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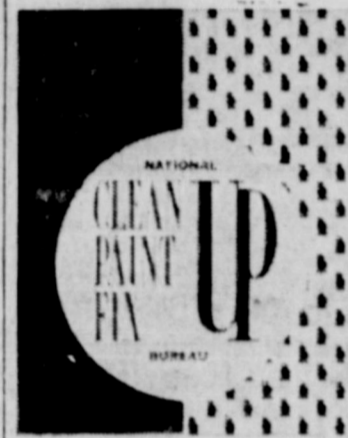
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## C-C Directors Meet Today

An Eastland County man has been named the winner of a Johnson outboard motor in Johnson Motor's nationwide All-Family Boat Show contest.

Charles Freyschlag, Eastland insurance agent, who attended the recent boat show at Pipkin's Sport Center in Eastland during March, is the winner of a 1963 three-horsepower Johnson engine.

The motor won by Freyschlag was one of 28 motors awarded to visitors of All Family Boat Shows held at Johnson dealerships throughout the United States.

## Flag Day Proclaimed; Patriotism Is Keynote

In a proclamation issued this week County Judge Scott Bailey specified Friday, June 14, as Flag Day in Eastland County.

His proclamation read in part: "Whereas, the white stripes of peace fenced in by the red stripes of war, represent the 13 original Colonies that forced a great kingdom

to bow in humble submission at the feet of American valor. The 50 white stars of progress scintillating in the field of blue justice, are emblematic of the growth and glory of our Republic and Whereas this great flag heralds no pomp of royalty, but to be born beneath it is to be the child of a king. Our glorious, victorious, immortal flag, flying no signal of hate, possessing no greed for gold or lust for power, tho unfurled in many a hard fought cause, has never yet known defeat or dishonor."

Eastland Mayor Don Pierson issued a similar proclamation earlier.

A special patriotic ceremony under the direction of Mrs. Marene Johnson, local Postmaster, will be held at 10 a. m. on the Postoffice lawn.

Preceding the 10 o'clock ceremonies will be a Minute-Man Breakfast at the Lone Cedar Country Club. Reservations for the buffet will be required.

Flag Day festivities will be concluded with an old-fashioned community picnic at the City Park at noon.

Highlight of the day will be the unveiling of the six by 10 ft. stamp mural designed and created by Mrs. Johnson.

The mural, which will be located in the front of the Eastland Post Office, includes copies of every stamp ever used by the United States and signatory stamps from all of the United Nations.

A portion of the mural is dedicated to Eastland County Pioneers and famous landmarks.

Special arrangements have been made for the annual festivities including the erection of a 50 ft. flag pole on the Post Office lawn. The pole was erected by R. M. Sneed Contracting Co.

Several other attractions are planned for the day's celebration.

Postal officials from Washington, D.C., Dallas and other points in Texas are expected for the events.

Lt. Bridwell Takes 2nd Lone Cedar Title

Charles Bridwell, the poised Army lieutenant from Coleman, won his second successive Lone Cedar Invitation Tournament here over the Country Club Course Sunday.

The former University of Texas links ace took out North Texas University's smooth-swinging Don Wilson, 2-up, in the meet finals.

Bridwell advanced into the final round by virtue of a 3 and 2 triumph over Eastland's James Townzen while Wilson whipped Cisco's Don Johnson 4 and 2, in the semifinals.

The consistent-hitting Bridwell had to come from behind to win the top trophy. He was 2-down after eight holes but drew even by knocking in a difficult putt on No. 11 and never trailed thereafter.

Wilson ran in a 25-footer on No. 15 to draw even with his slightly older opponent but Bridwell won No. 16 to take a 1-up lead, then halved No. 17 and won 18 to prevail.

Bridwell, who was a cool operator in clutch situations, was 2-over par for the match. He shot the front side in 2-over 37, then came in with an even par 35. Wilson was 1-over on the front nine and 3-over coming in.

Wilson went 1-up in the match when Bridwell took a bogey 5 on No. 4. But Wilson bogeyed No. 5, a 430-yard 4-par, while Bridwell got down in regulation strokes to draw even.

Wilson then quickly took a 2-up margin by winning both 7 and 8 with pars. Bridwell reversed the trend on No. 9, winning the hole with a par to make the turn 1-down.

