PERKINS FINDS Australians Dislike Rabbits and Kangaroos

(Editor's Note: Joseph M. Perkins is now back in the United States at his summer home in Gleasondale, Mass. This article was written while he was traveling on the Indian Ocean between Australia and Ceylon. Two more articles will complete this series.)

Life aboard the ship goes on as usual, with games, eating, reading, sleeping and loafing in deck chairs. The deck tournaments are almost over and table tennis is in full swing. I entered the deck quait tournament but was eliminated in the second game. In chess I am doing quite well, but that is not on a competitive basis.

Two days ago we passed withing a few miles of the Cocos Islands, a coral group of very attractive islands. We were close enough so that through my binoculars I could see thatched huts among the coconut palms and even make out people standing on the beach. That same day the S. S. Oronsay of the P. & O. Orient Line overtook us and passed within a few thousand feet. She left Australia after we did and will get to London four days ahead of us. She is newer and faster and calls at fewer ports. Both ships are of the same line and both dipped their flags in salute as she passed us.

This morning I had another talk with the veterinarian from Australia. He operates an animal clinic in sheep and cattle country, and he treats a variety of animals including horses, cattle, sheep, sheep dogs, cats and kangaroos. I said that I understood that kangaroos, like rabbits, were regarded as undesirable animals in Australia, and I wanted to know why he doctored them. He said that they are a very destructive pest and that the farmers and ranchers shoot them on sight. Occasionally a mother kangaroo is shot along with two or three young and they are motherless. Sometimes these are allowed to live as family pets. They make gentle and very interesting domestic pets and children love them.

If caught very young they are fed warm milk through an eyedropper or a nursing bottle. Lat-

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Youth Admits Slaying Of Church Secretary

Cisco citizens, shocked a week ago today by the murder of a well known citizen, were shocked again Tuesday when a Cisco High student, who is not quite 15, signed a statement admitting the crime.

The big break in the Florence Hussey murder case came just five days after the crime, which officers have described time and time again as one of the most brutal in the county's history.

The youngster, identified by officers as Nathan Curry, lived just two doors from the Cisco church secretary who he has admitted stabbing to death. He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Cisco, the same church where Mrs. Hussey was employed as secretary.

Murder charges were filed against Curry Wednesday.

The youth's mother denied published reports that he admitted the crime to her sometime Tuesday. The boy signed a statement Tuesday night and led police to the

Most Persons to Automatically Get SS Benefits

Most of the Eastland County residents who will directly benefit at this time from the Social Security Amendments signed into law by the President on June 30 do not need to write or contact their social security office, according to R. R. Tuley Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration.

He has furnished us the following summary:

Automatic Changes

1. Aged widows already receiving benefits on their late husband's account will get 10% increase in September, for August, 1961.
2. Beneficiaries with no dependents, who are receiving unreduced benefits of less than \$40 will be raised to \$40 in September, for August.
3. Women receiving reduced retirement benefits because they started being paid before age 65, will get some increase if their basic rate, before reduction, was less than \$40.
4. Men may now receive benefits at age 62, on retirement, as dependent husband, or dependent widower, or dependent parent. Men with continued high earnings (over \$1200 per year) should check to see whether some payment would be possible despite such high earnings.
5. Some persons whose claims were denied before this month because they did not have enough credits under social security should make new inquiry. The minimum requirement of the 1 1/2 years of credits was not changed; however, for those who needed more than that, the number of credits was reduced from 1/3 of the time after 1950 and before age 62 for women and before age 65 for men. Men must have slightly more creditable time in the system than women.

Persons in group 4 or 5, should write to the social security office in Abilene, giving their dates of birth and social security number. Arrangements will then be made to talk with them when a representative of the Abilene office is at or near their home town.

Austin Report

By REP. SCOTT BAILEY

In response to many of the interested citizens of this area, I would like to submit a report of some of the accomplishments of the Regular Session of the 57th Texas Legislature. Your local hometown editor and publisher are to be commended for their efforts in helping to better inform you concerning the affairs of our State.

True, the Legislature was not able to agree on and send to the Governor a tax bill which would clear up the State's deficit and support the cost of the Texas State government for the next biennium at a level desired by the Legislature. That task, together with the perennial appropriations act, remain the chief objects for the First Special Session when it convenes next month.

Despite the complex and unique problems faced by this Legislature, it demonstrated a determination to take the long-range view in seeking many solutions. Time after time it refused to be content with patchwork, piecemeal solutions which would tide the state over another biennium and postpone the problems until the next Legislature meets.

Following is a review of some of the significant work by the 57th legislature in the Regular Session just closed. In the House of Representatives, 1,136 bills were introduced, and an additional 480 were introduced in the Senate. In addition, there were 88 House Joint Resolutions and 25 Senate Joint Resolutions—all proposing amendments to the Texas Constitution—and numerous concurrent and simple resolutions were considered by both houses.

