Estimated Vote Is 5,000 to 6,000

Saturday is the day that folks stop talking politics and do something about it. Voting begins in the Democratic primary at 8 a.m. here and elsewhere in the county and ends at 7 p.m.

A number of key offices are at stake in the primary and voting interest here has picked up considerably during the last few days. The primary will be the earliest ever held in Texas, but despite that fact some 5,000 to 6,000 voters are expected to go to the polls in Eastland County.

The Eastland voting box this year will be on the first floor of the courthouse in the ladies lounge, next to the sheriff's office.

A complete list of contested races is listed on the front page of today's paper. There are also 12 uncontested races, as follows: for U. S. senator, Lyndon B. Johnson; for Supreme Court associate justice, place 1, Clyde E. Smith; for Supreme Court, associate justice, place 2, Joe Greenhill; for railroad commissioner, Earnest O. Thompson; for state treasurer, Jesse James; for commissioner of agriculture, John C. White; for associate justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 11th District, Cecil C. Collins; for 91st District Court Judge, T. M. Collier; for county attorney, Earl Conner Jr.; for tax assessor and collector, J. C. Allison; for county Democratic chairman, A. J. Blevins, Jr.; and for Precinct 1 chairman, Herman Hassell.

There are 13 voting places in the county this year. They are at Eastland, Ranger, Olden, Gorman, Carbon, Desdemona, Kokomo, Rising Star, Okra, Pioneer, Nimrod, Cisco and Scranton.

Precinct conventions are scheduled in most of those precincts. An effort is expected to be made at those conventions to pass resolutions praising and endorsing Lyndon B. Johnson for President. Conventions are to be held in the courthouse at Eastland at 8 p.m., in the Ranger chamber of commerce building at 8 p.m., at the Olden home economics building at 5 p.m., at the Gorman fire station

Tips In A Restaurant

Dear Mrs. Post: My husband and I frequently go out for dinner. We always understood that 15 per cent of the bill, excluding tax, was an adequate tip for service. Is this tip to be divided among all the men who serve the table? There is usually one waiter who takes the order and another who serves the meal. Recently, my husband was given the distinct impression (by one of our two waiters) that he should have been taken care of individually.

Answer: You give your tip to the waiter who brings your check, and he divides this with any who helped him serve. If you had wine and it was served by a special wine steward, you should give him a separate tip of about 10 per cent of its cost.

To Meet Daughter And Her New Husband

Dear Mrs. Post: I work in a city five hundred miles from my home town. As it will not be practical for me to go home to be married, I am going to be married in this city and my parents will come here for the wedding. After my marriage I plan to go home for a short visit. My mother would like to give a party after we get home and invite relatives and friends to meet my husband. Will you please tell me how these invitations should be worded?

Answer: Your mother would either write across her double visiting card: "To meet Mr. and Mrs. John Smith" and the time and date in the lower left hand corner, or else have the invitations engraved:

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Jones request the pleasure of your company at a reception to meet Mr. and Mrs. John Smith etc.

Drinking From A Cup

Dear Mrs. Post: Which is more correct: to put the cup down on the saucer between sips or may it be held up between sips?

Answer: It is impossible to imagine the up-down, up-down motions that you suggest. Usually you hold the cup to your lips and take a few swallows and then put it down, later on you do the same.

Taking Wedding Cake Home

Dear Mrs. Post: I was invited to a large wedding reception recently. A very elaborate wedding dinner was served followed by wedding cake and coffee for dessert. As I could not eat the dessert, I asked the waiter for a paper napkin and a bag in which to wrap the cake and took my piece home with me to eat later. I was criticized for this.

Answer: You should not have taken cake served to you to eat at table, home with you. Wedding cake which is to be taken home is put into small white boxes and given to each guest as he (or she) is leaving the reception.

Receiving Telephone Calls In An Office

Dear Mrs. Post: I am a receptionist in an office. I am often asked to answer telephone calls for my boss. How should these calls be handled?

Answer: You should always answer the telephone in the name of the person who is being called. If the person is not in the office, you should say so.

If the person is out of town, you should say so. If the person is in the office but is busy, you should say so. If the person is in the office and is not busy, you should ask if you may take the call for him.