The turning point came on No. 11 for the Coleman native. He skulled his tee shot on the 400-yard hole and was short and to the right of the green with his approach, the ball coming to rest in some high grass. But Bridwell chipped 12 feet past the pin, then ran in his putt on the sloping green to win the hole with a par

chance to go ahead on No. 13, two putting from four feet. And on No. 14 Don's drive hit a rocky surface and bounded out of bounds, forcing a two-stroke penalty. Bridwell easily won the hole with a pickup birdie to take the lead for the first time in the match.

But it was short lived as Wilson came back to run in his 25-footer on No. 15 to draw even. Then on No. 16, which is a difficult 230-yard 3-par that extends almost to the surface of Lake Leon, Wilson suffered the fate of three-putting after taking two strokes to get on the green and again fell behind.

The par halved No. 17 with pars and Bridwell capped off his performance by winning 18 with a par after Wilson's bold birdie putt from some 50 feet rolled 10 feet past the cup.

Bridwell was actually hotter in the semis against Townzen, where he went 3 under par and collected four birdies.

James Johnson, Abilene's straight-hitter, defeated Coleman's Eddie Smith, 2 and 1, to win the consolation championship. Johnson was 2 over par for the match.

## BRIAN POCOCK, 15, SHOT; SERVICES TODAY IN GORMAN

Brian Pocock, 15-year-old Gorman youth, was killed after being accidentally shot with a .22 caliber pump rifle at his home on Monday.

Funeral services will be held at 3 p. m. today (Thursday) in the First Methodist Church in Gorman with Rev. Robert Sanders officiating. Interment will be in the Oaklawn Cemetery

there under the direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Mr. and Mrs. Ted Pocock of Gorman, parents of the youth, said that Brian and his brother, David, 9, were playing with the gun which was thought to be unloaded.

The bullet entered the boy's body about two inches above the right breast and lodged inside, according to an examining physician.

Mrs. J. D. Caldwell, Justice of the Peace, ruled the death accidental and said that David was holding the gun when it discharged.

Both parents were in an adjoining room when the accident occurred.

The Pococks are natives of England and have been residents of Gorman for the past three years. They have been in Texas for four years. Mr. Pocock is employed by the Gorman Peanut Co.

Surviving are his parents; two brothers, Deryck and David; and three sisters, Mari, Brenda and Martha, all of the home.

## Equalization Board Dates Set June 25-26

Eastland County Commissioners passed a resolution at their regular Monday meeting which gives notice that the court will convene and sit as a board of equalization on Tuesday, June 25, and Wednesday, June 26.

The board will be in session from 10 a. m. until 3:30 p. m. with noon recess on both days.

Purpose of the board is to see that every person has rendered his property at a fair market value and shall have power to send for persons, books and papers, swear and qualify persons, to ascertain value of such property and to lower or raise the value on the same.

The motion was made by Commissioner Tip Arther and seconded by Commissioner Buck Collins.

## Medical Assistant School of Texas Now in First Session

The first class of the Medical Assistant Schools of Texas is now in session.

The course of study being pursued by the class is the "medical assistant, basic." This is a course designed to be completed in three months. The student, after having satisfactorily completed the course, will be qualified to fill the basic needs common to most all Doctor's offices and clinics in the smaller town.

"This course was set up to fill in intense need experienced by practicing physicians," said Dr. S. J. Jones, director of the school. "Universal 'standard procedure' technique is emphasized."

The school has branched out, even in this early development stage to incorporate a larger area in which to serve.

The Medical Assistant Schools of Texas has joined with the Industrial Engineering Institute and will cover all of the Southwestern states through the other organization.

The school now will offer, in addition to their originally planned resident courses, extension courses. Under the ex-

tension course plan, the student may do much of the basic work at home through correspondence. This will be the first phase.

The second phase will be classroom work which will be held in the town in which the student lives. (Class rooms have now been established in Fort Worth and Dallas). After the classroom work is finished, the student will be brought here for the third and final phase. In the final phase, which will take about a month, the student will be able to put to practical use the knowledge acquired through the first two phases.

The school also plans to train clinic managers. The clinic managerial course would appeal to young men for this would be career work. The course will include medical inventory and all phases of business required to make a good clinic function properly.

and June (17 per cent). Biggest weeks will be those of Aug. 4 and July 14.

