



## Sgt. Tucker Recalls Bataan Death March

An Eastland man who was one of the few thousand men to survive the Bataan death march of 1942, T-Sgt. Walter Tucker was featured in a recent story which appeared in the Minot, N. D. newspaper.

Sgt. Tucker, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Tucker, 611 South Walnut, Eastland, attended Eastland schools before he joined the services just before the Japanese government threw the United States into World War II by bombing Pearl Harbor.

He is now the non-commissioned officer in charge of ground powered support equipment with the 4136th Strategic Wing. He has been stationed at Minot air base for a year. He has seen service in Spain, and peacetime service in the Philippines as well as his wartime experiences there.

Sgt. Tucker recalls that only 3,000 of the 10,000 men survived the four-day Bataan death march which started April 9 from Mariveles, site of an American submarine base at the tip of Bataan peninsula and ended at San Fernando.

The Americans, all servicemen, were trapped at Mariveles when the Japanese took over Luzon Island. They were forced to walk under Japanese guard northeast for 80 miles alone a main high-

way through 45 miles of jungle and the rest of the way through rice paddies and farm country.

Japanese, stationed about every 200 yards, allowed the Americans no food or water for four days. "We began marching full breast on the road in a column of fours but couldn't keep ranks. We were a bunch of lunatics by the time we got there," he remembers.

"They didn't say where we were going but through their interpreter would only say they would feed us tomorrow."

Some of the men stole water from wells and rice paddies and everytime they stopped for a drink the guards would shoot into the crowd or bayonet an American and just let the bodies lay, according to the sergeant.

He said the Japanese bayoneted every American who fell down by the side of the road from dysentery or because he was hungry and tired. Most of the men died after the march ended at San Fernando, where survivors were fed steamed rice and then put in box cars like cattle for a 45 mile trip to Camp O'Donnell, Philippine army base.

Sgt. Tucker said the death march was not undertaken for lack of trucks for 150 or more trucks were surrendered to the enemy by Gen. King, area commander, under condition that the Japanese would use them to transport Americans to prison camps. When the Americans survived, they were starving to death. Sgt. Tucker lost 40 pounds from Dec. 7, 1941 to April 13, when the march ended.

On May 4, two days before the fall of Corregidor, Sgt. Tucker was assigned to a scrap iron salvage detail after existing in Camp O'Donnell on a meager fare of one small sweet potato and 1 1/2 teaspoons of rice three times a day. He returned to San Fernando from where he hauled war material salvaged from Americans from the Bataan peninsula fighting area by truck by way of San Fernando.

In September he got malaria five times and was sent to Santa Thomas prison, which the Japanese had converted to a hospital.

He was there until going to Cabanatuan in January to hand cultivate 100 acres of garden in prison camp. In June 1943 he left for Nichols field, former American airfield at Manila, to build runways with a pick and shovel. From there in July, 1944, he joined about 400 British prisoners of war who were working in a nickle mine in Oeyama, Japan.

"Working conditions were better in Japan than at Nichols, where we walked four miles to work barefooted, worked 16 hours and walked back. Our main fare was rice and sweet potato top soup."

In Japan until Sept. 10, 1945, Sgt. Tucker was on the same island as Hiroshima and Nagasaki and saw the flash from the atomic bomb.

"The next day the Japs said the Americans were the meanest people in the world; they had killed 30,000 people in one day."

After the war, while waiting for transportation home, American B-29's parachuted food and clothing to the prisoners.

From Japan Sgt. Tucker went by American ship to San Antonio by way of the Philippines and was furloughed home.

During 41 months as a prisoner of war, Sgt. Tucker got mail—six letters and a package—just one time, in March 1944. His parents had sent him many packages and letters which he never received.

## Mrs. Julie E. Bray Taken By Death Friday

RANGER (RNS) — Mrs. Julia Elen Bray, postmaster at Noodle and at Funston during the early 1900s, died at 6:20 a.m. Friday at her home at 907 Oddie St. here. She was 94.

Born Sept. 25, 1865 in McMinn County, Tenn., Mrs. Bray moved here in 1918 from Roscoe, where she had lived for 10 years. She was postmaster at Funston from 1901 to 1905, and postmaster at Noodle in 1905 and 1906. Both towns are in Jones County.

