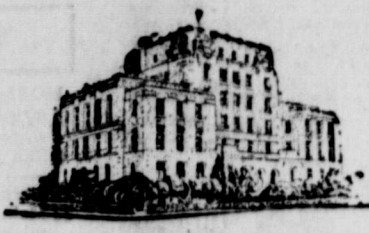

Increase In Commodities Predicted by Yarborough

Persons receiving surplus food commodities in Eastland County may soon be able to get canned pork and gravy, dried eggs and peas to supplement the previously heavily starch commodities available. Butter may also be added to the program.

The Telegram has been advised by Sen. Ralph W. Yarborough that President Kennedy has issued an executive order that the surplus food being given to needy persons be supplemented in order that all those drawing such help could receive enough for minimum nutritional requirements.

Sen. Yarborough said 68 counties and cities in Texas including Eastland County, are distributing surplus food packages to some 137,000 Texans.

In Eastland County 681 families receive USDA surplus foods. J. J. Porter Sr., administrator, said a total of 1,266 persons benefited from the distributions.

Porter estimates that the county has received surplus commodities valued at about \$254,262 in 39 issues since the program first began. The next issue dates in the county are Feb. 12-15. Surplus products now being distributed include dry milk, rice, flour, meal, lard and dry eggs.

The United States senator said the new commodities should be available within a few weeks.

"All of us recognize the great challenge before us to help build an economy where every man can earn for himself and his family the basic necessities of life—food, clothing, shelter, medical care and education," Sen. Yarborough said. "But while we search for new programs to help broaden employment and increase our national productivity, it is entirely fitting that we immediately move to alleviate hunger and malnutrition for families of those without work, the needy senior citizens and other unfortunates."

Mrs. Lusk praised workers for their time and effort and had high praise for the citizens of Eastland who "gave so generously."

Bailey is a freshman legislator.

Texas Farm Bureau Is Recognized by Daniels

Governor Price Daniel has cited agriculture as "the well-spring of our social and economic vitality" and set a statewide weeklong observance in recognition of agriculture's contribution to Texas life.

In a proclamation signed Jan. 12, the Texas governor designated the week of Feb. 5-11 as "Farm Bureau Week" in Texas and urged all citizens "to cooperate in the recognition and observance of this week in an effort to publicize this important phase of our Texas life."

The special week coincides with the annual membership campaign of the Texas Farm Bureau, largest general farm organization in the state. The 1961 drive was kicked off with a big Chairmen's Rally's Jan. 24 in Abilene attended by county FB presidents, and county and community membership chairman. About 125 counties are planning intensive membership drives during the next two months.

The fast growing state farm organization has had a gain in membership for eight consecutive years and has almost doubled its membership in the past ten years. It is now largest state Farm Bureau in the South and fourth largest in the nation.

Final Rites Are Held Monday for Charlie McCoy

Uncle Charlie McCoy is dead. Death claimed the 89-year-old Eastland resident Sunday at 6 a. m. He died in his home, 1129 North Lamar.

Charlie L. McCoy had lived in Eastland for the past 30 years. He was born Jan. 5, 1872 in Indiana and moved to Eastland from Ranger. He had lived in Mingus for a number of years before moving to Ranger and was employed by the Texas and Pacific Coal Co. He was one of the few ex-Thurber coal miners who still live in this area.

Mr. McCoy was married to the former Ann Edwards March 3, 1897 at Thurber. He was a member of the First Christian Church and the Knights of Pythias.

Uncle Charlie was a familiar sight around Eastland. He was considered one of the area's best domino players and made his "trip around the square" almost daily until he fell at his home recently.

Funeral services were held Monday at 2 p. m. in the Hammer Funeral Home chapel. Rev. Ray Hecken-dorn, pastor of the First Christian Church, officiated. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. C. H. Turner of Dallas, and a granddaughter.

Ingram scored 21 points, Bailey had nine and James Smith six. High for the losers was Jim Webb with 18 points.

