Future of Eastland Depends on What Is Done Today'

PIERSON speaks for our community to all with whom we come into contact — extolling the virtues of living and working in Eastland. I am very pleased that Eastland is going to try a summer water rate this year. Many citizens have stated that if we had a lower water rate, they would use a great deal more water, and the city would certainly show it in its green lawns which would be so attractive to visitors and potential new residents.

Essentially, our city government is of a caretaker type, having inherited a heavy debt load dating back to the days when Eastland was destined to be larger than Abilene.

Much of our income is already promised to retire the

past. This is one reason that your city government has been cautious in lowering the water rates. I have personally studied the rates for over a year to arrive at a new rate that would encourage greater use while at the same time, protect the income to the city.

After really studying everything that will concern this decision, I came to the conclusion that it is a "gamble" but a gamble that could help our community, and one that should be taken. There were no less than ten different plans under consideration, and almost as many projections as to the possible loss or gain to the city.

It all boiled down to trying one plan to see where the errors might be in our calculations. Some of the projections on city water income varied from as small as \$300 per summer month loss to a high of \$1,100 per summer month loss, and frankly, both of these figures can be off a good bit either way; it's the intangibles that can not be figured, such as incorrect or incomplete past records, the dryness of wetness of the summer months, the great water loss from Lake Leon to Eastland which is under investigation now, and the way you use the water that will now be available.

I personally urge that each of us use water to the greatest extent possible for the new summer rates are very reasonable.

We are also facing the possibility of Interstate Highway 20 bypassing Eastland to the south in the next few years, which seems to me absolutely wrong from the standpoint of the State and Eastland.

I believe it's a waste to build so many extra miles of highway, and as a taxpayer to all the divisions of government mentioned above, and as your representative of Eastland, I will do everything in my power to prevent that mistake from being made.

We have a good future in Eastland and by working together for our home town, we can look forward to an even better community.

I would like to hear from any of you concerning your ideas and suggestions.

91ST DISTRICT COURT

Nathan Curry Murder Trial Begins In Eastland Monday

By H. V. O'BRIEN Handsome Nathan Curry, who will be 18 in July, is charged with the brutal slaying, and will go on trial at 9:30 a. m.

Selection of a jury is expected to take most of the week. A total of 196 Eastland

County residents have been called as prospective jurors for the case.

The state is asking life imprisonment for young Curry.

District Attorney Earl Conner Jr. will prosecute and Curry will be defended by John Watts, noted Odessa attorney.

The courtroom is expected to be packed, considering the number of prospective jurors and spectators.

Judge W. J. Oxford of Stephenville will preside. Judge T. M. Collier invited Judge Oxford to hear the case in 91st District Court here, because of his (Judge Collier's) ill health.

There has been a seemingly endless series of legal ramifications in the case since the body of Mrs. Hussey, Cisco First Baptist Church secretary, was discovered in her simple white, frame house on June 29, 1961, by her pastor, the Rev. Jesse E. Cassle.

The 53-year old woman, who lived alone, had been stabbed 14 times and there were bruises on her head, leading investigators to believe that she had been struck about the head and face with a heavy object.

Death, however, was attributed to a stab wound in the woman's neck. Sand and several flowers were reported found on the floor beside the body.

Nathan, who lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Curry, only two doors away, signed a statement admitting the murder five days after the crime. He was 15 at the time, and a Cisco High School student.

Murder charges were filed against the youth Wednesday, July 5, 1961.

Prior to the arrest of Curry, however, during the five-day period, Cisco was the scene of intense investigations, news reporters and photographers. Upon request of Mayor John Webb and others, five crime specialists from Fort Worth came to Cisco to assist in the investigation.

During questioning, Nathan led police to a bronze flower

pot which was missing from the Hussey home.

Metropolitan newspaper accounts of the interrogation of young Curry, indicated that "he appeared to be in a groggy condition from medication for a migraine headache." One also said "The statement was taken after affects of the medication wore off." The boy was quoted as saying "I couldn't control myself."

He was taken to the Gatesville State School for Boys on August 9, 1961 after being declared a delinquent in Eastland County Court. (The county court is the designated juvenile court in this county.)

The murder charge was dismissed by District Attorney Conner, who substituted a burglary charge.

Curry remained at Gatesville until Saturday, January 26, this year, when he was released following a habeas corpus hearing, in which Judge T. L. Milburn, 90th District Court in Odessa, ordered him freed.

He was released on \$10,000 bond early in March this year, after a hearing in the district court here. He had been denied bond the day before in Judge Wells Dalton's Justice Court, where a new murder charge had been filed.

A motion for a change of venue was denied by Judge Collier in May after almost a week of testimony by witnesses, who were almost equally divided by those who believed Nathan could get a fair trial in this county, and those who believed that he could not.