Survivors include a son R. Owen Bray of Abilene; two daughters, Mrs. H. G. Adams and Mrs. W. T. Smith, both of Ranger; three sisters, Mrs. Jennie Gordon of Cleburne, Mrs. Mary Johnson of Stamford and Mrs. Sallie Rowland of Anson; four grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

She was a member of the Baptist Church, placing her membership in the church 77 years ago.

Funeral will be held Sunday at 4 p.m. in the First Baptist Church here. The Rev. Ralph E. Perkins, pastor, will officiate. Interment will be in Evergreen Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home.

## Three Hundred Pound Snake Story Retold

It's not too often that happenings in New Mexico excite Eastland folks as much as the big rattlesnake story which came out of Ruidoso this past week has.

Curtis Koen came back from New Mexico telling the tall story and Hood King, whose wife suffered a rattlesnake bite just last week, quickly became interested in the tale. Then Jim Drake brought in a copy of the Roswell, N. M. newspaper which showed pictures of the snake and told the full story.

In brief, here's what they are telling in New Mexico: Two men, Juan Baca and Mike Gonzales, killed an 18-foot, 300-pound diamond back rattlesnake near Carrizozo.

Baca says he shot the snake eight times to kill it with a seven mm. Remington rifle. The two men were hunting pasture land

suitable for burros when they spotted the snake in a dry pond bed.

Baca shot it eight times, but none of the slugs penetrated the telephone-pole thickness of the snake.

They gave these statistics: Diameter—about like a telephone pole.

Length—18 feet or about like a telephone pole.

Weight—Estimated in excess of 300 pounds.

Size of Head—Diameter of car steering wheel.

Tongue—Yard long.

Fangs—Like a man's fingers.

Rattles—Eight. One the size of a basketball, some missing.

### Work Begins On Booster Plant

June 26, 1940 It was announced today from

Preliminary figures on the census of 1940 for the city of Ranger was released today through district census office in Abilene, showing that the town had a population of 4,563 as compared to 6,208 in 1930.

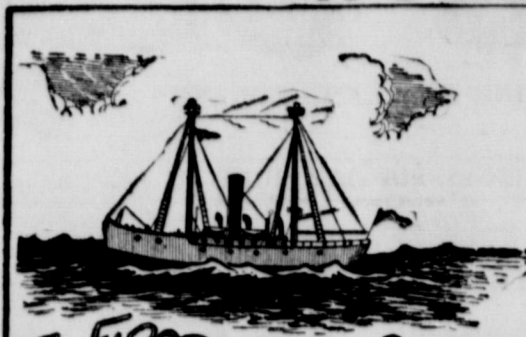

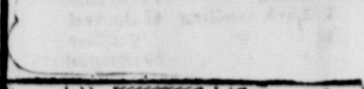

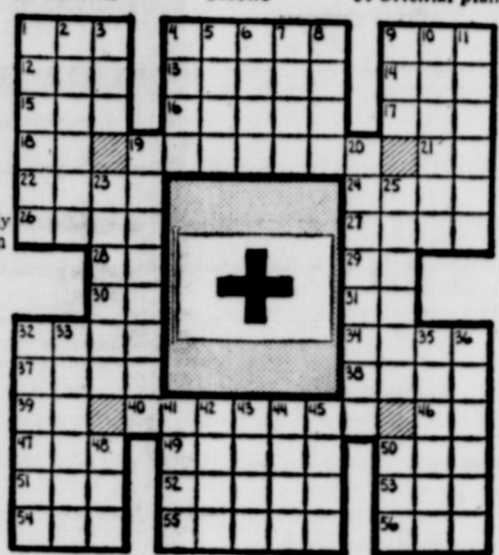

### A Pastel Colored Wedding Dress

Dear Mrs. Post: My daughter is going to be married in two months and is shopping around for a wedding dress. The manager of a very exclusive bridal shop here has practically convinced her to choose a wedding dress in pastel color—which she says is very modern. I am very much against this and I think that colored wedding dresses are for second brides only.
