V. Cyrus Barcus Is Methodist Minister

V. Cyrus Barcus, new First Methodist minister, is the son of a family that has served as First Methodist minister for two years.

Before moving to Breckenridge, Dr. Barcus served as minister of the Central Methodist Church in Brownwood for eight years.

Other pastorates include those at the First Methodist Church, Taylor; First Methodist Church, Gainsville; Cavanaugh Methodist Church, Greenville; Waples Memorial Methodist Church, Denison; West University Place Methodist Church, Houston; Mulkey Memorial Methodist Church, Fort Worth; and the Lorena

Methodist Church, Lorena. He was graduated in 1933 from S.M.U. with the Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Divinity Degrees.

While pastoring in Brownwood, the Howard Payne College conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity upon him.

During his schooling at SMU he served as Director of the SMU Mustang Band and was previously coronet soloist with the famous Old Gray Mare Band and attended American Legion conventions in San Francisco, Calif., and St. Paul, Minn.

His twin brother, Edward R. Barcus, served as minister of the First Methodist Church in Sherman for 14 years and later District Superintendent of Methodist Churches in the Wichita Falls District. He was appointed this week as pastor of the Austin Avenue Methodist Church in Waco.

The honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity will be conferred by McMurry College at their August Commencement exercises.

His son is presently minister of the Methodist Church in Boyd.

The twin brothers are sons of the late Dr. Edward R. Barcus, early Methodist minister of Texas, who was among four of seven brothers who entered the ministry.

Their grandfather was also an early Methodist Circuit Rider who settled near Waco.

Mrs. Don Farnsworth, South Ward Elementary teacher, also resigned and has been accepted by the Fort Worth School System.

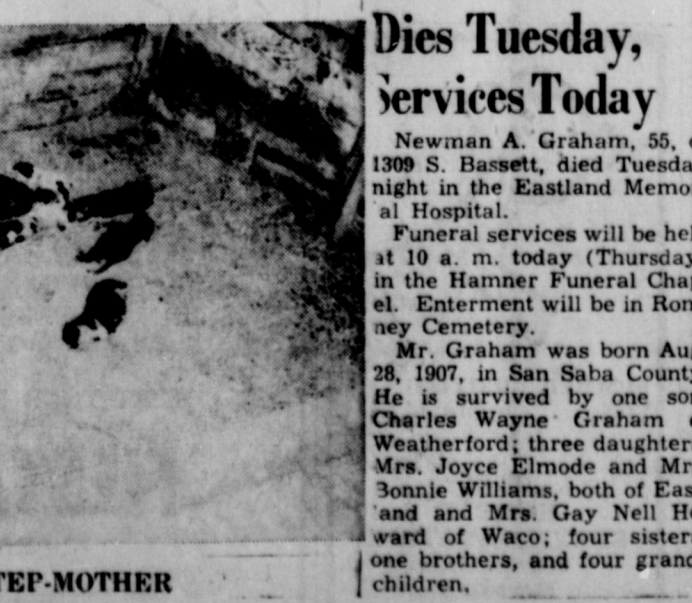

Ranger Wet Election Held 'Null And Void'

'Stamped' Ballots Cited As Reason

The liquor stores in Ranger apparently will be closing in about 30 days, after District Judge T. M. Collie declared the March wet vote null and void as the result of a "rubber stamp" Monday.

The hearing in the contested election got underway Monday morning in 91st District Court, and Judge Collie gave his ruling on a motion by the contestants immediately after noon recess.

During the morning session, Calvin Brown, election judge, was put on the stand by Attorney David Hooper of Abilene, and during testimony, admitted that at the time of the March election, he had not signed the ballots but instead had used a rubber stamp to affix his name to the ballots.

Hooper asked that the election be declared null and void, and Judge Collie took the motion under consideration.

Eastland Attorney Frank Sparks, representing the wet forces, gave notice of exceptions and of appeal following the judge's pronouncement.

It was assumed that with the March election so declared null and void, the circumstances are approximately where they were immediately after the commissioners court called the election. Therefore, it is expected that representatives of the wet group will appear before the court when it convenes at its next regular session and using the original petition, ask for another election.

Saturday, July 20, would appear to be the day most likely for the next vote in Ranger. If the court calls the election Monday, it must be within 30 days and not less than 20 days.

