

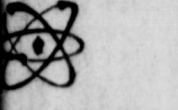

## Budding School Set Tuesday

The annual Eastland County pean-budding school will be held in the cafeteria at Cisco Junior College, Tuesday beginning at 9 a. m. The morning session will be devoted to lectures and demonstrations on when, where and how to bud, types of bud-wood, when not to bud, how to force the bud, covering the bud, tying the bud, the difference between budding and grafting and other features. We have also ordered a supply of double bladed pecan budding knives. The school is free to anyone who desires to learn to bud pecans. You are invited to attend.
