



Scout Cookie Sale Planned In Eastland

Procedures for conducting the sale. The cookie sale sponsored by the Heart of Texas Girl Scout Council will be March 9-18 this year.

Mrs. Patrick T. McGowan of Brownwood is chairman of the 1961 cookie committee for the council. Other members of this committee are Mrs. Fay Looney, treasurer; and Mrs. Ray A. Hoyle, staff advisor.

Cookie sale in each city within the council will be directed by a community cookie chairman. Community cookie chairman here is Mrs. Jim Parks.

The Heart of Texas council takes in scout troops from Ballinger, Brady, Breckenridge, Cisco, Coleman, Eastland, Goldthwaite, Graham, Jackboro, Lampasas, Mineral Wells, Stephenville, Weatherford, Eastland and Brownwood.

Camp Wood Lake is being built almost entirely with cookie sale funds—money raised by the Scouts themselves. In fact, Scout officials estimate 95 per cent of the money spent in developing the camp has come from cookie sales.

Two of the original four units planned for the camp have been completed to date. Included in each unit are seven to nine tent frames, a shower house, and a unit shelter which is used for program activities and shelter in case of inclement weather.

A new and modern infirmary with facilities for treating minor accidents or illness among campers is also a feature of the camp. Included in this building are nurses' quarters, ward room, isolation ward, and a small kitchen.

Future plans—which will depend upon success of the cookie sales—are for one or more additional units, a craft house which may be used for storage when camp is not in operation, and adequate swimming facilities.

At present the camp may accommodate 56 campers per week. Six sessions of camp are conducted each summer for scouts in the council. Approximately \$60,000 has been spent on development of Camp Wood Lake.

have mastered the game, it's the first indication of trouble," Don says.

This thinking, in part, as instilled into the youngest of his three sons by A. C. Sr., who has presented that all needs, be they on or off the golf course, should be earned.

This philosophy is exemplified in this bit of history Don recites about the 1948 Dallas city tournament. "Dad and I both reached the quarterfinals and were matched against each other. I thought all along Dad would let me win and I had him three or four holes down after the first nine. As we were getting ready to tee off on the back side Dad said 'I'm not going to give it to you.'

"Indeed he didn't. By the 18th hole I was only one up. On the 18th green Dad had about a 20-foot downhill putt over a hump. As he was lining it up he said 'I'm going to sink this putt, win the hole and beat you on the next one.' Well he sank that putt and won the hole. He would have won the next one, too, if I hadn't holed out from a bunker for a birdie. Dad was already up there within a couple of feet for his par.

"I learned a valuable lesson that day, and I've remembered it since. With the exception of Mrs. January, remaining members of the family form a rather potent golf foursome. Ben, the oldest at 36, maintains smilingly he can beat the "old man," which according to the 62-year-old A. C. would require 80 or better.

Then there's A. C. Jr., 35, who is capable of shooting in the same class.

Dad laments, rather proudly, "we used to go around Lakewood in 61 or 62 consistently." All three boys attended different colleges. Don, of course, played on three consecutive national collegiate championship teams at North Texas State. Ben, now in the advertising business, graduated from SMU, and A. C. Jr. from Oklahoma State.

A. C. Jr. is a member of the country club construction firm currently in the process of building Buckingham Country Club where Don is under contract.

Buckingham is to be an extensive layout offering, among other things, horseback riding, and 45 holes of golf.

The first 27 holes of golf are scheduled to be completed this fall at which time Don will curtail his tournament activities to spend about six months of the year at his club. The final 18 is to be ready next summer.

"I'll play about 20 tournaments a year," Don says, "once the club is open for play. We will have about 2,000 members, so you can see I'll be rather busy. Of course this depends on how I'm playing and the amount of business I have at the club."

Texas Electric Service Co. Asks Rate Changes

Texas Electric Service Co. Monday night requested an adjustment in rates for its services in Eastland which would lower the cost of electricity to some local users and increase the cost to others. Overall the adjustment would mean an average increase to residential users of from 2.8 to 3 percent, according to Frank Sayre, district manager.

Sayre, in making the request, said the company had experienced nine years of inflation and increasing costs and must ask approval in the adjustment. "The adjustment is nominal and is made necessary by the continuing increases in the costs of materials and of operation generally, the burden of increased taxes, and the substantial increase in the cost of gas fuel," Sayre declared.

Texas Electric also will have a residential water heater service rate and a seasonal heating service rate. All residential demand meters will be done away with.

Texas Electric Service Co. is actually operating at the same rate today in Eastland that they did in 1946. The company, during that period, voluntarily gave the city a reduction in rates, but later had to raise their rates back up to the 1940 level. That last increase in rates came in 1951, 10 years ago.

Commissioners heard Sayre's explanation of the request and the first reading of the ordinance was held. A final reading and vote on the rate change will come at the March meeting of the commission.

In explaining the request Sayre told commissioners that in order to meet increasing demands for electric service in the area the company had to earn a rate of re-

turn adequate to attract the necessary new capital.

"We regret the necessity of our request in light of the fact that we have voluntarily reduced rates many times in the past," said Sayre. "In fact, the only upward adjustment we have had was in 1951."

Sayre explained that the company has been able to offset inflation to a considerable extent by reason of increased sales, by larger and more efficient generating

units which the widespread system makes possible and by the best skill available.

He said the company anticipates a return of 5.57 percent in 1961, which is a lesser rate of return than the company is allowed to earn.

Sayre pointed to rising costs in gas used by the company, to increased payrolls and to higher costs of equipment as reasons for the rate change.

The Telegram Speaks

Congressman Can't Talk Just As Citizen Once He Takes An Oath

(An Editorial)

Just as it is impossible for an employer to talk to his employees merely as a friend and not as their boss, it is impossible for a U. S. congressman to talk to the Texas Highway Commission as a private citizen and not a member of the United States House of Representatives.

Rep. W. R. Poage of Waco knows this as well as anyone. And Rep. Poage knew full well the meaning behind his official protest of the routing of Highway 6 through Eastland. A few years ago Bob Poage could have made his protest to the Commission and it would have gained little if any attention. Today, however, the Commission must take into consideration Federal highway appropriations so a United States congressman's protest gains a powerful hearing.

Rep. Poage would prefer to see Highway 6 rerouted around Eastland. Now this is interesting, to say the least. We wonder why Bob Poage didn't object to the same highway going through the city of Waco. It is interesting to us to note that the highway follows Valley Mills Drive in Waco until it hits La Salle Street. The highway, by the way, crosses over Lake Waco. Surely a more economic route could be found.

Cong. Poage has no right to step in and kill a valuable improvement for the city of Eastland simply because his mother-in-law doesn't like a highway in front of her home. His mother-in-law has every right to protest as a private citizen, but when Poage took office as U. S. congressman he should have realized it is not an office to be used for personal gain.

We appreciate the fact that Poage seems to think he knows more about highway construction than all the engineers in the Highway Department. However, we are inclined to think that he is slightly overrating himself.

By the way, if you're interested, the following highways go through Waco, where Poage is supposed to concern himself: 6, 31, 77, 81, 299, 340, 434 and 1637.

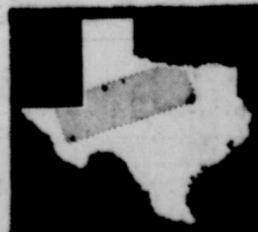