"The South is the country's most favored vacation area, according to the survey. It will attract 31 per cent of the pleasure travelers this year. The Midwest is second in vacation appeal, attracting 18 per cent. The Southwest, Rocky Mountain States and New England follow with nine per cent. The Middle Atlantic State and West Coast come next with seven per cent and six per cent respectively. Foreign travel will account for 11 per cent, with Canada receiving seven per cent of that figure.

"In individual state popularity, Colorado ranks first, chosen by 8.5 per cent, Michigan is second with seven per cent and Florida's 6.8 per cent gives it third place.

"Sightseeing will be the vacationing aim of 44 per cent of the country's pleasure travelers. Swimming or boating will occupy 24 per cent, fishing 21 per cent and camping 10 per cent.

"Of the 90 per cent in the survey who said they would vacation this year, 92.5 per cent plan to drive. This is a 7.5 per cent increase in vacationing by auto over last year.

"Motels will furnish 54 per cent of the vacationers' housing, with hotels and campsites accommodating 15 and 10 per cent, respectively.

"Food will take the biggest bite in the average vacation budget of \$514, which breaks down this way:  
"Food — 31.1 per cent, \$159.85.

"Housing — 29 per cent, \$149.06.  
"Transportation — 26 per cent, \$133.65.  
"Entertainment — 13.9 per cent, \$71.44"

**Come And Get It Breakfast**



Folks won't be pecky coming 'round for an outdoor breakfast when the shout "Come and get it!" sounds.

Here is a menu and a recipe for an out-of-doors breakfast from a Southern Illinois man who has presided at many a grill. This is a quick-and-easy escape "from it all." The picnic basket is packed with doughnuts and instant coffee. Centers of bread slices are cut out with a three-inch cookie cutter ahead of time. Slices and cut-outs travel to the picnic site in the bread wrapper. Into the basket at the last minute goes the bacon, the carton of eggs and the cans of frozen orange juice.

While the fire is readying the coals for cooking the eggs, the water for the instant coffee comes to a boil. Folks can enjoy their orange juice all the while.

To fashion BACON AND EGG POKEYS for six, do this: Brown 12 bacon slices on one side on a griddle. Drain off the fat. Turn bacon, criss-crossing pairs. Place slices of bread atop the bacon. Break an egg into each hole. When done on one side, turn. Toast bread on other side and finish cooking the egg. Brown the bread centers at the side as the "pokeys" cook. Serve immediately to eager eaters.

**Ben Bradford is Struck Constable for 22 Years**

By Grover Lee of Strawn

STRAWN — It takes more — a lot more — than the traditional badge, a gun, husky physique and raw courage to make a good officer.

And Ben F. Bradford, rugged 6 foot 2, 250-pounder who proudly wears the badge of Constable, Precinct 5, Palo Pinto County, has most of that and a "lot more" essential for maximum efficiency in law enforcement.

"A good officer, in my opinion, also sets an example for others by his character, integrity and personal conduct," the veteran lawman believes. "He treats everybody alike, shows no special favoritism — a law violator is a law violator, no matter who he is or where he's from. Courteous but firm and impartial enforcement command respect and get real results."

Constable Bradford, whose good health and excellent physical condition belies his age of 59, offices in the radio-equipped City Hall, Strawn, with Justice of Peace Leslie Weaver, retired lawyer who was employed by the federal government in Washington, D. C. for many years. The partnership, working smoothly for over a decade, is far from jocularly reported as dispensing its own brand of swift justice comparable to history's famed "Law West of the Pecos."

"They handle their own affairs without interference, with exception of few occasions when assistance is requested, because their devotion to duty and efficiency is respected and has earned the confidence of all law enforcement agencies — county, state and federal."

"We just try to do our job the very best we know how," Constable Bradford says. "Dependable, understanding law enforcement is our full-time business — 24 hours a day." The friendly Strawn officer, who first began his career in 1941 as a deputy sheriff, handles up to 40 cases a month. Bulk of his official action comes weekends when fun-loving crowds and care-free imbibers jam numerous taverns and clubs in the Strawn-Mingus area.

