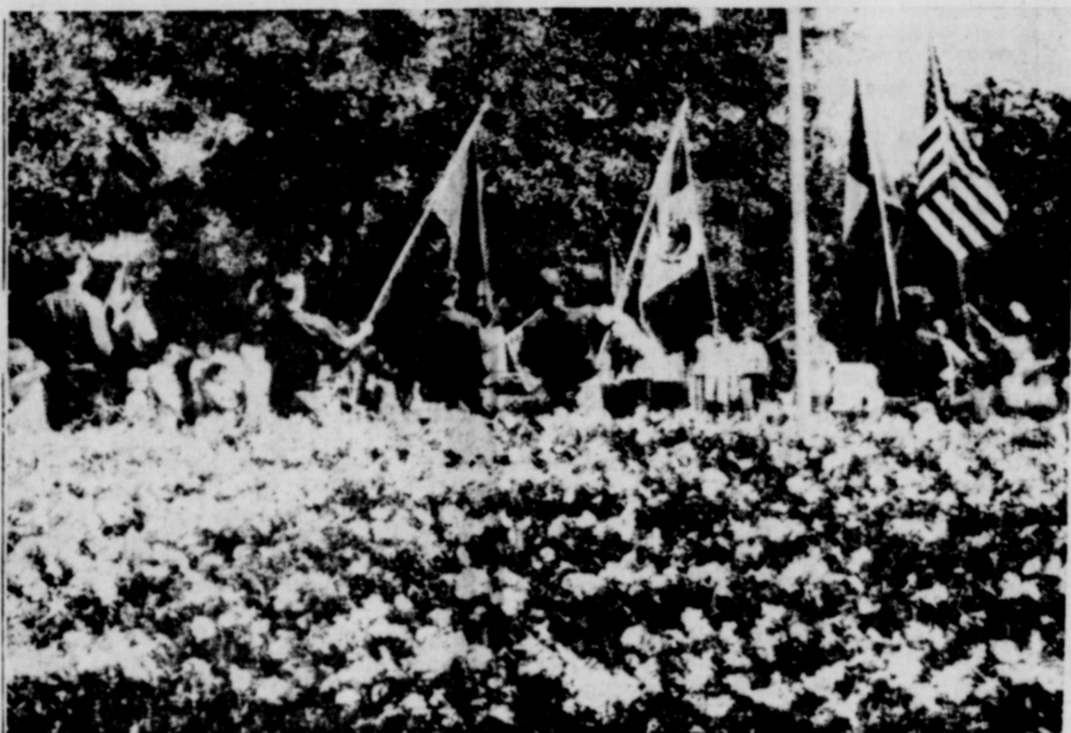

Pure Patriotism Paraded in Eastland During Annual Flag Day Celebration

Stamp Mural Unveiled --On Permanent Display

"I pledge allegiance..." And Eastland people did Friday, in one of the most spectacular Flag Day celebrations held in this area in many years.

Dignitaries, bands, flowers, flags and patriotism were the keynotes of the day, bringing one observer to comment that it was a display of an old-fashioned patriotism, the likes of which would frighten any Un-American.

And although it was Postmaster Mrs. Art Johnson's show from first to last, it was the type of celebration that makes every stout-hearted man, and woman, proud to be an American, and proud to be a part of such an observance.

One of the features of the day was the official unveiling of Mrs. Johnson's postage stamp mural, a seven-year labor of love, that will belong to Eastland forever. Occupying a key location in the lobby of the post office, it will be an attraction to all who pass this way.

Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, president emeritus of Hardin-Simmons University and Texas historian par excellence, was main speaker for the mid-morning celebration at the post office.

Flags unfurled around the square and all over town, as the day began with an informal, recognition breakfast at Lone Cedar Country Club.

Paramount among the out-of-town visitors was Stanley Hodziewicz, chief of the Philatelic Staff of the Post Office Department, Washington, D. C.

Other distinguished guests included Darrell K. Glenn of Dallas, director of Manpower Sources, Region Seven, General Services Administration. It was to Mr. Glenn, whose organization is responsible for the physical facilities of the various government agencies such as the post office, that Mrs. Johnson formally presented the stamp mural which will be on permanent window display at the local post office.

Others included Cisco Band Director Eris Ritchie and seven Cisco High School twirlers, Edgar Hutchinson, association vice president from Greenville and Gorman Postmaster Golden Baize.

High School Principal Charles Marshall introduced the two essay winners. Gifts of Romco-Eastland-made pottery and framed plaques were presented to visiting guests and media personal.

