techniques and that they obey all traffic laws over the course that will offer driving conditions encountered by the typical motorist.

The seven classes will be determined according to car size and price. All entrant cars will be required to have automatic shifts except for those in Class A, compacts with manual shift. Other classes are: (B) compacts with 4 1.38 with 8 cylinders; (C) compacts with 8 cylinders; (D) standard 5.15 size with 6 cylinders; (E) low-25.83 price with 8 cylinders; (F) me-Mild dium price; (G) high-price.