Troubles in night spots and taverns, however, have practically been completely eliminated over the past decade due to vigilant surveillance, firm enforcement, speedy arrest, fast court action and stiff fines.

There have been no bootlegging cases in Precinct 5 in years. Legalized sale of alcoholic beverage has wiped out illicit liquor traffic in his area, the Strawn officer declares.

During his 22-year span of service behind the badge, only one of scores of burglaries remains unsolved. And that breakin netted the unapprehended culprit a meager \$4.00. The Strawn justice court operates with like efficiency. Over the same period, the record of convictions for Justice of Peace Weaver and his two predecessors — the late C. E. Maxwell and Marshall Cook — is a perfect 100 per cent. And there've been only two jury trials in

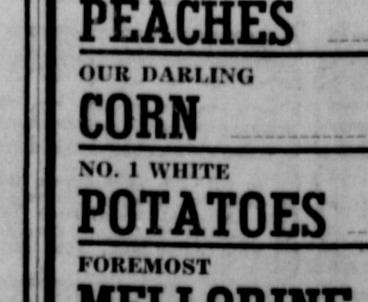

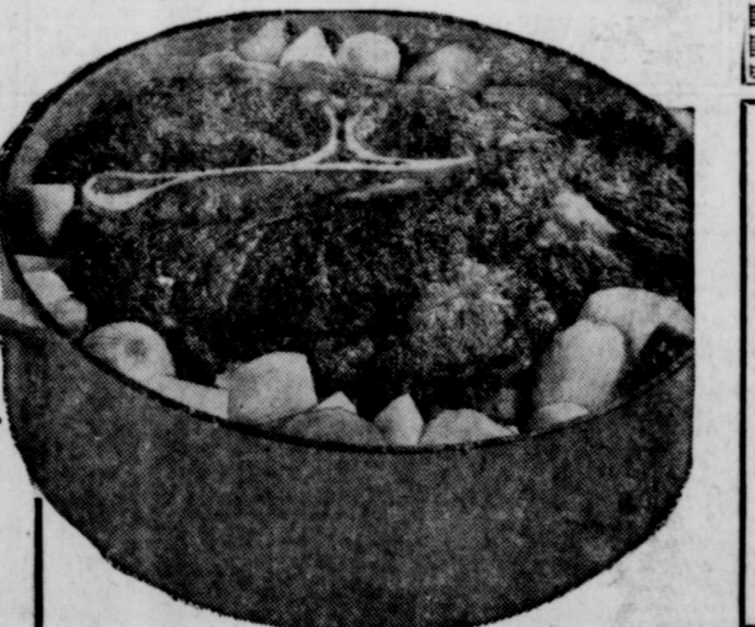

## Former Residents Playing Key Role In Cancer Research

A team of Oklahoma State University scientists, including former residents of Cisco, Eastland and Abilene, has tackled the riddle of cancer from two points, with financial support from the American Cancer Society for the third successive year.

One of the attacks is being directed by Dr. Franklin R. Leach, former Ciscoan and a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University and the University of Texas. The other is under the management of Dr. Norman N. Durham, formerly of Eastland and graduate of North Texas University and University of Texas.

Assisting Dr. Leach is Mrs.

Dixie McPherson Gimlin, former Abilenian who attended McMurry College prior to earning bachelor's and master's degrees at Oklahoma State. Also on Dr. Leach's investigating squad are Mrs. Evelyn Davis, Mrs. Myrtle Hope and Jim Rupp, all of the OSU Department of Biochemistry.

Two grants were received from the American Cancer Society for the two projects which started March 1. They were for \$12,420 and \$11,316, bringing to \$66,000 the amount the ASC has invested in the research at OSU.

Dr. Leach's research is concerned with establishing a system for genetic analysis in

from an outside source associate themselves with the DNA present in the cells. In certain cases, there can be an exchange of the information which is contained on the "blueprint" so that the daughter cells have different properties. This is being investigated through the use of a false DNA which contains a component not found in nature.

One possible action in the cancer process, said Dr. Leach, is that the nucleic acid has its controlling mechanism changed so that the cell no longer knows when to stop growing. If a means can be found to introduce functional DNA into cells, it might be possible to re-introduce the controlling mechanism and thus overrule the cancer-causing DNA.

