National News Briefs

Two U. S. airmen were released Wednesday by the Soviet Union. The crewmen, Capt. Freeman B. Olmstead of Elmira, N. Y., and Capt. John R. McKone of Topeka, Kan., had been held by the Reds since July 1. President Kennedy said the U. S. gave no concession in return.

That missing Portuguese passenger liner is reportedly enroute to Angola in Portuguese West Africa with 600 passengers. The commandeered vessel was spotted by U. S. planes and the rebel master, Capt. Henrique Falva, offered to confer with U. S. officials aboard the ship.

Southwestern Peanut Growers Assoc. Has Remarkable History Since 1940

Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, with headquarters in Gorman, has played a key part in making the peanut industry in Eastland County and the entire southwest the huge venture it is today.

SWPGA was formed at Brownwood in 1937 by a group of leading producers for the purpose of enabling producers to more satisfactorily market their peanuts.

Charter directors responsible for the foresight, leadership and organizational ability necessary to incorporate and charter included W. B. Starr of Cisco, G. R. Sanders of Pearall, the late T. D. Robinson of DeLeon, M. M. Miller.

of Arlington, J. D. Sargent of Tolar and J. E. Brite of Pleasanton. Brite still serves as a director.

The Association was organized and chartered without capital stock and operated at the outset on the basis of loans obtained through the Houston Bank of Co-operators. Shortly thereafter, a contract was obtained with CCC allowing the Association to borrow unlimited funds with which to make the peanut price support program available to all Southwest producers. Under this plan, peanuts placed under loan and pledged to the Association served as collateral for the CCC loans.

Association by-laws were originally compiled to represent the wishes and best interest of the producers. From time to time amendments to these by-laws have been made in accordance with the wishes of the voting membership. Present by-laws provide that the

New Stamp Pays Honor To Range Conservation

By SCS Personnel People in the range country are to be especially honored by the issuance of a new range conservation commemorative postage stamp. This stamp is the eighth in a conservation series that has included four wildlife stamps, and in the last three years stamps featuring forestry, soil conservation and water conservation. The stamp will be released at local post offices Feb. 3.

The new stamp symbolizes the development of range conservation from the pioneer days of the open range to today's scientific management techniques. It is a split frame stamp. One part is a reproduction of "Trail Boss," a famous sketch by Charles Russell, and the other shows a modern range conservation scene.

The Soil Conservation Service and the Forest Service are both cooperating with the Post Office Department and the American Society of Range Management in the promotion of the stamp. The stamp will be first issued at the annual meeting of the Ranger Management Society in Salt Lake City, Utah on Feb. 2.

Postal Field Manager Tells Of Modernization

Dale Buckley, field service manager with the United States Post Office Department, spoke to Eastland Lions on "Postal Operations" at the club's regular weekly meeting Tuesday.

Buckley was introduced by Marcus O'Dell, who also introduced Mrs. Marene Johnson, postmaster. Buckley told Lions that the U.S. Post Office Department handles two-thirds of the world's mail. He told of constant improvements during the past few years and outlined the Department's modernization program. He predicted that 12,000 new offices would be built in the United States in the next few years on a lease program.

Te also told of costs of operating the Department. One of the costliest things, he said, is third class mail, which cost American's \$190 million last year.

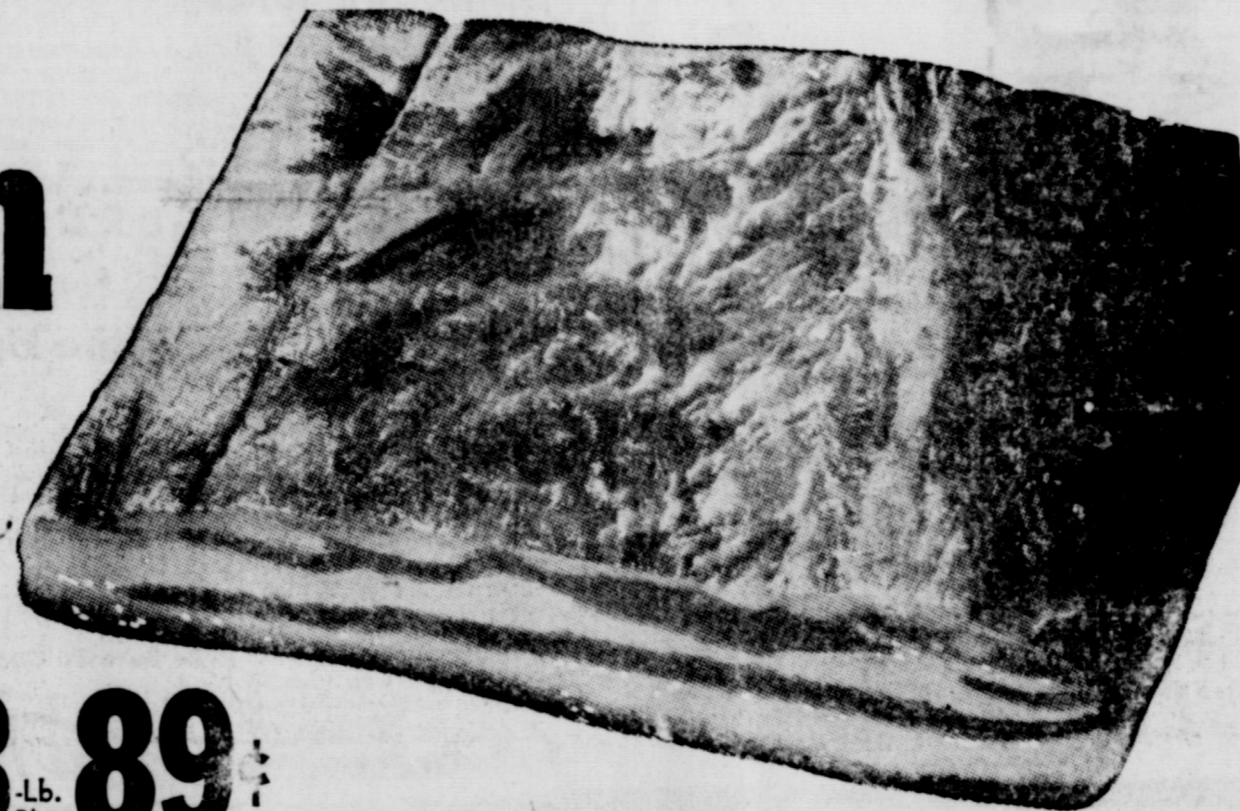
