\$50 Given For Election Expenses

The Six District for Better Education has contributed \$50 toward payment of the costs of the school consolidation elections Saturday.

"Please accept our check for \$50 which is a contribution from the people to be applied to the election costs of March 17, 1962. We will also ask our people to please not send us any more money, but to send it to you for this purpose."

Polls Open At 8 a.m. In 6 School Districts

A record number of voters are expected to march to the polls Saturday to cast ballots in what has become one of the most controversial issues ever to arise in this county.

Polls will open at 8 p.m. in voting places in six school districts in the county to determine if the voters want to consolidate the six districts into one new single district.

The election was called Feb. 21st by County Judge John Hart after he had been petitioned by 271 petition-signers.

The election Saturday will be the culmination of a project initiated about two years ago by Dr. James Whittington, Eastland.

E. E. (Ed) Layton has been appointed by the County Commissioners Court to be election judge in Eastland. Herman Hassell had been appointed by the court earlier as judge for all special and general elections but requested to be relieved from this election due to ill health.

Voting in Eastland will be in the east lounge on the first floor of the County Court-house.

Polls in all voting places will be open until 7 p.m.

An extremely high number of absentee ballots have been cast in the election. Tuesday at noon, a total of 79 votes had already been cast at the County Clerk's office. Breakdown by districts was as follows: Eastland, 42; Gorman, 28; Ranger, 3; Carbon, 2; Olden, 4; and Desdemona, 0.

Voting sites for the other districts will be as follows: Carbon, Hamner Funeral Home; Gorman, school house; Olden, school; Ranger, City Hall; and Desdemona, school house.

Other election judges will be Ranger, Calvin Brown; Olden, Mrs. O. H. Dick; Gorman, W. G. Baker; Carbon, H. M. Gilbert; and Desdemona, L. E. Clark.

The ballot will be an extremely simple one with the two choices.

It will read: FOR Consolidation, and Against Consolidation, with the voter marking through the choice for which he does not want to vote.

(That is, if a voter wants to vote FOR consolidation, he should mark through the line that reads "AGAINST consolidation," and vice versa.)

The petition asking for the election was presented to Judge Hart on Feb. 6th.

Mrs. Joseph Perkins, chairman of the Better Education Committee, presented the petition to Judge Hart.

Crusade Set Here for Next Month

The Eastland County Cancer Crusade will be held next month with Mrs. Cecil Collins as campaign chairman, with an overall goal of \$2,300.

Lym Crawford, field representative for District 13 presented an outline for the campaign, during a meeting in Eastland last week, attended by 18 people from over the county.

Crawford said the reason American Cancer Society did not participate with United Fund and like concerted fund raising efforts was that the money was secondary to the educational program.

"In making a house-to-house campaign," he said, "the life-saving literature is put in the hands of the people. This is the most important part of the program. Of course we have to have contributions to keep the work going but educating the people to the seven danger signals of cancer is the most important work we do."

Deer Season Extended And Does Okayed

Deer-hunters will get a 30-day season in Eastland County next season and will be permitted to take doe, as the result of recent legislation.

The new regulations, which were patterned after Throckmorton County restrictions, were passed during the last session, Rep. Scott Bailey of Cisco said.

Shooters can take doe if they have a 50 cent permit from the County Clerk's office, and permission of the land owner.

Bag limit will be the same, and dates will be from Nov. 16th to Dec. 15th, inclusive, Bailey said.

The old regulations were adopted in 1940.

Gen. Walker Is Surprise Lions Club Guest, Speaker

Ex-Army General Edwin A. Walker, who is campaigning for governor, was an unexpected guest at the Eastland Lions Club noon luncheon at the White Elephant Restaurant Tuesday and delivered a five-minute "patriotic" talk.

The general reviewed for the Lions, briefly how he had been a commanding officer who found it impossible to take orders from the State Department and how he had resigned under fire.

He told of how he had been in command of men on the "ready" to go into combat—

both against the Communist and anti-Communist. And this amounted, he said, to having our men fighting each other.

"I stayed in the Korean fight longer than any other commander," he said, "having volunteered for extension three times, because I thought we could win, but I was wrong. You can't win when you're told one day to shoot and then the next, not to shoot, by the State Dept."