A grand jury indicted Curry for murder in February.

Fingerprints on the planter box are expected to be key evidence for the prosecution in connection with reports from the Fort Worth Crime Laboratory.

Finale for the Day Camp will be an expense-paid trip to Six Flags Over Texas during the last week of the camp. A party and picnic will be held for the tennis members too, as well as a program-ending tournament, and awards ceremony.

Day Camp activities will include crafts, skills including swimming, archery, marksmanship (with BB guns), track and field and others, as well as group singing and citizenship sessions.

Flag Day Ceremonies, Festivities Announced

Plans are nearing completion for the annual Flag Day celebration in Eastland that will be under the direction of Mrs. Marene Johnson, Postmaster.

Celebrations will begin at 10 a. m. on Friday, June 14, at the local Post Office.

Unveiling of the Stamp Mural Window in the Post Office lobby, a seven year project of the local postmaster, will make this Flag Day a double feature. The mural is a pictorial history of our government, painstakingly woven into a story of our heritage with postage stamps and imprints. A special cachet for the mural will be available.

In keeping with the occasion, the local Post Office Department is using a special Flag Day cancellation through June 14. Imprinted on the cancellation is "Eastland Flag Day, June 14, 1963".

Many flags will be the order of the day with the four

branches of the military, both men and women, a color guard, Explorer Scouts, who will carry the Six Flags of Texas, and a parade of bands. The spacious post office lawn with the 40 foot flag of blooming flowers, the Oriental Garden and the Lion statue holding Ben Franklin's Creed, "Fear to do ill and you need fear nought else", will add atmosphere for the day.

Also on the agenda are welcome addresses and introductions, presentation, acceptance and raising of the flag, the National Anthem and the Pledge of Allegiance.

On hand for the occasion will be General Services Administration Officials including the following: David S. Phillips, Administrator of Region Seven; James B. Riley, Director; and G. F. Carlson, Area Manager.

Bell Telephone Reduces Rate

Reduced long distance telephone rates for most evening station-to-station calls after 9 p. m. within Texas will be introduced by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company on June 15, Johnny Rogerson, manager of the company announced.
The new rates will provide a maximum charge of 80 cents for a three-minute call anywhere within the state, he said.
Reductions of up to 50 cents on the longest calls within Texas will result from the new schedule.
Along with this reduction there will be a slight increase in most person-to-person calls within the state, Mr. Rogerson announced. This will amount to five cents in the basic person-to-person rates on most day and evening calls.
The new reduced station-to-station rates for three-minute calls will fall into three brackets, according to Mr. Rogerson.
Calls of 83 to 202 miles will cost 50 cents, a reduction ranging from five to 25 cents under present rates.
Calls of 203 to 360 miles will cost 60 cents, a reduction of 20 to 40 cents.
Calls of 361 miles or more will cost 80 cents, a reduction of 20 to 50 cents.
Station-to-station rates will not be reduced on calls made between 6 p. m. and 9 p. m., nor will the reductions apply on collect calls or on calls charged to a third telephone.
Here are several typical three-minute calls between Texas cities as examples of the reductions for "after 9" station-to-station telephoning:

Dallas-Brownsville — \$1.10 .80
Houston-Amarillo — \$1.20 .80
Lubbock-San Antonio 1.00 .60
Beaumont-Austin — .80 .60
Tyler-Dallas — .55 .50
Interstate rates on station-to-station calls after 9 p. m. were announced early in April.