From this mass of legislation introduced and referred to committees in both houses, 314 House bills, 235 Senate bills, 8 Senate Joint Resolutions, and 6 House Joint Resolutions were finally passed. Some of these have just received the Governor's action, but all completed the legislative process.

About one third—or—33 percent—of the bills introduced were finally passed. They range all the way from the highest level of State policy to the most detailed housekeeping operations. Only a few of the more than 1,600 bills considered by your State lawmakers at this session are noted and will be mentioned in this and later reports that I shall submit to the people.

One of the more important laws passed was the legislative redistricting bill, H. B. 343, which apportions the State into representative and senatorial Districts in such a way as to take into account population changes recorded by the 1960 decennial census. Eastland, Callahan and Shackelford Counties remain in the same District with Palo Pinto and Stephens Counties being added. Palo Pinto County will be the largest County, population wise; Eastland County however, has more voters as was shown in the recent Senate runoff election. Your Representative voted for H. B. 343, because of the fair and equitable representation that it gives to all the People of Texas.

Because of the length of this report, I shall endeavor to continue it next week. Again, thanks to the press and radio for helpfulness. I can be contacted at Route 3, Cisco.

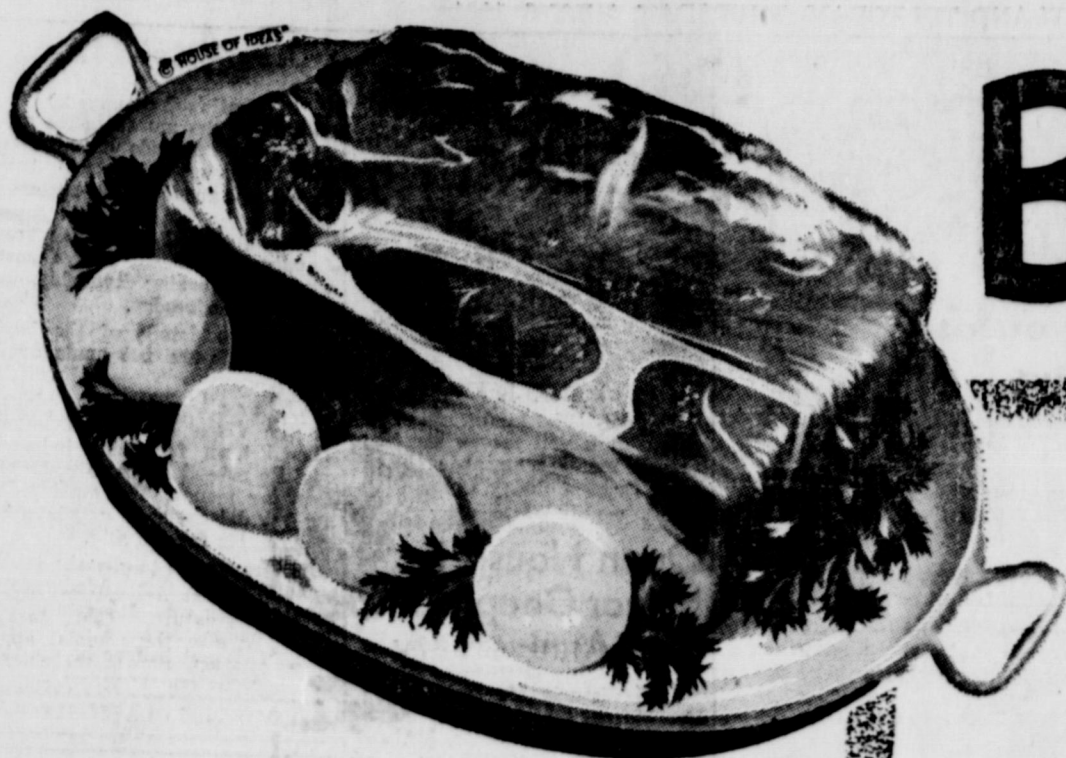

sheep hearing. These dogs are of great value when well trained and he said that he has seen sheep men cry when they bring in a dog that has been bitten by a tiger snake or suffered other fatal injury. These dogs may be of several breeds but the Border Collies and the Kelpies are the best. The collies are of Scotch origin and are the most intelligent. They can be trained to think and act much as a man would under the same circumstances. Each year in May or June the National Sheep Dog Trials are held near Canberra, and the Border Collies usually win. The Kelpies are an Australian developed breed with some Dingo blood in them. The Dingos are the wild dogs of Australia and look very much like a coyote in West Texas. The Kelpies are also smart sheep dogs and one especially adopted to the extremely hot parts of Australia where they stand up to the work better than any others.

When I inquired about the rabbit situation I learned that they were introduced into Australia from England about 1830 and they became so numerous that they ate practically all of the grass that the cattle needed. The rabbit menace became its worst right after the first World War, but thanks to modern research a virus has been developed that has killed the rabbits by the million. They now are pretty well under control, and cattle raising is increasing. Cattlemen are improving their ranges by using superphosphate and a little molybdenum. Also they are clearing out brush and are introducing new grasses.