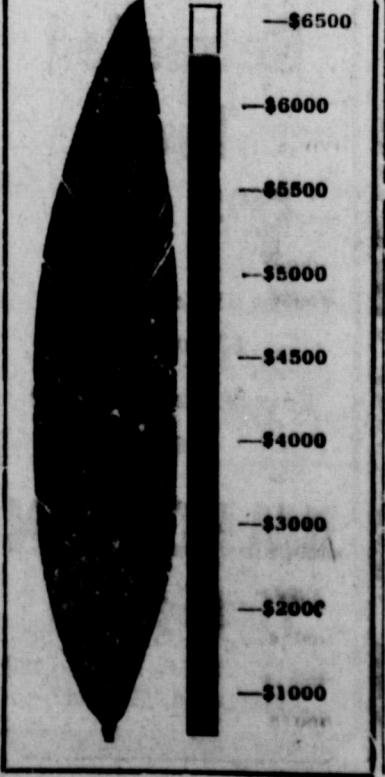
Cisco earlier defeated Eastland in the local gym. Proceeds from Monday night's game, which was well attended, went to the Cisco Golden Gloves.

Nimrod Club Pays Honor to Agent for Outstanding Work

County Agent J. M. Cooper last night found out what his friends in Eastland County think of him. Cooper was honored by members of the Nimrod Neighbors Club and many other Eastland citizens at the Nimrod clubhouse.

Cooper, who helped organize the Nimrod Club, which has won many honors, was recently named president of the Texas County Agents Association. His friends decided he should be told how much he is appreciated in Eastland County.

The easy-to-smile Cooper has served as county agent here since 1945. He came to Eastland in May of that year.

Perhaps his most worthy accomplishment since coming to Eastland County has been the organization of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association in 1956. The organization, under Cooper's guidance, sponsored the first county pecan show ever held. The event has been held annually in this county since and has now spread to many other counties. Three Eastland County girls have since named State Pecan Queen since Cooper has been in the county. That honor is gained by winning the most points in the State Pecan Show.

Pecans have been just a part of

his work, however. He was also instrumental in getting the Eastland Dairy Association organized in 1949. The Association purchased 16 registered dairy females that were presented to outstanding farm boys in the county. These (Continued on Page 3)

Nominations Due For Texas Rural Heroism Awards

Acts of bravery occur in many Texas communities each year, and while not unnoticed, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council wants to express its appreciation to those responsible for making life more pleasant and enjoyable in the state, especially the rural areas.

Nominations are now due for their "Rural Heroism Awards" and should be mailed immediately to Heroism Award, Texas Safety Association, 830 Littlefield Building, Austin, Texas.

The Council will award three properly engraved plaques to as many state winners during the annual meeting of the Texas Safety Association in March. Certificates with local presentations are planned for all nominees.

Any heroic act involving personal danger or sacrifice to aid or assist others in time of crisis is eligible for entry provided the act was performed during 1960. Nominations may be made by any person or groups and should include complete information—substantiating evidence of the heroic act. This material will be used by the judges in determining the winners. Local county agent, teachers of vocational agriculture and local Farm Bureau representatives can give assistance.

L. O. Tiedt of Houston, chairman of the Council's Award Committee, said last year's single award went to Manuel Corral, Mexican bracero laborer who lowered into an abandoned irrigation well to rescue a three year old boy.

Tiedt said such acts of bravery as removing a person from burning building, saving a person from drowning or rescuing an involved in a machinery, tractor or automobile accident, certainly can be nominated. A person who rendered exceptional service in case of a tornado, flood or disaster would make a worthy nominee, he said.

By recognizing heroic service, the Council feels the award will serve to emphasize continuing need for improved safety conditions in rural areas, on the farm or when the family is at play. Do your good turn by nominating a friend who makes more pleasant for you, Tiedt said.

Questionnaires to Give Jaycees Starting Point

Local Jaycees will mail out the questionnaires to that many people here Thursday. Each questionnaire will include a return addressed envelope. Citizens may or may not sign the questionnaires.

The 200 persons who will receive the questionnaires were selected at random. Jaycees are urging their cooperation in filling out and returning the questionnaires immediately.

Jaycees aren't seeking answers which might make them look better. They are getting to the touchy points, seeking to find out, for instance, what the 200 persons think are the reasons for the decreasing population of the community.

The Junior Chamber is asking citizens to take a look at city, county and school governments and property. The questionnaire also deals with industry, business and community needs.

Health and safety also enter into the picture. Possible tourist trade is another angle. Homes and yards are singled out.

Realizing most citizens will insist more industry is needed, Jaycees ask, "What do you think should be done to obtain it?"

And the young men are looking at the practical side of the question too. The last question is, "Would you be willing to pay increased taxes, if necessary, to accomplish the things you want for Eastland?"
