## Verhetsel to Head County Posture Week

Dr. R. G. Verhetsel of Eastland has been designated city county chairman to direct Posture Week activities in this area, Dr. William A. Pattillo of Hamlin, district chairman, announced this week.

He is one of several hundred chairmen who have been named to direct Posture Week activities, May 1-7, in nearly 300 Texas cities and towns.

This will make the eleventh straight year that the Texas State Chiropactic Association has sponsored the observance of Posture Week in Texas.

The purpose of Correct Posture Week, the sponsors said, was to stress to the public the importance of good posture and good health and the relationship of the spine to good posture.

One of the features of this year's Posture Week will be the selection of a State Posture Queen. Twelve District champions will be nominated and the state winner selected at the annual convention of the Texas State Chiropactic Association in Houston in June.

The regional posture chairman said this week that periodic examinations of the spine to bring about good posture and good health will be emphasized during the observance.

"Seemingly trivial spinal injuries that not corrected can have far reaching effects because spinal distortions nearly always interfered with the nerve energy supply which goes from the spinal cord to various parts of the body," he said.

Children were especially susceptible to spinal injuries because of the number of falls and bumps they take while learning to walk and run and in the rough games during their youth, it was pointed out.

"Figures show that at least seven out of 10 children have spinal distortions in some degree in early life," it was stated. "Some of the distortions correct themselves, through routine exercises and activities. But sometimes the distortions do not disappear and result in health troubles later in life."

## Third Annual Pecan Budding School Set

The third annual Pecan Budding School has been set for April 25 at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco, it was announced recently at the County Agent's office in Eastland.

The one day school will begin at 9:30 a.m., on that date in the conference room of that organization. The morning session will be devoted to demonstrations and lectures on budding, types and kinds of budwood, stock, scion, tying the bud, forcing and the after care of the young buds.

The group attending will go to some nearby native pecan grove after lunch where they will have a chance to practice budding on small pecan trees using the patch bud method.

"We are delighted to have the pecan budding school in Cisco and we cordially invite all interested men and women to attend," Sam Kimmell, Cisco Chamber of Commerce president said when asked about the affair.

The school will be taught by J. M. Cooper, Eastland County agricultural agent who taught similar schools in Eastland in both 1958 and in 1959. Several of his pupils have become quite proficient in the art of budding.

Cooper said that out of county people who might be interested would also be welcome and that there would be no charge for participation.

## Motor Vehicle Inspection Cuts Fatal Accidents

Friday, April 15 is the last day for getting motor vehicles inspected in compliance with the Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection Law.

The Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection Law—in effect now just seven years—has reduced accidents caused by vehicle defects by nearly two-thirds.

Association of Texas Fire & Casualty Insurance Companies' studies of Department of Public Safety reports show that in 1952 vehicle defects were a cause of 16 percent of fatal accidents. By 1958—the latest year for which statistics are complete—the rate had been reduced to 6 percent.

In one year—from 1953 to 1954—vehicle defects as a cause of accidents dropped from a high rate of 18 percent to a level of only 6 percent and has remained at either 6 or 5 percent each year since.

The reduction in non-fatal accidents caused by vehicle defects has also been substantial. The drop in the 1953 to 1954 period was from 18 to 8 percent. Presently, DPS figures show vehicle defects as a cause in 10 percent of non-fatal accidents.

In 1952 better than 1-out-of-10 automobiles involved in a fatal accident had a defect contributing to the accident. Now, only 1-out-of-20 automobiles involved in fatal accidents have contributing vehicle defects.

The inspect on law was continued in force despite demands for repeal. The full effect of the law was shown in the drop in vehicle defect-caused accidents in 1954—the year following the Legislature's decision to leave the law on the books.

A 15-year-old evangelist, Daniel Vestal of Fort Worth, will conduct a revival April 22-24 at the Harmon Baptist Church.

Vestal, the son of a Southern Baptist evangelist has held more than 40 revivals. He will speak here five times, Friday at 7:30 p.m., Saturday at 10 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. and Sunday at 11 a.m. and 8:30 p.m.

The teenage evangelist was converted at the age of six. He dedicated himself for special service at the age of nine and when 13 surrendered to preach.

## Construction Here Off To Fast Start In 1960

Building in Eastland is off to a fast start this year, and from all indications there may be more construction in 1960 than this city has witnessed in many years.

Among local building developments are these:

Complete re-modeling of the Eastland National Bank.

Construction of several homes by individuals.

Building a new dental clinic.

Construction of a new medical clinic.