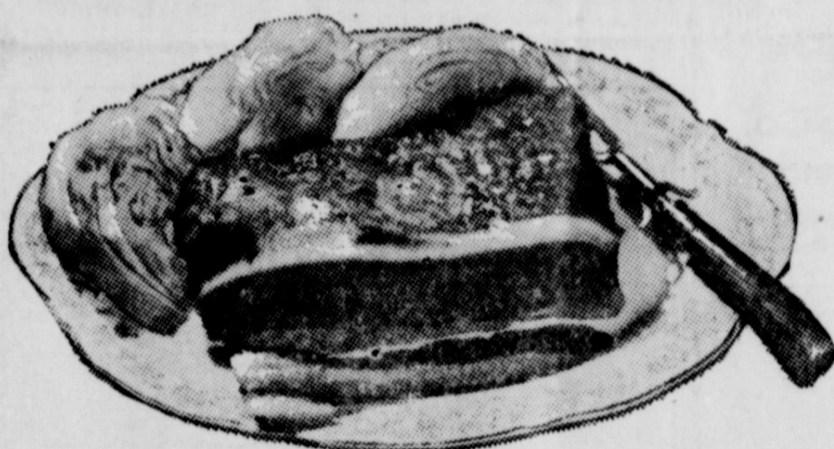

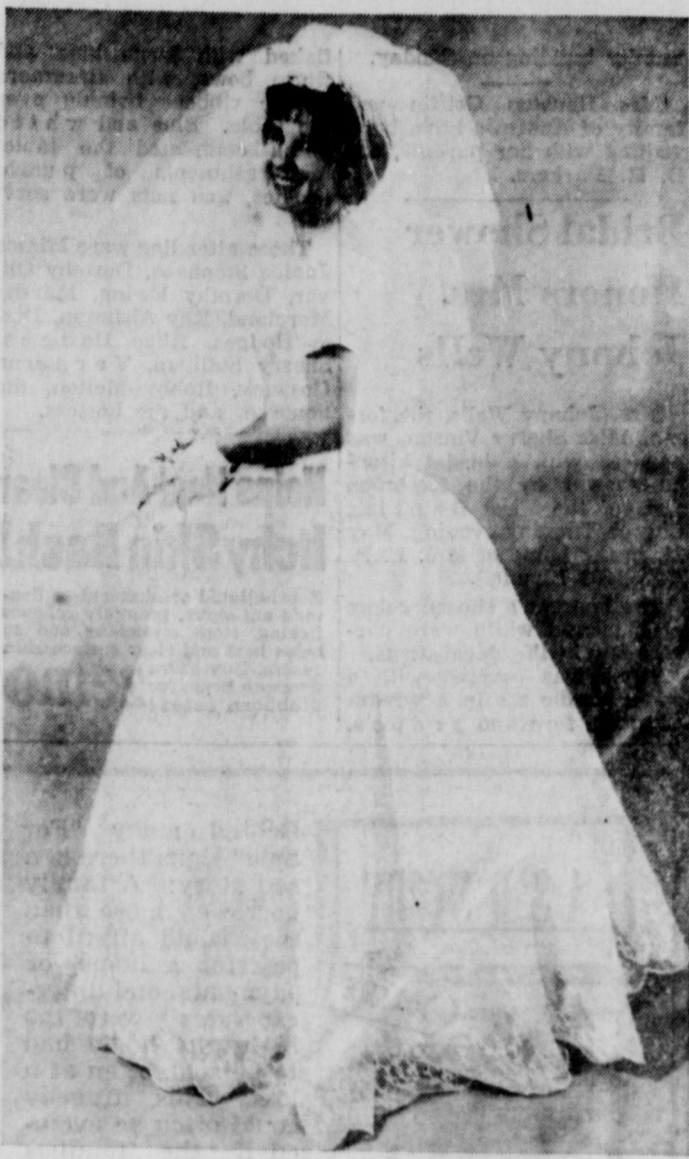

**RE-WEAVING MAY BE
THE ANSWER**

What do you do when a live cigarette ash burns a hole in your newest dress or suit?

Don't relegate the garment to the ragbag if it has a burn or tear.

Reweaving is an ancient art, and many professional dry cleaners offer a re-weaving service.

Re-weaving originated in the fabric mills of Europe where it was used to repair defects in new bolts of cloth.

There are several terms used to describe re-weaving, such as French weaving, in-weaving, piece weaving, and over-weaving. Basically, the two best known methods are French and piece weaving.

Both of these methods can be invisible as long as the weaver duplicates the exact weave of the fabric and as long as the correct method is used for each type of damage such as moth damage, acid burns, worn areas, burned areas, or tears.

In French weaving, the weaver takes new thread from the seams of the garment to be mended. Using a sewing needle, he replaces each damaged yarn one by one. In piece weaving, the weaver cuts out a square piece of the fabric from an unexposed area of the garment to be mended.

He ravel's out all four sides of the piece, leaving one-half inch fringe around all of it.

Re-weaving is not inexpensive because of the time and skill needed to do a good job. It can save an expensive garment from the ragbag, and it certainly is cheaper than replacing the item.

New federal labeling rules requiring disclosure of all materials used in making shoes have been announced recently by the Federal Trade Commission.

The FTC said the rules will go into effect at the manufacturing level in 90 days and will apply both to labeling and advertising.

These were among the principal requirements: No trade name or coined name may be used if it falsely suggests shoes or slippers are made of a certain material.

For instance, it said, "non-leather materials may not be described as "dura-leather" or "barkhide".

If imitation leather is used, this must be disclosed through such statements as imitation leather shoeboard" or "outsole, innersole and linings composed of imitation leather".

If a leather material is embossed, dyed or otherwise processed to look like a different type of leather, the label must tell the actual type used.

For example, "simulated alligator made of split cowhide". All labeling disclosures must be made in the form of stamps, tags or labels fixed to the shoe in such a way that they will remain in place until delivered to retail customers.

All labels must be of the type that can be easily seen and understood upon casual inspection of the product.
