formally received the award presented them by the Texas Library Association for the most outstanding library improvement project in Texas.

Here is the statement issued by judges in the contest:

"This award was the most difficult to choose—there were several excellent entries from libraries which had shown remarkable improvement through the year. After much deliberation, one was chosen—a small library, typical of dozens throughout the state. This library is the project of a woman's club—it has no trained librarian—it has a small annual budget—it has no magnificent new building—in fact it has nothing except an overpowering determination to give the best possible service to its community.

"The women who sponsor and operate the library chose as their 1960 project 'To interest more young people in reading library books.'

"During National Library Week the library mobilized the entire community—the schools, the merchants, the town officials, the radio and newspaper to interest more children in reading books.

"In the summer it sponsored an Incentive Reading Program which resulted in almost doubling the number of books read.

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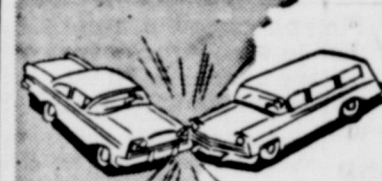
