COUNTY HELPS ELECT BLACKMON

Sen. Johnson Given Great Texas Sendoff

Eastland County delegates to the State Democratic Convention in Austin threw in their votes in the 2,252-vote landslide given Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson Tuesday. Just 10 nay votes were registered in the only roll call vote of the day.

The Texas sendoff gave Sen. Johnson 52 electoral votes in his bid for the Democratic nomination for President.

Eastland County delegates also played a key part in the 17th District caucus on the floor of the convention Tuesday. Abilene delegates to the convention had teamed earlier with delegates from several other counties to gain control of the pre-convention caucus held in the Driskill Hotel Monday. They named a slate of delegates which omitted the names of several key Democrats, including Congressman Omar Burlison, and Eastland County delegates joined a coalition with seven other county delegations to wrest control away from the Abilene group, which was headed by Ed Connally, state Democratic chairman.

The Abilene group's hand was

forced after their floor leaders refused a compromise effort. Delegates from Eastland, Stephens, Shackelford, Scurry, Parker, Palo Pinto, Erath and Comanche counties joined together to elect Larry Blackmon of Mineral Wells, state chairman of the Johnson-for-President move, as caucus chairman by a close 40-38 margin. Eastland County, with eight votes, cast the largest single number of votes for

Blackmon. Joining Taylor County in backing Connally were Nolan, Jones, Hamilton and Fisher counties.

Mrs. Roscoe Hopper of Ranger was named secretary of the caucus. Delegates to the national convention in Los Angeles next month from this district will be Congressman Burlison, Brad Thompson of Stephenville, Mark McLaughlin of Snyder and French Robertson of Abilene. Alternates will be Mrs. Adelle Smith of Weatherford and Randall Jackson of Baird.

In another 40-38 vote, T. D. Craddock of Hamilton was elected the district elector. The Abilene group favored Mrs. Bryan Bradbury. Taylor County had the largest vote in the 13 county district with 16 and Eastland County was second with eight.

Virgil Moore, chairman of the Eastland County delegation, was elected as a member of the state Resolutions Committee to represent the district.

Connally will still go to the convention. He will be one of the state's 52-delegates-at-large, as will Blackmon. Howard McMahon of Abilene will go to the convention as an alternate-at-large. McMahon had a large following among the winning coalition, but was not elected a delegate.

Taylor County delegates viewed the defeat of Connally as a challenge to his position as head of the State Democratic Committee. They said Blackmon would like to have the post. Eastland County delegates, however, felt that the Abilene group made their big mistake when they neglected most of the counties in their pre-convention planning and gave them no voice in the camp.

The convention went off smoothly. Mrs. Hopper was one of the some two dozen "Ladies for Lyndon" who wore white cowboy hats and red and white jackets and greeted Sen. Johnson on the stage of the memorial auditorium.

Sen. Johnson pledged he was with the Texas delegation "all the way" and was out to win. He will head the delegation and has full backing.

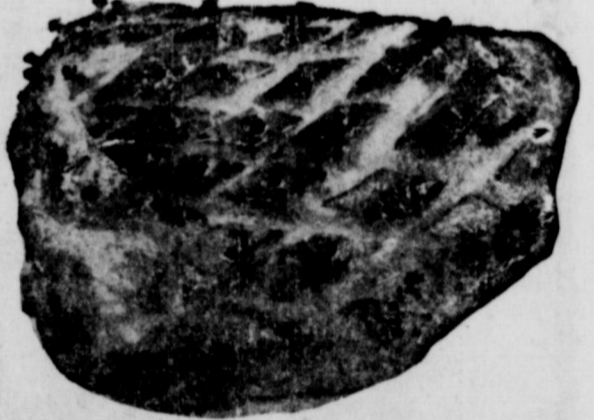

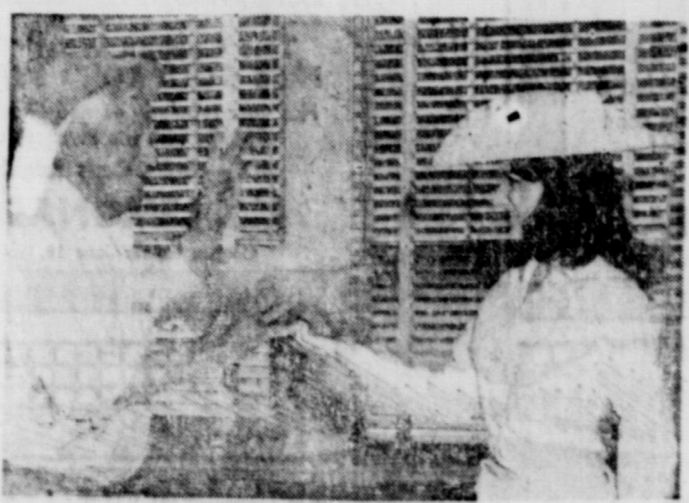

Navy Asks For Reenlistment in Sub Service

Lieutenant Commander L. C. Stilwell, officer in charge of the Navy Recruiting Station in Dallas, has announced the Navy's latest policy covering the reenlistment of personnel who have held active duty rates in the Navy's Submarine Service. Effective immediately certain personnel who were qualified and designated for submarine duty at the time of discharge or release from active duty, and who have been discharged or released less than three years, may reenlist in the regular Navy in the rate held at time of discharge or release to inactive duty. Due to the urgent need for qualified submarine personnel this extreme departure from the normal 90 day reenlistment time has been instituted. To be eligible for this program, personnel must have been discharged or released from active duty as a submariner in the regular Navy, or while a member of the Naval Reserve on active duty. The following ratings are those in which a man may be reenlisted under this policy. Snorkelman, third class petty officer through chief petty officer; torpedoman, third class petty officer through chief petty officer; fire control technician, third class petty officer through first class petty officer; guided missileman, third class petty officer through first class petty officer; electronics technician, third class petty officer through chief petty officer; radioman, third class petty officer through chief petty officer; machinist's mate, third class petty officer through chief petty officer; engineman, third class petty of-