A scene of pomp and circumstance greeted the throng of people gathered at the post office for the mid-morning ceremony. Virgil T. Seaberry presided, atop a speaker stand overlooking the giant flag, flower-bed on the lawn. An oriental garden had been added this year as background along the north, and the entire area was ablaze with blooming flowers, neatly trimmed hedges — and patriotic people.

Nearby for color, was J. C. Poe's ancient auto bedecked in its finest "hillbilly" regalia, and cast.

Under the uniform command of James Reid, the Eastland Explorer Scout Troop, accompanied by representatives of all branches of the Armed Services, made up the official color guard. A drum and bugle corps headed by Cy Frost provided appropriate music for the occasion.

Siebert led the crowd in the Pledge of Allegiance, after the colors had been raised atop the new 50-foot flagpole.

"The past is prologue," Dr. Richardson began, and called the past preparation, the chart, the compass and the inspiration for the future.

Recalling Eastland County's history, he cited two specific, colorful, unique eras — the frontier (that which Uncle Billy McGrew knew), and the oil boom (that which Boyce House knew so well).

"The strength of a patriotic observance such as this," he said, "combined, is the strength of our nation."

The postmaster, and the honored guests led the crowd of people into the lobby of the post office for the "official" first look at the new mural.

Mrs. Johnson was lifted onto a chair, so that she could be seen and heard, in describing section by section, the six by ten-foot postage stamp mural.

Theaterman Dick Dixon presided at the recognition breakfast, the high-light of which was the presentation of the two Eastland High School Students who won in the recent essay-about-a-texas-contest Mrs. Johnson sponsored.

Larry Goldston received a \$10 check for his essay, and Sharon Kay Wilson, \$5 for hers. Mrs. Johnson bought the essays and presented them to Mr. Hodziewicz, along with a plea to the post office department that philatelic (stamp collecting) courses be encouraged as public school subjects.

The Amarillo couple, Mr. and Mrs. Lane, were seriously injured early Friday morning when their automobile was in collision with a transport truck.

The accident occurred at 2:25 a. m. Friday at the intersections of Main and Seaman Streets.

An attending physician listed Mr. Lane in critical condition with multiple chest and head injuries.

The body was taken to Patterson Funeral Home in Sweetwater, where service arrangements are to be announced.

Mrs. Lane was listed in serious condition with a concussion and back injuries.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Lane were taken to the Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Driver of the truck was not injured, according to a spokesman. His name and residence was not known at press time.

Four Eastland Youths Will Go To Salvation Army Camp

Billy Ray Keller, 14, Ricky Manke, 14, Rusty Pogue, 14, and E. J. Sharp, 13, all of Eastland will be among some 800 boys all over Texas to attend the Salvation Army's Camp Hoblitzelle near Dallas. Local boys will leave for camp on Sunday, June 23, and return on June 30, according to Chief Ray L. Laney, camp chairman for Eastland.

The boys will be met at the bus station in Midlothian or Camp Hoblitzelle, and transported to the camp by representatives of the Salvation Army. At camp they will be housed in attractive brick and redwood cabins, and furnished meals in the large dining room prepared by expert chefs to meet the physical needs of youngsters.

In Eastland, the Salvation Army is supported by the United Fund, which raises money in this community for the support of Salvation Army service Unit and other youth,

\$15,000 Suit Names Firm For Damages

A \$15,000 damage suit has been filed in 91st District Court as the result of a rock-crushing operation located recently along Highway 80 between Eastland and Ranger.

The suit, filed by Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Tindall, names Collins Construction Co. of Travis County, and alleges that the 756-acre tract of land they had leased, received extensive damages because of dust and flying rocks from the rock-crushing operation located nearby.

Farm Bureau Participating In Fire Program

The Eastland County Farm Bureau is participating in a program to assist volunteer fire departments in fire prevention and protection in rural areas, according to Jack Cozart, Eastland County Farm Bureau president.

The local county FB leader said the Farm Bureau will help defray the expenses for sending a limited number of volunteer firemen to a Firemen's Training School to be held July 21-26 at Texas A&M College. The Farm Bureau will pay \$45 of the \$50 registration fee for members of local volunteer fire departments to attend the school which furnishes up-to-date information on fire protection and fire prevention as well as fire fighting techniques. The 50 registration fee also covers lodging and meals, he explained.

The Farm Bureau will also pay any local organized fire department for answering calls outside of the city limits to fight fires involving the property of Farm Bureau members carrying fire insurance with the Farm Bureau insurance company, he said. The amount of payment will be \$75 per call.

The county president said local fire departments are being urged to cooperate in the plan to reduce fire losses in rural areas of the county. Any volunteer fire department that will agree to serve rural areas will be eligible to submit an applicant for the training school. But the total number of persons that can attend is limited, and only one applicant for each department can be accepted, he concluded.
