Fort Worth Delegation To Plug Livestock Show

A bus load of Kiwanis Club members from Fort Worth will roll into Eastland about 3 p.m. Wednesday bearing Cowtown's personal invitation to attend the colorful 1961 Fort Worth Stock Show, scheduled Jan. 27 through Feb. 5.

The visiting Kiwanians have banded together from all the Fort Worth clubs to make up the booster group. With them will be Texas Shorty, a nimble-fingered youth who for the last two years has won clear title as World's Champion Fiddler.

Eastland already is well into plans for the coming Fort Worth show, having named Saturday, Jan. 28, as "Eastland Day" at the Stock Show, during which a delegation from the city will be honored at the rodeo. Miss Toni Horton, cowgirl sweetheart of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, will be introduced to the rodeo audience. The Eastland High School Band will give a band concert to Stock Show visitors before the matinee performance on "Eastland Day." A block of tickets has been sent to H. J. Tanner, manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

The 1961 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show rodeo will feature a rough-and-ready recreation of the wild chariot race from the movie "Ben-Hur". The four-horse white team originally driven by Charlton Heston will

challenge the film's four dappled greys at all 20 rodeo performances in Will Rogers Coliseum. There'll be more than 300 leading cowboys, 11 pretty ranch girl barrel racers, five trick riders, an unusual dog act, horse show events, cutting horse contests and much more.

Livestock fanciers will see more than 9,000 animals on exhibit from more than 30 states, including the world's largest Quarter horse show. Nine breeds of beef cattle will be represented, 10 of sheep and eight of swine. In all, Fort Worth Stock Show competitors will be gunning for approximately \$200,000 in awards.

Game Dept. Reorganization Set for Sept. 1

A complete reorganization plan, including a tentative budget, has been adopted by the Game and Fish Commission, following its regular meeting in Austin, Jan. 6. The plan is the first phase of a report of the Texas Research League, which was requested last year by the Commission.

Although the plan is expected to go into effect Sept. 1, the final decision on its adoption cannot be made until after legislative action, according to Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Commission.

The plan proposes that the State be divided into five regions, with each region to be complete within itself. However, general policies and administration would continue to come from the Austin office. Fish hatchery operations would be curtailed; the State would buy automobiles for game wardens, and a new system of selling hunting and fishing licenses direct to license deputies at a 4 per cent discount, are among the highlights of the recommendation.

Another project would be the funneling of \$200,000 game department money for the first biennium to provide recreational facilities in State-owned parks on the coast and on inland lakes.

The plan will call for the transfer of many of the present employees of the Commission, giving them more responsibility, with the addition of some new personnel. The change has been made necessary because of an increased population with increased demands on the facilities of the department, according to the Research League report.

Farmers' Social Security and Tax Meet Wednesday

The annual income tax and Social Security School for farmers and ranchers will be held in the county courtroom on the third floor of the courthouse in Eastland Wednesday, beginning promptly at 9:30 a.m.

Sidney L. Jenkins, area farm management specialist, Agricultural Extension Service, Stephenville will conduct the income tax school. Either R. R. Tuley Jr. district supervisor, or his assistant, Ralph Fisher, of the District Social Security office in Abilene, will discuss any new changes in the social security laws as it affects farmers and ranchers and answer questions about the old laws. The social security phase of the program will be given that morning.

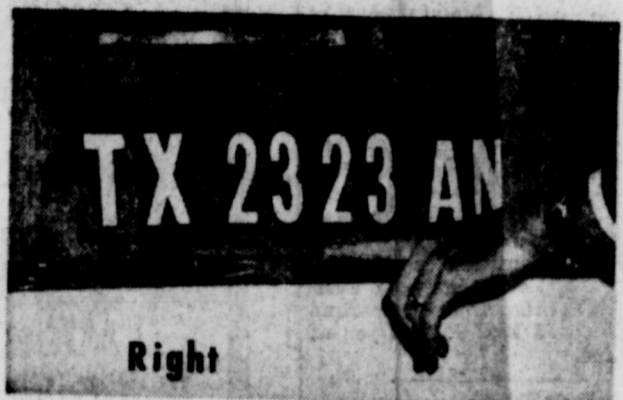
Those who attend are asked please be on time that morning. The meeting will be through about 3:30 p.m. with time out at noon for lunch. The school is free. There is no charge for attending.

Boat Owners Warned to Letter Boats Properly

"Texas boat owners may need a woman's opinion in choosing the colors for the registration numbers on the hulls," Bob Townsley, Director of the Texas Highway Department's Motor Vehicle Division said today.