The March vote carried by 11 votes — 643 for and 632 against, the legal sale of all intoxicants within the corporate limits of Ranger, for off-premise consumption.

The dry forces in Ranger filed notice of contest of the election, alleging irregularities.

The contest hearing had been postponed once before, and Judge Collie overruled a motion by Sparks Monday asking for another continuance because of the absence of "unusual subpoenaed witnesses."

Complete City Audit Due After July 1

E. C. Johnson turned over an "almost complete" audit of the city's books to city commissioners during a regular meeting Monday evening.

The completed audit is to be ready after July 1, commissioners were told. Johnson said that he cannot complete his accounts receivable report until July 1, date on which all unpaid taxes become delinquent.

Mayor Pro Tem Frank Deaton and three other commissioners studied the reports briefly, and City Manager Lewis Tiner was given one copy with which, Johnson said, the city office force can begin setting up books now.

Guests of the local group were commissioners and the mayor of Cisco who came to listen and discuss the possible installation of a teletype communications network for law enforcement purposes.

Al Parsons, Abilene Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. representative, described the system to the two commissioners, and he was told that he'd get an answer in about ten days, after the city commission had had an opportunity to discuss the network with the county sheriff's department, but would consider one if Sheriff Lee Horn recommended it.

The system would furnish printed messages between law enforcement agencies here and other points in the state. Cost per unit would be about \$75 a month, Parsons said.

Judge Bailey also suggested that the Eastland commission and the sheriff's department need to work out suitable arrangements on the use of the county jail for "overnight drunks". He said that several city prisoners have been held at the jail, with fines paid to the city, resulting in unrecovered expense to the county jail.

Eastland commissioners present besides Deaton were M. A. Treadwell Jr., Dale Trout and Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. Cisco guests were Mayor John Webb, Police Chief Earnest Parkinson and Commissioners J. D. Yardley and Roy Benton.

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

Postmaster Johnson stressed the importance of all citizens of Eastland learning this city's ZIP Code and using it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, he said, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing," she said. "It should follow the city and state in addresses."

Stripes For the Park Towers?

(ED. NOTE — Mr. George Dolan, Star-Telegram columnist, had this to say after visiting Eastland last week.)

Mrs. Maureen Johnson-Johnson's face was pink Friday—partly from the heat, mostly from pleasure.

She's the creator of the 6 by 10-foot mural of stamps that was unveiled in Flag Day ceremonies at Eastland's postoffice.

She also is postmaster and, after a breakfast at the country club and before and after the unveiling and community picnic at the park, she had open house at the postoffice. Streams of people kept her occupied all day.

And, with the perverse timing of all mechanical things, her office air-conditioner chose that day to go on the fritz. It would have been an exhausting and frustrating experience for anyone but Mrs. Johnson-Johnson.

To her, it was wonderful-wonderful.

IF YOU CAN'T LICK 'EM, GLUE 'EM

One of her friends said the reason for her hyphenated surname is that one Johnson couldn't possibly do all the things she does.

Mrs. Johnson-Johnson has spent seven years, for instance on that spare-time stamp mural, which contains 11,217 stamps. It took 982 hours just to stick the stamps on. "I'll bet," someone said, "she has a sore tongue."

She doesn't — instead, she has a boxful of empty glue bottles.

The mural has an historical motif and there's not another like it anywhere. Its face value in stamps is \$855.20. Its real value is anyone's guess.

Perhaps, some day, the postmaster's masterpiece will be lugged about under armed guard, like the Mona Lisa.

That mural, though, with its stained-glass window appearance, wasn't the only attraction at Mrs. Johnson-Johnson's postoffice.

People exclaimed over her 40-foot-long living American flag on the lawn, all in growing flowers.

They noticed, too, that men staffing windows in the postoffice wore neat blue jackets.

BUILDING NEAT TOP TO BOTTOM

They couldn't miss her self-decorated office. Its most noticeable color is what she calls bittersweet — a Johnson-Johnson mixture of yellow and Chinese red paints.

Those who took the Cook's tour saw that the boiler room and basement, done in gunmetal gray, are just as neat as the upstairs. Mrs. Johnson-Johnson did a lot of the painting herself.

There couldn't be another postoffice like it — nor another postmaster like her.

But Mrs. Johnson-Johnson's

finishing that stamp mural was the homefolks wondering how she'll manage to spend her energy now.