He's campaigning on the Constitution of Texas, he said.

I live in the Northwest Independent School District (Consolidated) comprised of Eonoke, Justin, Hastet and Rhome. This consolidation took place back in 1950 among all of the beautiful promises such as your Dr. James C. Whittington paints. I was one of those individuals who partook of the fruit; anything for better education. And now, after nearly twelve years of consolidation, it is a near proven fact to me that we have creat-

ed instead of better education, a four header monster. The friction that has been generated is terrific. The economic and educational improvements have failed to materialize.

For six years, we have tried to pass a bond to improve our elementary school buildings, and today there is no solution in sight. One group wants to improve the elementary schools now located in each of the communities. Another group wants to consolidate the elementary into one building located near the high school, which is in the country between the four communities. And still another group is ag-

ainst everything due to cost. Having gone through these hectic experiences for some twelve years, I would advise against any such arrangement. It is possible that consolidation might work in some form of vacuum, but not in reality. A friend of mine summed up our situation by saying, "The chances of getting anything done in this district are just about as good as raising a rose garden in the middle of the Sahara Desert."

The public is cordially invited to attend the sale.

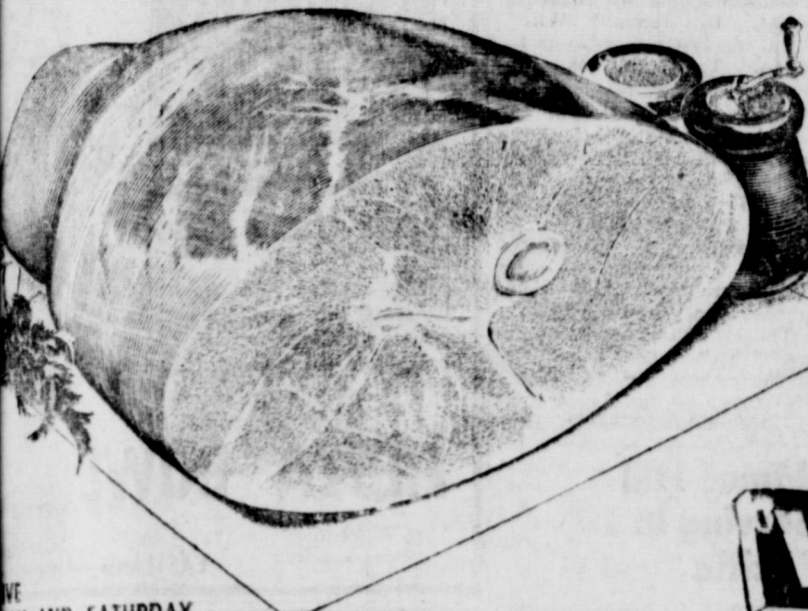
Pricilla Group Is Hosted By Mrs. Williams

The Eastland Independent School District Board of Trustees in a called meeting Monday night, unanimously reaffirmed the stand they had taken last September in opposing consolidation of the Eastland District with five other districts in the county.

H. T. Weaver, Vice Chairman of the Board, in the absence of Board Chairman M. H. Perry who is in San Saba at the bedside of a seriously ill father, stated that it was still the feeling of the group that the proposed consolidation would not be an economy move and that there was little, if any chance that the needs of the students of Eastland would be more adequately met in the consolidated district. The board summed up their opposition to the proposed consolidation by enumerating the 7 points listed below:

1. The current bond debt of the Eastland District is \$95,000. There is currently available in the school sinking fund account \$34,213.70 that can be used for the retirement of present bonds and for that purpose only. By retiring thirty-six bonds at the current market value with money already on deposit, the current debt could be reduced to \$59,000 immediately. Negotiations for effecting such a transfer are presently in progress. The bond debt of the Eastland District has been reported erroneously by the proponents of consolidation at intervals during the past 2 years. The Eastland District could be debt free by 1964 unless the voters of the district elect to vote additional bonds for the purpose of new buildings. Any increase in the present bond debt would of necessity, have to be approved by the voters of the district, after an election had been called for that specific purpose.

