## HALE-AIKEN OFFERS 16

### New School Would Need 28 Teachers

The tri-district school planning board met in Eastland Monday night and heard a report on suggested course offering for the proposed combined high school for Ranger, Eastland and Olden.

Before making the report, members of the committee asked the press to again make it clear to the public that this is merely a study.

Wilson Guest of Ranger said, "There is some misunderstanding among the public and we want to make it clear that we are not working to create one high school for the three towns. We are merely trying to decide what would be best for the students."

Superintendents of the three districts made the curriculum study. Reporting were Wendell S. Ebert of Eastland, Travis Hilliard of Olden and G. B. Rush of Ranger.

The three schoolmen reported that they would take 28 teachers, not counting specialty teachers such as vocational agriculture instructors, to offer all of the courses an ideal school would need. They pointed out that the three districts would have about a 425 enrollment, and could expect to receive state aid for just 16 teachers with that enrollment.

Added to the local curriculum now offered would be analytical geometry, advanced science, more speech courses, journalism, economics, world political science, commercial law, office machines, art, school nursing, sheet metal, welding, woodworking, music theory, orchestra, choral, music orientation, industrial cooperative training, drafting, Texas History, Spanish and physical and health education.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

TREASON

The history of liberty often shows that a would-be tyrant likes to accuse his opponents of treason. So, to safeguard our liberty the constitution itself sets out the kind of proof we need to find some one guilty of treason. For this reason America has had relatively few cases of treason. Not so in early English and Roman law. "Treasonous acts" covered many things, in fact, anything that seemed to threaten the community safety. In the fourteenth century the English tried to define treason: Since every subject owed allegiance to the King, trivial breaches of a private nature became "petite (small) treason." But a subject disloyal enough as to attack or plot against the king himself was guilty of "high treason." The kings liked this. For one to imagine the king's death became treason subject to death. The broadened treason widened

further to include crimes against persons. Later even the king himself was not exempt: In 1649 they indicted, convicted, and beheaded King Charles I for treason. King Henry VIII made it high treason to slander Queen Anne or her children. Failure to take an oath not to slander the queen itself became treason. Under Elizabeth I it became treason for anyone to hold a religion which did not conform to the crown's. Conviction of treason was easy. In some cases you needed no witnesses. Trials were short and the accused could not have defense counsel. In conflicts for power, the losing politicians often became "traitors" as they do in many countries to this day. Our early settlers lived in troubled times with the coming revolution creating new factions. For them treason was also a frequent accusation. But after the revolution the founding fathers and the people had had enough. They decided to limit "treason" and faced these problems: Should the new executive put down rebellious and define treasons himself? Should the Congress during "troubled times" have power to define treason? No. The new Constitution took treason out of politics. It said "Treason shall consist only of levying war against the United States

or in giving aid and comfort to the enemy." Conviction required testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act. (This column, prepared by the State Bar of Texas, is written to inform—not to advise. 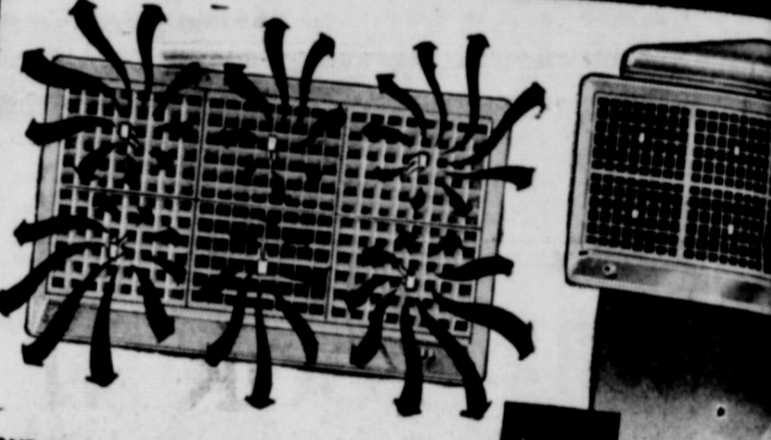

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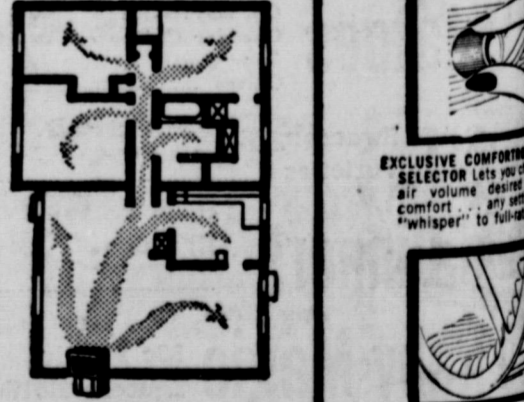

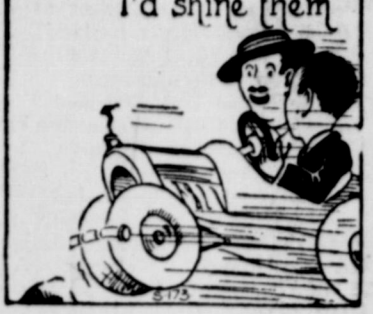