Someone asked her about it during the basket lunch at Legion Hill Park.

At the time, she happened to be gazing intently at two rusty standpipe-type water towers there.

"Let's see," she was musing, "we can paint carousel strips at the top."

March election, and that they were only 20 years old at the time. However, the trio did hold exemption certificates, it was pointed out.

Judge Collie said in part of his decision:

"Article 821 of the Election Code reads as follows:

"Likewise, no ballot shall be counted if it is found to be fraudulent, but in the absence of a showing of fraud, the mere failure of the presiding judge to sign the ballots shall not make any such ballot illegal."

"This provision of the election laws was enacted by the 52nd Legislature in 1951.

"Article 666.36 of the Criminal Code, providing for liquor elections, reads as follows:

"The provisions of the general election law shall be followed in calling and conducting said election where not inconsistent herewith."

"Article 666.35 of the Criminal Code provides:

"No ballot shall be received or counted by the officers at such election that is not an official ballot and that has not the name of the presiding officer of such election written thereon in the handwriting of such presiding officer as provided by this Act."

"These two provisions of the Election Laws were enacted in 1953, two years after the enactment of the general election code, and being inconsistent with said election code, these provisions of the liquor laws must be followed.

"Under the provisions of Article 666.35, no ballot should have been received or counted.

"IT IS, THEREFORE, the order of the Court that said election is null and void, and the costs of this contest is charged against the intervenors, Calvin Brown and Raymond Bryan."

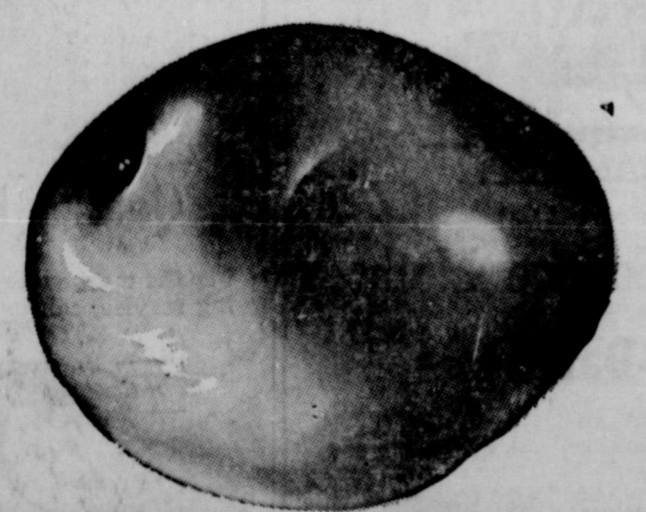

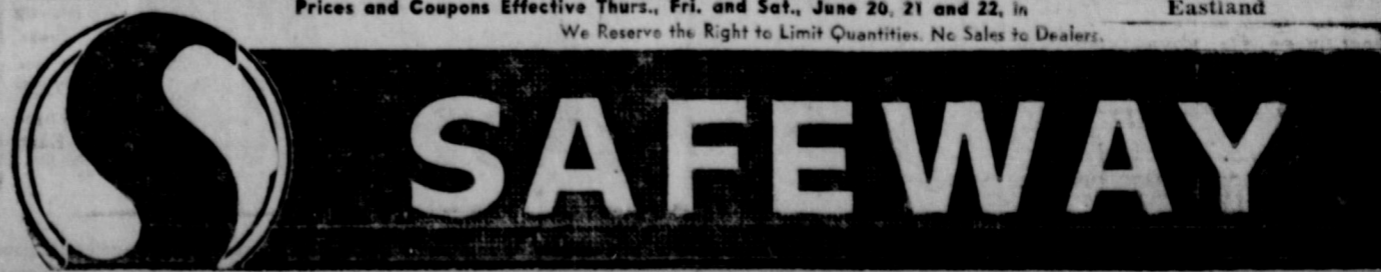

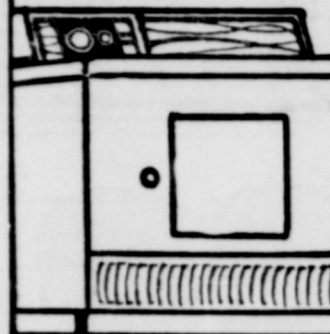