Always be polite and courteous in all your telephone conversations. This is especially true when you are answering calls for others.

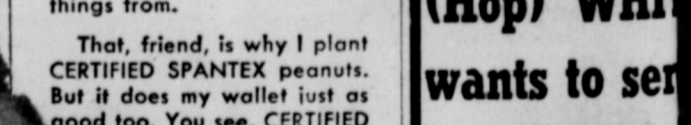

Lubbock Hosts Christian Church Annual Assembly

At the threshold of what the Christian Churches are calling their "Decade of Decision," the 73rd annual assembly of the brotherhood's state convention has spent five days looking at the biggest jobs to be done during the 1960's.

In a vote that was in the making for six years, the assembly converted the Texas Convention of Christian Churches from a mass meeting to an assembly of official delegates of congregations.

Strong resolutions on human rights and the National Council of Churches controversy and peace efforts were passed in business sessions of the meeting, which opened Wednesday and closed Sunday.

Reports approved by the gathering of ministers and lay people included one authorizing the Christian Churches' out reach causes to seek a total of \$2,358,500 from congregations in Texas

during 1960-61.

Another report asks agencies affiliated with the convention to enter conversations about the need for unifying all work of the Christian Churches in the state.

More than 6,500 church people registered for the assembly, but 1,500 was the largest attendance at any one session at Lubbock's Municipal Auditorium and Coliseum.

Keynoting the assembly, Dr. W. Earl Waldrop of San Antonio, convention president, said the Christian Churches must end their "present state of anarchy" and develop "some type of unified organization" in Texas.

I Am a School Teacher, And Not a Lawyer.