We cross the equator today, and this forenoon King Neptune appeared with several helpers who performed the time honored ceremony of ducking the young children in a shallow pool of sea water on the upper deck. About 30 children were given a lather on a brush, then tossed into the pool. When the supply of young fry ran out the party got a little out of hand as the assistants, (ships junior officers) began throwing each other into the pool. Finally the ship's captain was thrown in, white ducks, gold braid and all. However no tempers were lost and it was all clean fun. I hope my color pictures of it come out well.

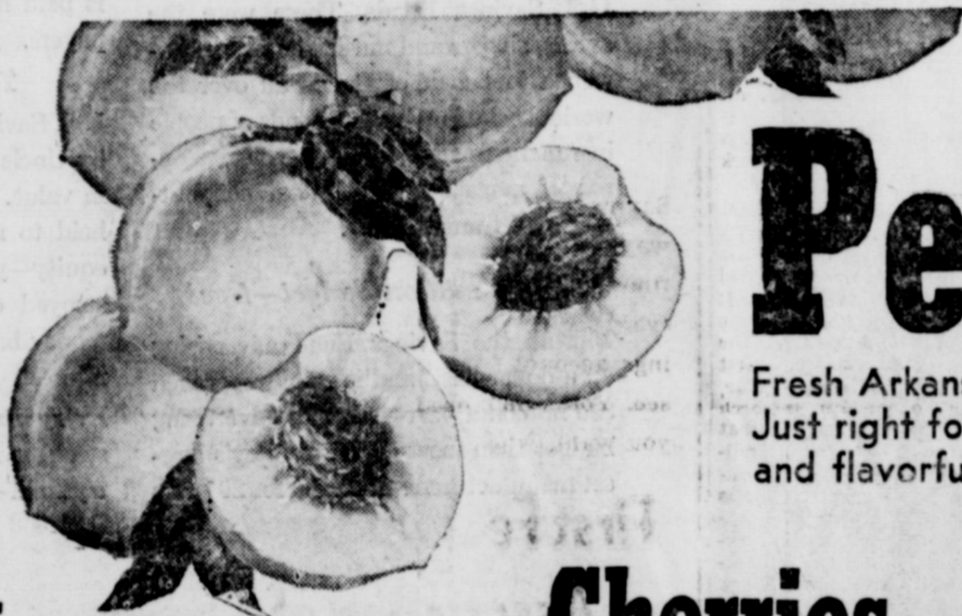

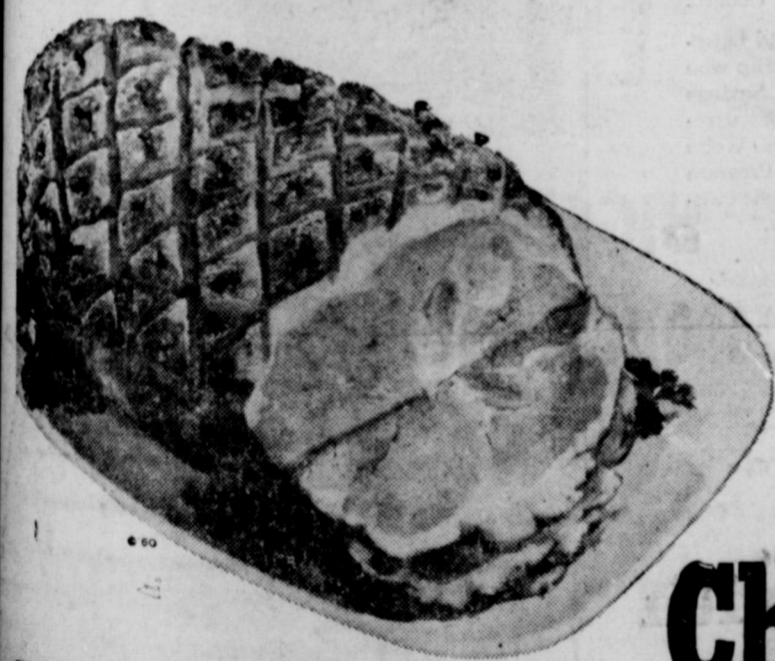

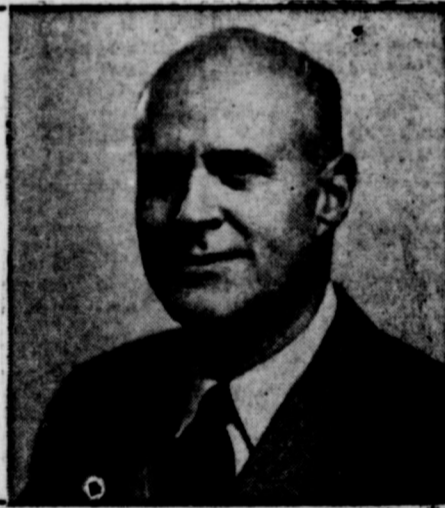
