Strawn Hill and Carbon Are Scenes of Accidents

Two truck drivers narrowly escaped serious injury in separate Eastland County accidents this week.

One of the drivers, Forrest A. Spurrier of Hearst, rode his truck-tractor over Strawn Hill on Highway 80 east of Ranger early Friday morning. The truck dropped 50 feet into a canyon and Spurrier was knocked out.

Highway Patrolman E. M. Watts, who investigated, said the accident occurred at about 3 a.m. Spurrier was driving east pulling a flatbed loaded with ice-dispensing machines. He apparently went to sleep at the wheel of the truck for he said the first thing he recalled was trying to work his way back up to the highway.

The truck was badly damaged and Patrolmen Watts said the equipment being hauled was probably a total loss. The driver got off easier. He reported one small scratch.

The second accident involving a truck took place Thursday morning.

Space Show Is Planned Monday At High School

Eastland school students will hear a talk on the "Conquest of Space" Monday at 1 p.m. The speaker will be Jim Lambert and the program was arranged by Southern School Assemblies.

Lambert, a graduate of Pennsylvania State University as a speech major, did a short stint as staff announcer on WDFM before serving two years in the army where he served with the legal division. The same adventurous spirit that resulted in his driving his own jeep on an 8,000 mile safari into the jungle areas of Mexico and Yucatan, has interested him in the conquest of space ever since he built his own rockets at the age of 12.

Already popular as a lecturer on the Mayan Indians of Mexico with slides taken on his safari, he now turns his talents to the story of man and his efforts to reach distant planets. Beginning with simple explanations of gravity and Newton's Law, he quickly takes his audience through the history of flight—from Kittyhawk to North America's famed X-15. He explains the function of the first satellites including Russia's dog-carrying Sputnik, and ends the program by firing a 30-inch rocket simultaneously with the recorded sounds of a blast-off at Cape Canaveral.

The visual aids which Mr. Lambert uses, represent thousands of dollars worth of models from the original Earth Satellites Show that fascinated millions in New York, Chicago, and San Francisco, together with his own demonstrations and additions that bring the space story up to date.

Sales Forum Is Slated Monday

Eastland sales people, the bosses and employees as well, will have a chance to get some new tips on better salesmanship this week. Jaycees are offering a two night sales forum at no cost to the employer or the employees.

The forum will be held in the high school auditorium under direction of Dr. Gene Ermer, dean of Ranger College. Theme of the forum will be "Personal Salesmanship."

The two-night forum will kick-off a six month Jaycee program to help local sales people become more successful. Jaycees plan to name an outstanding sales person each month for six months beginning March 15. Jaycee members will study sales personnel and vote each month on which sales person they think is doing the best job.

Dr. Ermer holds a doctorate degree from North Texas State College and he also holds degrees from Quachita College and Baylor University. He formerly taught business at NTSC and is professor of business and social science at Ranger College.

In addition to his training in the "sales" field Dr. Ermer has been active in sales work in the past. He says the forum will deal with factual information which can be of help to persons in Eastland, not in New York. The meetings will begin at 7 p.m. Monday and Tuesday nights.

\$4,715,300 Saved for Rainy Day

County Savings Power Is Great

An amazing hidden savings power exists in Eastland County, information just released by the United States Treasury Department indicates.

Dan Castle, chairman of the district Savings Bonds sales volunteers, told Guy Parker, East-County chairman, that there are now \$4,715,300 in outstanding bonds in the county. Some of the bonds date back as far as 1941 when the first bonds were issued. The amount represents more than any single bank in the county has on deposit.

Parker learned of the vast output 13 meeting held in the Wooten Hotel in Abilene Thursday night. He was honored at the meeting for being one of four chairmen in the nine counties to reach his 1960 sales goal.

In 1960 Savings Bonds sales in Eastland County reached \$545,746, or 105 percent of the goal of \$520,000. Only Taylor County exceeded that amount of sales and Eastland County ran far ahead of Callahan, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Nolan, Shackelford and Stephens counties.