2. The six districts involved will get as much money during the next ten years (from the State) whether they consolidate or not. If they consolidate they will have \$116,316 deducted from the amount they normally would have received for salary and operations expense, and have it placed in a special account to be used ONLY for paying off present and future bonded indebtedness. Actually a restriction would be placed on funds in the Consolidated District that is not now invoked in the separate districts. Incentive Money is not an additional amount of money furnished by the State. It is money the districts are already getting and will continue to get whether they consolidate or not!

3. Under Consolidation the State would cut nine classroom teachers and five vocational teachers from the number they now allow, as well as deduct

\$116,316 from the salary and operations allowances.

4. It is estimated that it would take two years to make a complete change-over to the New System.

A. All property in the six districts would have to be re-evaluated in order to insure equal property valuations. The only fair and efficient way to evaluate such property is by the use of an outside firm of Tax Consultants. The fee for such a service would run from \$40,000 to \$80,000.

B. New facilities would not be immediately available and the new construction of Senior and Junior High Schools would be time consuming. These facilities could be constructed only after a bond issue had been passed approving such construction. It is also felt that the proposed cost of \$900,000 is inadequate and that a figure of \$1,500,000 is more realistic to say nothing of repair work necessary on existing structures. Interest alone for the first year at 5% on the \$1,500,000 would total \$75,000.

C. An integration election would be called to decide whether the new district would be integrated or whether equal opportunity would be afforded Negro students in a segregated system after adequate buildings and an enlarged faculty were provided at local expense.

D. An election would be called to set a maximum maintenance tax rate along with one to assume the bonded indebtedness of all six districts.

5. During such a two year period it is reasonable to assume that the present six districts would of necessity be compelled to operate much as they are operating at present since there is no place for them to go. During such a period the State will provide \$116,316 less per year for salary and operations. This simply means that the money must be raised locally through increased taxation if schools are to be continued in each of the six districts. The other alternative would be to close certain schools.

6. No guarantee can be made by any individual or any group that taxes will not be increased in the Consolidated District. No one can make the same guarantee as the districts now exist, but it is reasonable to assume that a Tax Increase will come sooner and be more severe in the Consolidated District than if the district remains as is.

7. Transportation presents a major problem from the standpoint of Cost, Safety, Inconvenience. In the Consolidated District approximately 65% of the students in the Eastland District would become eligible bus riders. At present, less than 15% of the students are eligible bus riders.

County Commissioners Pass Two Resolutions

Eastland County Commissioners passed two resolutions during their regular bi-monthly meeting held Monday morning in the Commissioners Courtroom of the Court House.

Resolutions passed were that the Commissioners Court enter into a contractual agreement for right-of-way, utility and adjustments with the State of Texas acting by and through the Texas Highway Department and Humble Oil Company, and agree to terms stated therein, on that portion of State Highway 6, located between Eastland and Carbon and authorizing the County Judge to make, execute, deliver and sign this contract with an attestation by the County Clerk, and further authorizing the County Judge to make, execute, deliver and sign any and all papers pertinent thereto for payment to County and request for reimbursement from the Texas Highway Department.

The second resolution was that the Commissioners Court request that the State of Texas

reconvey to Don L. Shoute, E. C. McClellan and wife, Lilly McClellan, Glen D. Compton and Gayle Payne, Nellie Mozelle Yeager, Marshall Thomas and wife, Jewel Thomas, the abandoned part of U.S. Highway 380 between Callahan County and Cisco, and stating herewith that no other persons use the land as access to their property, and no citizens use the road as a public road, and stating further that these are adjacent and adjoining property owners, and further stating this agreement was part of consideration paid and promised to above named persons, in exchange for new and additional right-of-way required for re-location and re-construction of above mentioned U. S. Highway 380, and further authorizing the County Judge of Eastland County to sign any and all papers and/or documents regarding this procedure, and stating further that this abandoned portion of U.S. Highway 380 was acquired by the County at no cost to the State of Texas.

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Ellenberger Discovery In Erath County

Cities Service has a rank Ellenberger discovery at its Foss No. 1 test in Erath County, North Texas, approximately 12.5 miles northeast of Stephenville. There is no Ellenberger production within 50 miles of the Cities Service discovery, which is located on a 9,850-acre wholly-owned block.