The work headed by Dr. Durham involves the way in which false "building blocks" of protein can interfere with the normal formation of protein.

DNA in the cell nucleus directs the formation of protein from its blueprints, but does not do "on-the-job direction." This is left to the "shop foreman," RNA, or ribonucleic acid.

The instructions for the building of protein are sent in code in which the combination of three letters means one of the 20 specific building blocks. However, the DNA has several combinations which mean the same block, the scientists said. Therefore, an attempt is being made to determine if all codes for one block will work for its false building block or amino acid analogue.

Another aspect of the problem is to introduce new coded messages into a cell to see whether the cell will build that kind of structure.

Assisting Dr. Durham, a microbiologist, with his studies are Dr. Leach, Thomas Dunn, Semih Erhan and Mrs. Lulla Northrup, all of the Department of Biochemistry.

Dr. Leach, 30, was born in Gorman and was reared in Cisco. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Leach, 1310 Bliss, Cisco. He attended Cisco Junior College 1 year, got his B. A. degree summa cum laude from Hardin-Simmons in 1953, and his Ph. D. in biochemistry and bacteriology from the University of Texas in 1957. He was a research fellow in the medical sciences 1957. He was a research fellow in the medical sciences at the University of California two years before joining the OSU biochemistry faculty in 1959. He is the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Kincaid, 1474 Minter, Abilene.

Dr. Durham, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Durham, 909 S. Seaman, Eastland, holds the B. S. and M. S. degrees from NTSU and received the Ph. D. in bacteriology and biochemistry from the University of Texas in 1954. He has been on the OSU faculty since then.

Dr. Durham is professor of bacteriology and Dr. Leach is assistant professor of biochemistry.

mammalian cells grown in tissue culture. The advantage in using tissue culture cells, he explained, is that material may be obtained by a painless procedure of scraping the skin of even a human being. A genetic analysis then can be made in only a few weeks instead of the usual years of work done with higher animals.

DNA, the short term for deoxyribonucleic acid, is the blue-

print contained in a cell's nucleus which directs the building of all components of the cell. This substance is the key to life and is what determines heritable characteristics.

DNA isolated from viruses can cause infection by itself, Dr. Leach said. Both Dr. Sabin of Cincinnati and Dr. Rubin of the University of California recently reported on the persistence of nucleic acids from tumor-causing viruses in normal cells which have been changed to cancer cells.

From these cancer cells, they were unable to isolate the virus, although the virus was required originally to produce the tumor.

One possibility, Dr. Leach said, is that the cancer-causing nucleic acid associates itself with the cell's normal DNA and reproduces itself at the same speed that the cell does. This might be one reason for the difficulty in isolating viruses from human cancers.

The fact that the viral nucleic acid can associate itself with DNA means that one should be able to determine its position in the cell's DNA when a genetic analysis system is determined. Once its position is known, it may be possible to use specific treatments to destroy the viral DNA, he pointed out.

Also under study is the manner in which nucleic acids

June is generally the month when "Old Bossy" gets busy and starts producing more milk than most any other 30-day period of the year.

This annual cycle triggers a fast response in the American Dairy Association which immediately gets busy making America "milk conscious". The purpose is two-fold: the milk industry wants to prevent a seasonal glut on the market and it also wants the public to do what's good for it anyhow — use more dairy products in the daily diet.

A surprising number of our citizens are "overfed and undernourished" despite the fact that the United States has the most abundant supply of foodstuffs in the world. Most diets that are insufficient in proper vitamins could easily be corrected by the regular addition of dairy products — especially milk and cheese.

Texas is traditionally a "deficit area" in milk production, requiring the importation of dairy products from other states. But even here, supplies are plentiful and economical and a "must" for the health of the average family.

In 1963, milk production may reach a level of about 126 billion pounds, or enough to supply every man, woman and child in the U. S. with about a quart of milk a day. Milk is fundamental in any well-balanced diet — particularly for children who are usually prone to fill up on candy and soft drinks when parents aren't looking. Our older citizens will find milk is their best and most economical source of calcium as well as a good source of protein — the building block of life.

In recognition of the dairy industry's contribution to America diets, the Texas Department of Agriculture is wholeheartedly and actively endorsing the "June Dairy Month" promotion.