The \$4,715,300 in bonds held by Eastland Countians represents more than \$235 in savings for every man, woman and child in this county. The bonds bring in \$165,000 annually in interest, Castle said.

And Eastland County is off to a fast start in 1961, it was learned January sales in the county totaled \$71,003, or 13.7 percent of the 1961 goal.

Savings Bond volunteers, bankers, newspaper, radio and television personnel attended the meeting. Eastland County representatives were Parker; Russell Hill, executive vice president of the Eastland National Bank; and Virgil Moore, Telegram editor.

A Treasury award was presented to Parker in appreciation of making the 1960 goal.

Old Age Payments In County Just Short of Million

A total of \$904,838 was pumped into Eastland County's financial bloodstream during 1960 by old age assistance payments, the annual report issued by the Department of Public Welfare reveals.

In addition to the old age payments, an additional \$30,859 in aid to dependent children was paid, \$22,619 went for aid to the blind and \$16,902 for aid to the permanently and totally disabled in the county. The total payments in the county by the Department were just short of one million dollars.

ON WORLD TOUR

Joseph Perkins Begins New Travel Tale Today

(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles to be published by the Telegram. Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Perkins and sister are on a world tour.)

By Joseph M. Perkins In this first letter to the Eastland Telegram in 1961, I will give a brief outline of our trip. My wife, Emily, and my sister, Ellen, are accompanying me, so when I say "we" it means all three of us.

When in November, we first thought seriously of taking this trip, I contacted a travel agency and applied for reservations on the Oriana, from Los Angeles to Australia. At that time I was told that there were 700 applications on the waiting list ahead of ours and we were advised to look for accommodations on some other ship. Among the possibilities we chose the S. S. Lakemba, a nearly new air conditioned Canadian cargo ship sailing in early February from Vancouver, British Columbia to Sidney, Australia, with stops at Honolulu, Hawaii and Suva in the Fiji Islands.

This ship carries a cargo of lumber and 90 passengers. It is a 10,000 ton ship and takes about 30 days to make the trip. We purchased tickets on the Lakemba and made train reservations from Eastland to Vancouver, via St. Paul, Winnipeg and then west across the prairie provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta and through the beautiful Rocky Mountains of British Columbia.

However, early in January my travel agent informed me that due to cancellations we could go on the Oriana, our first choice of ships, so we cancelled the arrangements on the Lakemba and got tickets on the Oriana, sailing from Los Angeles on Feb. 9, also via Honolulu and Suva, but allowing us to disembark at Wellington, New Zealand for awhile before going to Australia.

The Oriana is a new 42,000 ton passenger ship of the P.S.O. Orient Lines, now on her maiden trip from Southampton, England on a cruise around the world. It is a fine modern ship with every convenience imaginable and it is the largest ship ever assigned to regular service on the Pacific Ocean. I will describe the ship later.

As I write this we are about half way from Los Angeles to Hawaii, cruising rapidly in an attempt to establish a new speed record. The sea is moderately calm and the captain has decided not to use the stabilizers because their use cuts down the speed.

We are due to arrive at Honolulu on Monday morning, Feb. 13, and will have the day ashore for sightseeing before sailing again at midnight. Six days later we are due at Suva and on Washington's birthday, Feb. 22, we should reach Wellington, New Zealand.

Our present plan is to spend two or three weeks in New Zealand, one of the most scenic spots in the world with high mountains, glaciers, marine views and an interesting and very British countryside.

From New Zealand we will cross over to Australia where we intend to tour until late in April at which time we will take another ship for London, going via Ceylon, India, the Red Sea, Suez Canal, Mediterranean ports and Portugal. We will have about two weeks in the British Isles and while there we will use the British Railways to travel through England, Scotland and Wales. Then we will cross the Atlantic on the United States liner S. S. America, arriving in New York about June 28 for our summer in New England as usual.
