## Gray Matter

When the trees bud, so they tell me, it's time for garden planting. If that is true, then it's just about time for us home gardeners to get out the seed and put a few in the ground.

A home garden is a wonderful way to save money on vegetables in the summer time, but for me it has been a lot of trouble without too much return.

For some reason or other a garden won't do well in my backyard. I've planted watermelons year after year and I've never eaten a watermelon that I grew in my own backyard, but I'm not giving up yet.

Once or twice I had a few good melons getting just about ripe enough to pluck only to have some kid passing through my yard kick a hole in the side of a good melon. But there aren't enough kids to keep me from trying to raise a melon or two.

There seems to be too many trees in my yard for a garden to flourish. I don't know what it is about the neighborhood, but few people have done any good with gardens in this neighborhood without spending a young fortune on water.

It's really cheaper to buy vegetables at the grocery store than it is to raise them yourself in this neighborhood, but there's something about your own home garden that makes a fellow feel awfully proud of his own produce.

I guess that's part of the mother complex that's inborn in most Americans, both male and female.

There is no question, of course, about the spring's bursting buds being the most beautiful time of the year as far as I'm concerned. Some say the autumn is more beautiful than spring, but I don't agree. Autumn is sort of colorful, but it's the time plant life is dying in contrast with the spring when plant life is beginning. That, to me, sort of explains why I'm partial to spring.

Spring also brings pleasant days, while the fall usually brings with it dreary days, long and dark. So I guess I'm just naturally a spring man. As a barefoot boy spring meant, too, it wasn't long until summer came with it summer vacation at school.

In these days of crowded schools I've noticed that some school systems are thinking of doing away with summer vacation and operating their schools on a year-round basis in order to find room

for all of the students. Of course all of them won't have to go to school the year around, but summer vacation will be staggered. Some kids would be out for three months in the winter time; others would be out at other times of the year.

Such a plan may have some merit, but it wouldn't have worked a generation or so ago. If we kids didn't have our summer vacation in the summertime, we'd have wrecked the schools so bad that some of the recent vandalism in some schools in nearby cities of our state would have looked like annual spring house cleaning by comparison.

Actually, I expect it will be another generation or two before the schools get around to operating with a staggered vacation system for kids. Their parents, who are the ones who really pay the bills of the educational system will object too much to any great change in the system. Mother at home wouldn't want the kids about the place during the dead of winter; she'd rather have them in school where some one else can look after them.

But, be that as it may, the important thing right now is that spring is here and it's about time for us home gardeners to get our planting in. If the sparrows will slack up some and give me a little time I'm going to get at a little dirt moving and seed scattering done if I can get the county agricultural agent out at the house long enough for a little of his professional advice.

In this day of scientific specialization I don't want to make a move without consulting him. I might plant the wrong thing and not know it.

## Austrian Salt Mine Fascinates Perkins

(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles written for the Telegram by Joseph M. Perkins.)

Here in Vienna I am having a good time. The cultural advantages are here, museums, art galleries, libraries, parks. Today I visited a fine clock museum with clocks of every kind even to those for church towers.

This forenoon I called upon the geologists of the Geological Institute, Republic of Austria, and discussed the salt deposits in this country. Tomorrow I am going to Salzburg where I will visit the salt mines which have been in operation more than 3,000 years.

Here in Vienna I note three things, lots of dogs on leash, red haired women and men carrying brief cases.

Weather was so bad in Munich that I stayed only a day. Snow was falling. Innsbruck is at the foot of the Austrian Alps. Today the sun is trying to shine between scattered snowsqualls.

From Milan I next went to Florence, a lovely city. I visited an art gallery there, also fine parks and gardens. From there I took the train to Alessia, on the Italian Riviera and stayed overnight. Then to Nice and along the Mediterranean coast and through innumerable tunnels.

On the train I shared a compartment with a very nice young couple from Kingston, Ontario, Canada. He is related to James Richardson & Sons brokerage firm with whom I do business. I expect they were on a honeymoon trip and enjoying it very much. My train from Nice to Marseilles was the Mistral, a deluxe fast train pulled by a steam locomotive.

When I left Italy I found that steam locomotives were still in use, only unlike the U.S. old ones they have no engine bells. Along the seacoast there are many curves and the progress is slow. I noticed many green houses in which tomato plants were growing and outdoors there were acres and acres of carnations in bloom. Large bouquets were on sale at the railroad stations.

