





Persons who do not have a fixed address are in-cluded in the population of the place in which they are located by the census takers.

The district supervisor pointed out that under Census law, all persons 18 years old and over are required to answer official Census questions. The same law specifies that personal information collected by Census takers must be kept confidential. The person who willfully refuses to answer the official Census questions is subject to a maximum fine of \$100 or 60 days in jail, or both. The Census taker who reveals information about individuals to anyone other than a sworn employee of the Census Bureau is subject to a fine of \$1,000 or two years in jail, or






