Fallout Protection Guide Still Available at PO

A pocket-sized booklet with the most essential, up-to-the-minute information for families and individuals on how to survive a nuclear attack is now available to citizens without charge from the post office.

Mrs. Art Johnson, postmaster, says that copies of the booklet are still available at the post office.

The 48-page, yellow-covered booklet, entitled "Fallout Protection—What to Know and Do About Nuclear Attack," includes specific instructions on how to survive fallout, build a fallout shelter or improvise a last-minute shelter if necessary, stock and ventilate the shelter, and take sanitary and first aid measures. Special information for farmers is

provided on protecting or decontaminating livestock, food and equipment in a fallout zone.

The Department of Defense, Office of Civil Defense, produced the booklet to provide up-to-date, easily-readable survival information in one publication. So far, 25 million of the booklets have been printed and placed in distribution.

The booklet also points out other ways in which the Defense Department's new civil defense program will provide increasing protection:

The National Shelter Survey now under way will identify fallout shelter spaces in existing structures for about 50 million persons. Identification, marking and stocking with austerity food and water rations, first aid kits, radiation detection instruments and other essentials will cost less than \$4 per space.

Ten buildings in Eastland have been surveyed as possible shelters. They are the courthouse, Eastland National bank, the vacant telephone building, the Exchange Bldg., the Post Office, the city Hall, First Baptist Church education bldg., high school, Village Hotel and the county jail.

The proposed Federal Shelter Incentive Program would provide Federal grants of something less than the cost of constructing fallout shelters in schools, hospitals and in their non-profit institutions. Many shelters also would serve a dual peace-time function.

The existing National Warning System is being extended to provide Americans near-instant attack warning.



FALLOUT SHELTER supplies necessary to be self-sustaining over a two-week period are shown in these drawings from the "Fallout Protection" booklet prepared by the Department of Defense and available free to the public through post offices and

local civil defense offices. The most essential supplies are outlined in gray, including water, the most important individual item. Each shelter occupant would require at least a quart of water a day, and a gallon would be better to allow for cleansing.

Radiation meters, now commercially available, include pencil-like instruments for measuring amount of radiation per hour and total exposure to radiation, and a charger to eliminate previous readings by returning instruments to zero settings.

Contributions in 1961 resulted in aid for 8,647 persons of all ages in Texas.

Screwworm Eradication Program Now Underway

Henry Fry, Cisco, chairman of the Eastland County Screwworm eradication program committee says, "Texas stockmen and others have contributed over one million three hundred and thirty-three thousand dollars to the screwworm eradication program." The goal for the State has been set at three million dollars, says Fry. He urges all of those concerned who have not already contributed to leave their contributions with their banks or at the PCA office in Eastland.

The federal government has pledged to match the producer-raised funds in this all important program. Fry wishes to thank all of those workers who have helped in the fund solicitation campaign and those who have made their contributions. The screwworm eradication program is a reality and is evidence of what group action can accomplish.

The final hurdle in getting the Southwest screwworm eradication program off the ground was cleared when the contract for building the giant screwworm factory was approved here today. Work began immediately at Moore Air Force Base in the Rio Grande Valley and should be completed by July 1. By taking this quick action, the plant will be in operation two months earlier than expected.

In summary, this far, state officials' efforts to eradicate the pest are well advanced.

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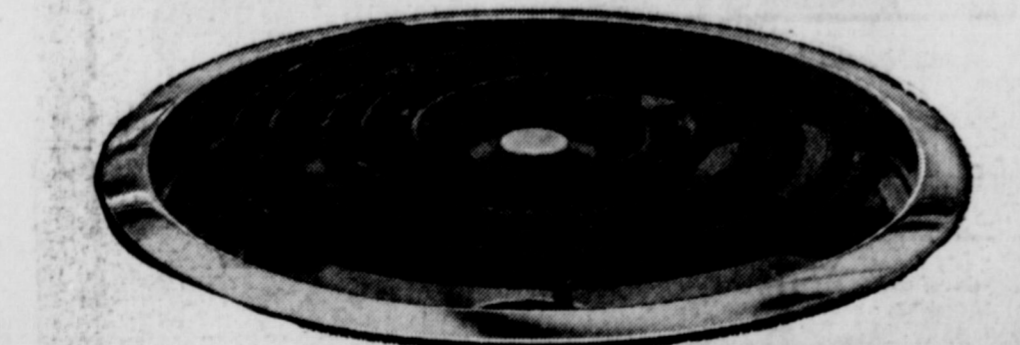

Jersery, Chicago and California.

The local plant is turning out over \$20,000 worth of merchandise a day now.

With a 420 dozen daily production average, that means 5,040 individual bras, with an average retail price of \$4 each, means \$20,160, daily in retail merchandise.

From these points, of course, the quality-line garments are delivered to retail stores throughout the country.

As with the garment itself, there's more to it than meets the eye.

There are 22 different operations in making a brassiere. Some operators handle and sew as many as 5,760 pieces of material every working day, and they push down on a sewing machine pedal more than 3,000 times a day.

The tolerances are tight and the quality-control rigid to produce a garment to bear the Hollywood-Vassarette label.

George says competition is getting rougher every year and the company, like many others, has had to absorb increases in costs and still keep the retail price tag the same every year.

Sometime this summer, the plant will close down for two weeks, so that all the employ-

can take a well-deserved vacation. But for now, it's "keep 'em moving, by the dozens."