"Boat number colors and boat hulls aren't contrasting enough to be readable—that's the problem. Too many boats are not numbered in accordance with the law—which requires a legible, good identification. The solid-color area of the boat number should contrast strongly with the hull of the boat. A good many of the boats we've looked at have white numbers on a white hull—and the thin colored border around the number doesn't make it show up.

Three things the Texas boat owner should do after getting his registration number from the Texas Highway Department. The solid-color area of the registration three-inch, block letters must contrast with the hull of the boat. The numbers should be located on each side of the forward half of the hull, as near to the stem as possible. Between each part of the number there should be a hyphen or a space. Example: TX-1234-AA or TX 1234 AA.

Townsley said the boat-numbering problem was nationwide, and that manufacturers who make boat numbers are helping out by increasing the size of the solid-color area of the boat number to a full three inches. Coast Guard and local enforcement authorities will give owners of boats whose numbers do not meet the federal numbering specifications until July 1961 to make necessary changes.

The Water Safety Act passed by the Fifty-sixth Legislature gave the Texas Highway Department the responsibility of administering the Act. Owners who power their boats with a motor in excess of ten horsepower are required to obtain a license. Numbers are issued by the Motor Vehicle Division of the Department.

Each school Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive an award pin, manufactured by Jostens and representing the slogan, "Home is Where the Heart Is." The examination papers of school Homemakers of Tomorrow will be entered in competition to name the state's Homemaker of Tomorrow.

Wharton College Joins Texas JC Conference

The newest member of the Texas Junior College Conference, Wharton Junior College, Wharton County Junior College, who became a member Saturday, may prove to be the salvation of football for the Texas Conference.

The Texas Junior College Conference issued an invitation to the Pioneer Conference schools, Wharton, San Angelo, Del Mar and Victoria, to join the TJCC at their spring meeting in 1960. At the fall meeting of the Pioneer Conference, Del Mar, San Angelo and Victoria announced their decisions to drop football at their schools. Wharton, the remaining school in the Pioneer Conference, then announced that they would accept the TJCC invitation.

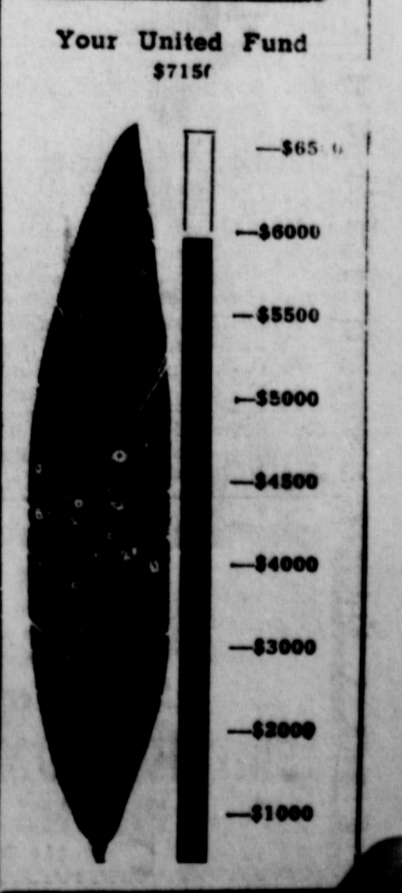
Wharton County Junior College was officially welcomed into the Texas Conference by the four football playing schools of the Conference, Ranger, Cisco, Blinn and Navarro, Saturday in Waco. The Texas Conference includes a number of other Texas Junior Colleges, none of which play football.

Wharton, under the Texas Conference rules, will not be eligible to compete for the conference championship in any sport their first year in the conference, but will play a regular schedule beginning with the 1961 season. Games won and lost by Wharton will not affect the other member schools conference standings.

The announcement of the other Pioneer Conference schools dropping football created a problem for the football playing members of the Texas Conference. This announcement left only ten football playing junior colleges in the East Texas Conference, which includes five of the colleges, Tyler, Paris, Texarkana, Kilgore and Henderson County, play a round robin schedule in conference play. Each school plays the other member schools two times each season, on a home to home basis. This practice of the East Texas schools a full schedule each season, but reduced a hardship on the other schools.

Conference in obtaining a schedule. The Texas Conference teams were having to rely on members of the Pioneer Conference and Oklahoma schools to schedule non-conference games. The dropping of football in the Pioneer Conference then stopped this practice. It left only the Wharton schools and senior colleges teams for the Texas Conference.

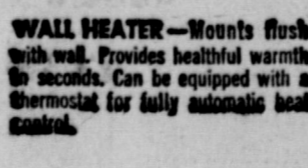
