Highway Six Improvements Are Killed by Opponents

Five Year Delay Seen In Eastland Re-Routing

Walnut Street residents who opposed the re-routing of Highway 6 down Walnut Street have won their battle against community leaders and highway engineers who favored the new routing. The Texas Highway Commission has issued an order to halt construction of Highway 6 at or near the south edge of the city limits.

The order will mean that some \$200,000 which was to be spent on routing the highway through Eastland and on north of the city will not be spent in the county. It may also mean that plans to rebuild Highway 6 on north towards Breckenridge will be abandoned for some five to 10 years.

The Highway Commission issued this order: "Whereas, in Eastland County in accordance with the public law, a public hearing was held in the City of Eastland on Jan. 10, 1961, covering the route location proposed for the future development of State Highway 6 through and adjacent to the City of Eastland; and

"Whereas, at the public hearing authorized representatives of the Texas Highway Department conducted the hearing and with the aid of maps and other available material, outline the proposed arrangement for future construction; and

"Whereas, every interested citizen in attendance at the public hearing was invited to make their opinions and sentiments regarding the route location as shown on maps exhibited at the public hearing; and

"Whereas, strenuous objections were raised by citizens who reside adjacent to the proposed relocation along Walnut Street; and

"Whereas, the present route through Eastland will adequately serve the traffic requirements for the next five to 10 years.

"Now, therefore, it is ordered that the improvements programmed on State Highway 6 from a point on present State Highway 6 southeast of Carbon to a connection with present State Highway 6 north of Eastland be terminated at or near the south city limits of Eastland and relocation of the existing facility through and adjacent to Eastland be deferred for further consideration at some future date."

District highway officials said that plans which were in the making to extend Highway 6 improvements on towards Breckenridge in the near future will probably now be shelved for at least five years. They made this statement after a direct question from a Telegram

reporter. Asked where money which might have been spent on the Eastland to Breckenridge road would be spent now, they indicated the money would be used to improve Highway 183 out of Cisco.

The highway will still be re-built from Carbon to Eastland, by-passing Carbon.

United Fund Is Still Short of Goal by \$400

Eastland's United Fund goal may fall short for the first time. That's the sad word today from Dick Spalding, drive chairman, who revealed the drive is still short of its goal \$7,150 by \$400.

Spalding said that the average man on the street has given as much as always, but that larger contributions have fallen down. He said some firms and individuals who normally make large contributions have given nothing during this drive.

Oil and Gas Area Is Developed

Possibility of extensive oil and gas development right against the eastern and southern limits of Rising Star was given further impetus last week when the Joyce Interests Bond No. G, half a mile north of the same operators' Oscar White was deepened with results as spectacular as the White's response a week earlier. The well, completed in the Marble Falls around 2,000 feet, was deepened about three feet and responded Friday with such a strong flow of oil and gas that a Halliburton unit was called from Cisco to close it.

After an adjustment period of one calendar year following notification of marriage a student may participate in interscholastic League activities, club memberships, F.F.A., band, V.I.C. and F.B.L.A. contests; however, may not hold an office in any of these organizations.

Moisture Checks In County Reveal Good Crop Prospects

Wet country always puts a smile on a stockman's face. Ranchers since early days have kept their eyes on the clouds. If the rains come the grass will be good; if the rains fail the grass will be short. After experiencing both

wet and dry modern conservation-minded stockmen have learned the importance of watching the moisture in the ground instead of watching the clouds as what falls does not always help to grow grass.

Recent moisture checks around this area by Soil Conservation Service technicians show a basis for optimism toward a good crop of summer grass in 1961. At present we have more water stored in the soil than we have had at any time since March of 1958. Local stockmen will long remember the abundant crop of grass we grew in 1958.

Borings on mixed land range with fair and good cover show the soil is wet above field capacity from six to eight feet. This represents from nine to twelve inches of rainfall already stored in the soil for growing grass when warm weather comes. One year ago this land was only wet slightly over two feet. In March of 1958 moisture in this land was about the same as now.

Of particular interest were borings on shaley prairie range land. This site is a heavy waxy clay soil often locally called mesquite flats. Under most present conditions where it has been overstocked through the years it is now primarily growing mesquite timber and Texas Wigger grass. At present this site is generally wet slightly over four feet. This represents eight to ten inches of rainfall storage since this soil holds two to two and one half inches of water per foot depth. In February and March of both 1959 and 1960 this land was wet only eight inches to two feet. In January of 1958 this land was wet up to five feet. In June of 1958 clippings of Texas Winter grass showed as much as 5500 pounds per acre on this land. Last year's production was about 1,000 pounds per acre.

We are indeed fortunate at the present time in that we have a truly wet country before spring has even begun. Our present big needs on our ranges is more grass cover to replace the grass we have grazed this winter and to handle our spring rain yet to as well as our long time need for improvement of forage quality. Most of our pastures due to overstocking for many years are now growing only a very low percentage of our most desirable grasses.

All overall improvement of forage quality can be achieved only through management programs of proper use and deferment periods which allows the better grasses to produce seed. Some of these better quality and high producing grasses, and Side out grama, Indian grass, Little bluestem, Buffalo grass, and Sand lovegrass. It takes
