Area farmers and ranchers were reminded today that Monday, Jan. 16, is the final day for filing their estimated federal income tax for 1960, unless they plan filing their final return on or before February 15. Arthur E. Fogle Jr., Administrative officer, of Internal Revenue Service, Abilene explained that those farmers and ranchers who file an estimated return on January 16 and pay the tax due thereon have until April 17 to file their final return and pay any balance of tax due. Otherwise, the law requires that they file their final return and pay the full amount of the tax due by February 15.

The IRS representative said that this option is available to farmers and ranchers only. The tax law defines a farmer or rancher as one who derives two-thirds or more of his gross income from farming or ranching. He advised farmers and L. Back in pioneer times our foreathers found they could keep rack of the family history pretty vell with a few notations on the flyleaf of the family Bible. But life's not quite that simple any more. Great-grandpa wasn't covered by social security or worknen's compensation. He didn't have a bank account or safe deposit box, a car and a dozen home appliances being bought on time payment, or a half-dozen insurance policies. We have taxes greatgrandpa never heard of and wouldn't have believed if he had. And had you asked him for a certificate to prove his birth, he'd have hought you'd taken leave of your

The point of this is that the verage American today has a good many important papers to keep track of. There are birth certificates, receipts, copies of tax returns, sales contracts, and a host of other papers. With a little tidy record-keeping, you can make life easier for yourself and your family when you are gone.

So, why not make a New Year's Resolution to follow these sugges-

1. Get a heavily bound notebook folder or file foldler as a central collecting point for all the records of your affairs.

2. Put your especially important papers in your safe deposit box, but make a list of those papers and a brief summary of their contents to put in your home file.

3. Get for your files copies of birth certificates for all members of the family, and add them to the file. Add your marriage license or at least a statement as to when and where you were married and by whom.

4. Insert your will or a copy of it. If your will is kept elsewhere, 6.15 Cop. Ko include a note telling where it may be found.

5. During the year, put into the file your income tax withholding statements and receipts for expenditures which may be deductible. Then beep a copy of each year's tax return in the file.


