School Incentive Okayed by Senate

A bill authorizing incentive aid payments to certain independent school districts has passed Texas Senate and now is up for tatives.

Senate Bill 80, introduced by Sen. Tom Creighton, would allow independent school districts created after the act became law through consolidation to qualify for incentive aid payments by the

state for a 10 year period.

The amount of aid payments would equal the difference between the sum of the Foundation School Fund program payments which would have been paid to the several districts included in newly organized district had there been no consolidation.

Incentive aid payments would have to be used exclusively to retire the existing bonded indebtedness of the school districts which were consolidated or the cost of constructing new buildings.

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ABOUT YOUP HEALTH

It is a sad thing to disillusion those who cherish the myth of Mrs. Catherine Alworth, 87, longtime resident here, died at 7 or oak or sumac, but the season of prevalence of these toxic plants is fast approaching, and fore-warned is forearmed.

Botanical scientists say it is doubtful that anyone is absolutely immune to their poisonous substance. More and more authorities agree that susceptibility is a mere matter of degree, varying with the condition of the individual, the condition of the plant, and the circumstances of expos-

Texas has its fair share of the 100-plus plants and plant products known to be capable of causing sometimes severe skin irritations. Among them are the parsnip, lady-supper, cultivated primrose (especially when in flower), lily bulbs and stalks, stinging nettle, and vanilla beans.

But by far the most common cause of plant dermatitis in Texas and elsewhere in the United States is posion ivy, known to botanists by the tongue-twisting name of Rhus toxicodendron. A cousin -poison sumac, by name-is common to the swampy regions of eastern Texas, and can sometimes produce severe reactions.

For all practical purposes, poison ivy and poison oak are the same thing. Poison oak is simply any poison ivy that grows as a bush rather than a vine

Poison ivy is an unusually in consistent species of plant. Besides growing as a bush and a vine, the size of its berries and the outline of its leaves often very widely. Its leaves are characteristically egg-shaped and pointed, but the edges may be smooth and unbroken or saw-toothed Moreover, these variations might occur on a single plant, or eaves on an entire plant may be imilar.

But in one matter, poison ivy is almost invariably consistent—its leaves practically always grow in clusters of three.

Most researchers agree actual physical contact with the plant juice either directly or indirectly is necessary before the poisoning agent can cause the typical blisters and skin inflam-

Thus ivy poisoning is best pre-vented by learning to recognize the plant and avoiding it. And, of course, it is always prudent to wear protective clothing such as 305 E. Main leggings and gloves when going into areas where poison plants are known to flourish. Once exposed, immediate washing with laundry soap and water helps to remove the resin, (A weekly feature of the Health Education Division, Texas State Department of



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