Adding a wing to the Bethel Baptist Church.

Plans to build a new housing development.

Dr. M. A. Treadwell has begun work on rebuilding the Medical and Surgical Clinic on West Commerce Street. The large clinic will be located in back of the present clinic, and the old building will be moved.

The Eastland bank is in the process of remodeling the interior of the building and will remodel the exterior soon.

A new dental clinic is under construction by Dr. J. O. Jolly. The clinic will be located in the 200 block of West Commerce. It will feature three dental chair rooms. The office will have 980 square feet of floor space and is due for completion in about three months.

The Bethel Baptist Church is presently adding a new wing to their building which will connect to two existing wings. The west wing of the church is also being completely remodeled.

In addition a new housing development is due to be built here by Don Pierson, who has announced plans to build a number of homes. He has indicated that he will begin building some five units immediately.

I'm a small-town guy. (Which is scarcely news to anyone who knows me.)

The pace of life is such in small communities that people have time to sit and visit—or at least stop long enough on the street for a little conversation.

For a year, I had an office in a building in Dallas. Every now and then, I'd ride the elevator with another tenant. All I knew about him was his name and that he was an attorney. One day, his obituary appeared in the paper and there was the information that he had been the private secretary of Governor Culberson and of Senator Culberson. What a wealth of political incidents was lost when he died!

In a small town, I would have known his background and would have obtained some of those stories.

In one town where I used to live, there was an attorney who had served in the War with Spain. There was another lawyer who was so old that he had held county office as a Populist. The county judge had obtained a law license by taking a correspondence course. The county judge-at-law had graduated from Cumberland Law School in Lebanon, Tenn. The county attorney had played in the line for the University of Texas in a Thanksgiving Day victory over A. & M.

Then there were an oil man who, years before, had drilled on the famous 101 Ranch in Oklahoma; a justice of the peace who was a Confederate veteran, and a sturdy farmer who didn't look within 20 years of his age and had taken part in the last Indian fight in the county. The founder of the town had been a surveyor and had made surveys in far West Texas when one would do well to keep on the lookout for bands of redskins.

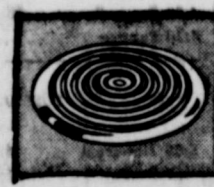

### AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

By Omar Burleson

Bills are pending in both the House of Representatives and the United State Senate to again drastically liberalize our immigration quotas.

The president recently transmitted his message to Congress which proposes to double the annual admission of 154,000 people from foreign countries.

Under the present law, immigration numbers from foreign countries are based on a percentage of people of the same race and ethnic group making up the United States population as of 1920.

The president recommends that the number of foreigners admitted be related to the total number of people the United States as determined by the 1960 Census. If this change is not drastic enough, the President would also extend the eligibility of admission by transferring quotas assigned to Northern and Western Europe to other countries. Heretofore, the greatest number have come from Western and Northern Europe, whose people are more nearly like our own, and have some appreciation of the American system and American ideals. These to whom eligibility

would be extended can have little such appreciation, as has been proved.

In addition, The President also proposes to create a permanent refugee program starting with the admission of 10,000 persons per year. However, the President wants a provision added which would permit him by a simple proclamation to increase this number without limit. There is nothing to indicate that so-called refugees might at some future time be admitted by the tens and hundreds of thousands. Besides, who is going to decide who is a refugee? Under special laws now on the books, in addition to our regular immigration quotas, more than two million immigrants have come to this country in the past 10 years.

Should the President's request for doubling the quota be granted, it is entirely possible that we will be faced with an influx of people into this country approaching the half-million mark a year.

There are special laws applying to so-called escapees from Iron Curtain countries, which are distinguished from refugees. The difference between the two is hard to define, but it admits more people.

In the first place we know little about who these people are, why they are out of their native country or what they are going to do after they are here. In the case of many already admitted our authorities still do not know why they are here or what they are doing.

The vast majority have ended up in the city ghettos where their own race and kind are concentrated.

The American taxpayer then seemingly becomes obligated to take care of them through public housing, unemployment compensation, and numerous other welfare benefits.

Even more serious is the fact that many of these people have little concept of our American system. We need only to take a look at the vast foreign minority groups in our great cities to understand one of the principal taproots of trouble in our nation. But it is something which is taboo to talk about in Washington.

The President will probably get his request, and the McCarran-Walter Immigration Act will be seriously weakened.

The Texas Farm Bureau is opposed to realignment of County Commissioners' precincts on a population basis. Members of the organization believe that this would deprive rural people of their traditional representation in local government.