Southern France has much more timber than Italy. Farm-motated castle with drawbridge to house priceless collection of El Cid Amontillado Sherry. Must be proof against rapacious onslaughts of marauding friends.

I enjoy using my Eurailpass as I do not have to stand in line at ticket windows. At the Vienna station I noticed stone planters at the end of each track and in them were early blooming Alpine flowers which had been carefully transplanted. They were also labeled. The attitude of trainmen toward passengers is better (I am sorry to say) than in U.S.

When a press train speeds by a station the stationmaster is always out on the platform tending in uniform at attention facing the train. A red flag is tucked under his left arm and with his right hand he salutes the passing train. There is a good

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## One Combined High School Is Proposed

Members of the Eastland, Ranger and Olden school boards have received requests from Dr. James C. Whittington that they appoint a committee to study a proposal to build one combined school for the three districts.

Dr. Whittington made that information public Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Eastland Lions Club. He stressed the fact that the school boards would not be backing or condemning such a plan, but would merely be agreeing to a three month study.

The school boards received the requests in the forms of letters from Dr. Whittington. "You have heard and read of a plan to have better schools in our area," he wrote. "I think that you have done a wonderful job with the tools that you have had to work with, but we can still have better schools with more united effort by all of us."

I have for many months studied the idea of central high school for all of Eastland County, but for many reasons I do not believe this possible at this time.

"I believe that some study should be made as to having a high school for Eastland, Ranger and Olden. We should leave the door open for other school districts that wish to join us for better education for our children. I believe that such a study should originate with the three school boards. I have asked several interested area citizens to serve on such a committee and have received their approval."

"I would like to have three months to make a comprehensive preliminary study. Because much work will have to be done with the State Board of Education, we must have the blessing of the school boards of the area involved. I would like to ask the school boards of Eastland, Olden and Ranger to appoint the same men to serve on this study group."

"At the end of three months we would like to report back to a joint meeting of the three school boards. At this time I do not know what our conclusions will be, but I can tell you that there will be no stone left unturned for better education. I am sure that such a study would be of great value to your school board in any future planning that you might have."

Dr. Whittington asked that the following men be named to work with him: Wendell Siebert, Eastland school superintendent, and Virgil Seaberry Jr. of Eastland; Wilson Guest of Ranger and G. B. Rush, Ranger school superintendent; Travis Hilliard, Olden school superintendent, and J. C. Everest of Olden.

Dr. Whittington told Lions that 1960 is "the year of decision." He said Eastland County would have to decide this year what the county's future will be. Showing a chart, the speaker pointed out that in 1910 the

county's population stood at 23,421. As of 1950, the last census, it was 23,942. In between that time, the population rose to a high of 58,505 in 1920, during the oil boom.

Whittington contended that the county would have been better off without the oil boom. He reasoned that until the boom the county was showing a steady population increase. After the boom and the bust, he said, the county has continually gone downhill.

"The road back is harder than the road up," Eastland County "get-it-done dreamer" asserted. "Ten years of lush, easy money destroyed our agriculture. We've had a hard time rebuilding it."

The Eastland eye, ear, nose and throat specialist believes that the answer to the county's problem is more people. He said the area's school problem isn't caused by too many students but by too few.

Pointing out that there are nine high schools in the county, he said that if Abilene had 45 high schools they would be in about the same shape Eastland County is. Abilene will open a second high school next year.

"Our kids have to compete with children who come out of the best schools in Texas," he exclaimed. He said that the facilities for teaching many courses are just not available now.

"We can have a school system that no town of 5,000 population can touch," he concluded.

