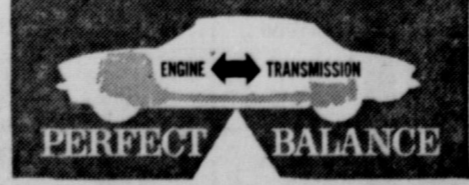

been noted for workers in the chromate producing industry, nickel smelting plants, and industrial plants where benzol fumes are present.

Other relationships which still defy explanation, according to

Dr. Heller, are the following:

1. Cancer of the uterine cervix is three to four times more common in non-Jewish women than in Jewish women.

2. Primary cancer of the liver, which is rare in this country, is a leading cause of death from malignant disease among South African Bantu Negroes.

Japanese in the United States

have higher death rates from cancer of the esophagus and stomach than do whites or other non-whites.

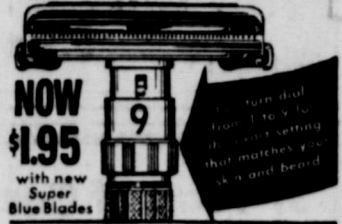
4. Navajo Indians appear to have less cancer as a whole, and, more specifically, less cancer of the breast, prostate, and lung than does the population in general.

A significant finding of a recent

study is the steady decline in incidence rates for cancer of the stomach in this country for both men and women during the past several decades. Stomach cancer occurs more frequently among persons in the lower socioeconomic groups, but does not seem to be associated with occupation.

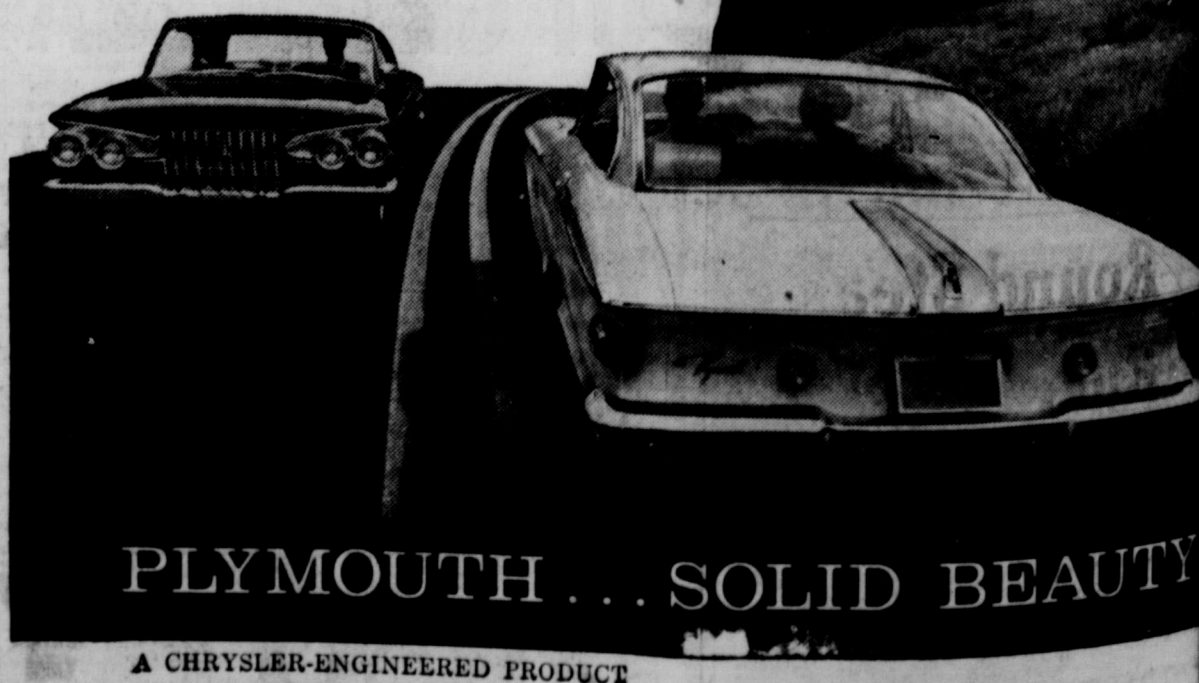

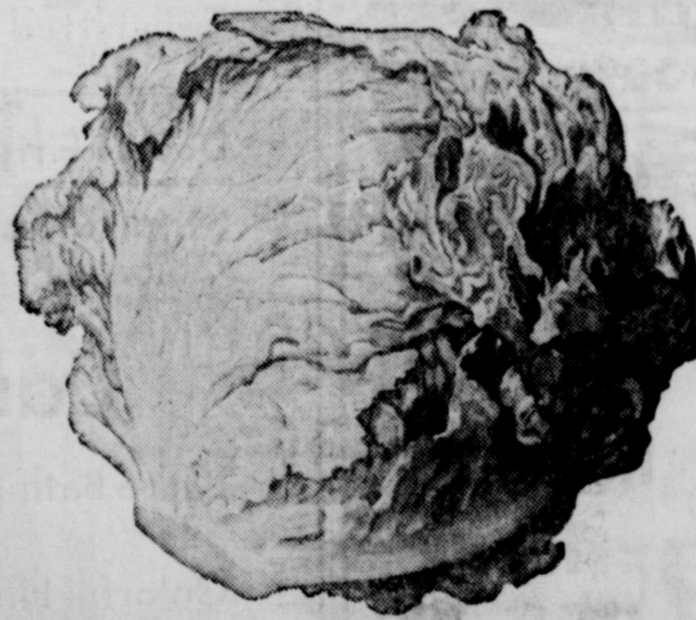