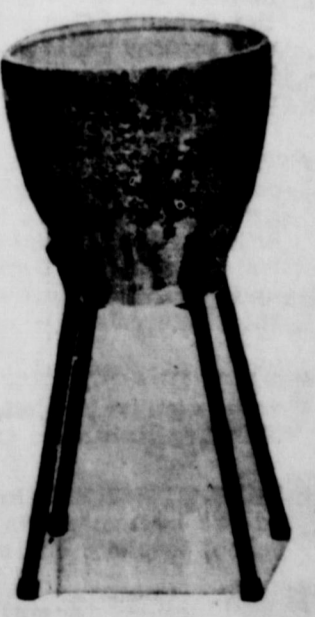

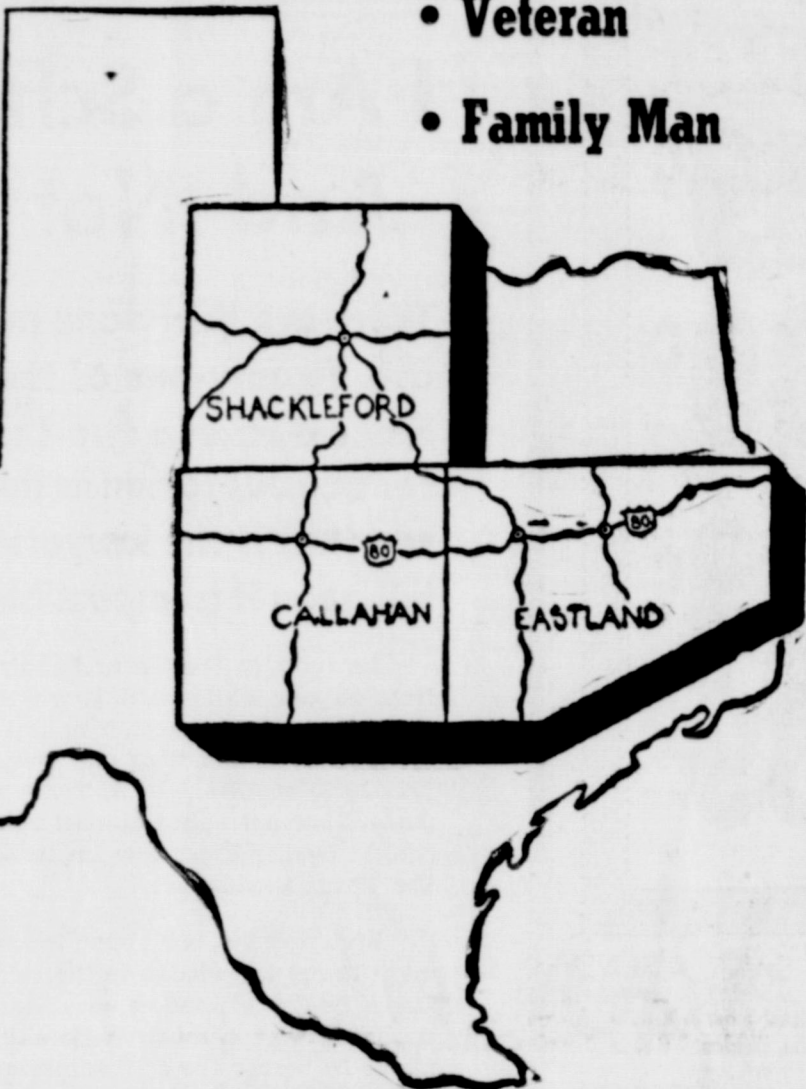

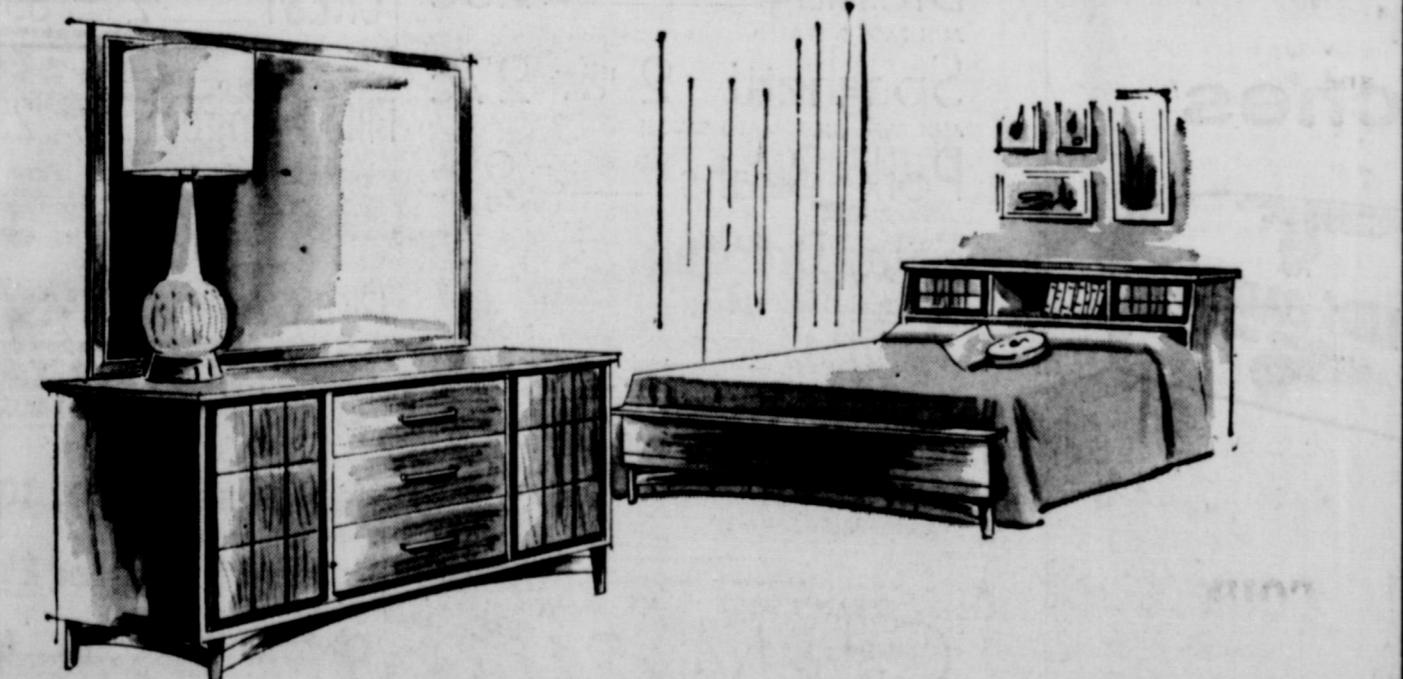