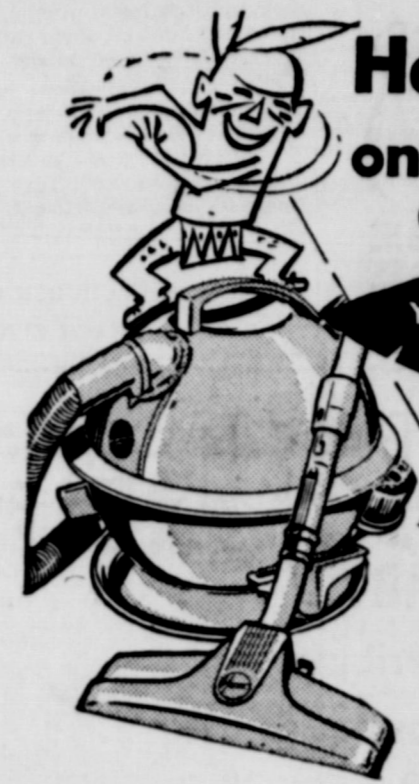

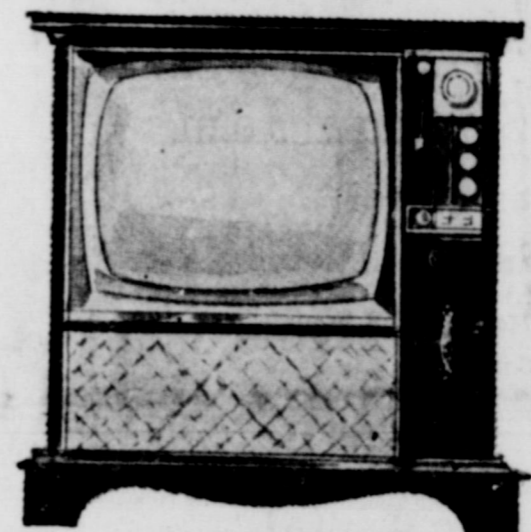

**Reading at Restaurant Table**  
Dear Mrs. Post: I have lunch every day in a small tearoom near my office. It gets very busy at lunch time and quite often the hostess will seat someone at my table. I usually take a book or the newspaper with me and read while I am having lunch. Would I be considered rude if I continue to read in the presence of this other person, or does good manners demand that I put my book, or newspaper, aside?  
Answer: If the table is small and your large newspaper may disturb your table companion, you should put it aside. There is, however, no reason for you to stop reading a book.  
**What To Call Ex-Mother-In-Law**  
Dear Mrs. Post: I divorced my husband about a year ago but have remained friendly with his mother through my children and see her occasionally. My problem is what to call her. Before my divorce I called her "Mother" but it does not seem right to address her as such any longer. To call her by first name would seem strange and Mrs. Jones sounds very cold. I would very much appreciate your telling me what would be proper in this situation.  
Answer: I think the best choice would be to call her whatever your children do because that is the real connection between you.

houses are better kept. Dogs are allowed in first class compartments on these trains and yesterday I saw one curled up asleep. Dogs seem to have, generally greater social standing in Europe than in America.  
Marseilles is called "France's Premier Port". I took a three mile walk to the top of a high hill overlooking the harbor. It was cloudy but I had my camera and just as I was considering whether I could get a shot a rift came in the clouds—I took the picture and the rift closed. This noon I take the train for Barcelona. From there I go to Valencia and east to Madrid.  
Second class compartments make up about 80 per cent of the trains and are crowded. Street cars and buses are likewise crowded. Small autos are used for short distances but not for long touring as much as in America.

## Census Takers To Track Down 'Floaters' April 8

Squads of picked crew leaders and census takers will fan out over this area on the night of April 8 in a special 1960 Census drive to count persons who do not have a fixed address, District Supervisor Max V. Mossholder said today.  
The census takers will visit missions, all-night theatres, and city parks in this special effort to make sure that all residents of the area are counted. Persons who do not have a fixed address are included in the population of the place in which they are located by the census takers.  
The district supervisor pointed out that under Census law, all persons 18 years old and over are required to answer official Census questions. The same law specifies that personal information collected by Census takers must be kept confidential. The person who willfully refuses to answer the official Census questions is subject to a maximum fine of \$100 or 60 days in jail, or both. The Census taker who reveals information about individuals to anyone other than a sworn employee of the Census Bureau is subject to a fine of \$1,000 or two years in jail, or both.

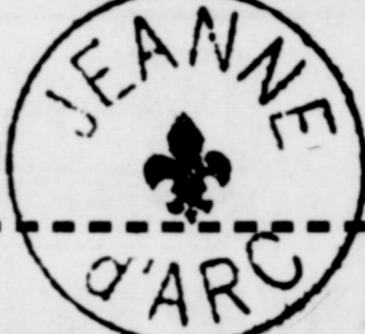