On potential test of Ellenberger perforations between 5,065 and 5,073 feet, the well flowed at a daily rate of 195 barrels of 41.5-gravity oil. The test was through a 20 64-inch choke. Flowing tubing pressure was 75 pounds and the gas/oil ratio was 743/1.

Cities Service has located another Ellenberger test on a 11,520-acre block 8.5 miles northeast of Stephenville.

Thernew Ellenberger discovery is located 660' S, 660' E of the center, Sec. 44, T&N0 RR survey in the Lipan area of Erath County, Texas.

WESTERN PACIFIC (FHTN C)—James L. Hill, seaman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. William C. Hill of Ranger, is serving aboard the guided missile destroyer USS Henry B. Wilson, operating as a unit of the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

Leaving San Diego, Calif., Jan. 6, the Wilson stopped at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, enroute to join the Far Eastern fleet for a seven-month tour of duty.

The ship is expected to visit ports in Japan, Hong Kong and the Philippines before returning to the U. S.

Loss Of VA Pension Pay Possible

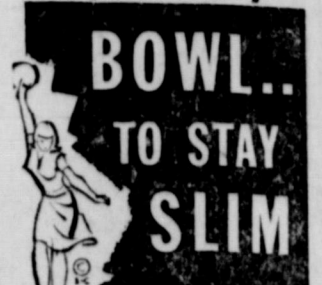
Possible loss of current pension payments plus retroactive repayment of pension money received during 1961 confront many hundreds of veterans, and widows of deceased veterans, who have failed to return their annual income questionnaires, a VA official said today. Edward P. Onstot, manager of the Regional Office in Dallas, said the law makes it mandatory that completed questionnaires be received from each pension recipient to determine whether annual income from all other sources exceeds the legal ceilings.

In issuing a warning, he expressed the fear that hundreds of veterans or veterans' widows may face loss of current pension and be forced to pay back all pension payments received during 1961.

Even though the announced deadline for returning the questionnaires has passed (January 31, 1962), the VA will still accept questionnaires sent in now to avoid hardship upon eligible pension recipients, Onstot said.

 and answered an unasked, but often-wondered question, "Why are you running for governor of Texas if you have such a grip with the federal

administration?" by saying that states are supposed to have 90 per cent of the power - endowed by the Federal Constitution.
 "The sovereign powers belong to the governors, and not to the 'Potomac Pretenders', he expounded.
 "The Kennedy regime should have been purged from power," he said, "as well as regimes right on down to this state since, 1956, when Lyndon Johnson sneaked in with the barest majority of votes."
 "The 'move to patriotism' is being misconstrued as a 'move to the right', he pointed out. He warned of pending Communist rule in Mexico and envisioned the Iron Curtain skirting the Rio Grande.
 He especially took broad swings at the state department

and officials and individuals whom he called "worse than Communists" because they profess to be one thing while they are something else.
 "They had every chance in the world to indict me under the Hatch Act and didn't, and if I was guilty, then they made themselves guilty of criminal negligence," Walker said.

Olden Board Re-Affirms Opposition

 He further stated, "The statements made for this consolidation have presented no certainty that even an elementary school will remain in the Olden District. If the consolidation

 will spend \$350,000 even to maintain its present system. As the cost of education continues, and the cost per student excessive, because of law numbers, taxes will be increased to meet the increased operating costs. With consolidation, Eastland would be a part of an excellent system with low operating costs per capita, and the new building paid for in the next ten years with "incentive aid." No increased taxes.
 "Ranger—The same, except they will not have a building program yet, but owe \$545,000 until 1993. With consolidation, in the ten years the debt will be '0'.
 "Gorman—owes as much as Ranger as individuals—more than \$158,000 until 1983. With consolidation, Gorman will be debt free in ten years."
 "Desdemona—Consolidation to Desdemona means survival. They either consolidate or lose everything."
 "Carbon—with Carbon, higher standards mean higher taxes, and eventual consolidation with the adjoining districts without incentive aid. With consolidation, they can but if they are to maintain elementary school without increased taxes.
 "Olden—Olden is debt free, but if they are to maintain the new standards, it needs new buildings and new taxes, soon. Consolidation is like a new oil boom to Olden."
 Dr. Whittington ended his talk by saying, "Remember, that the primary purpose of any educational system is ONLY to educate children."

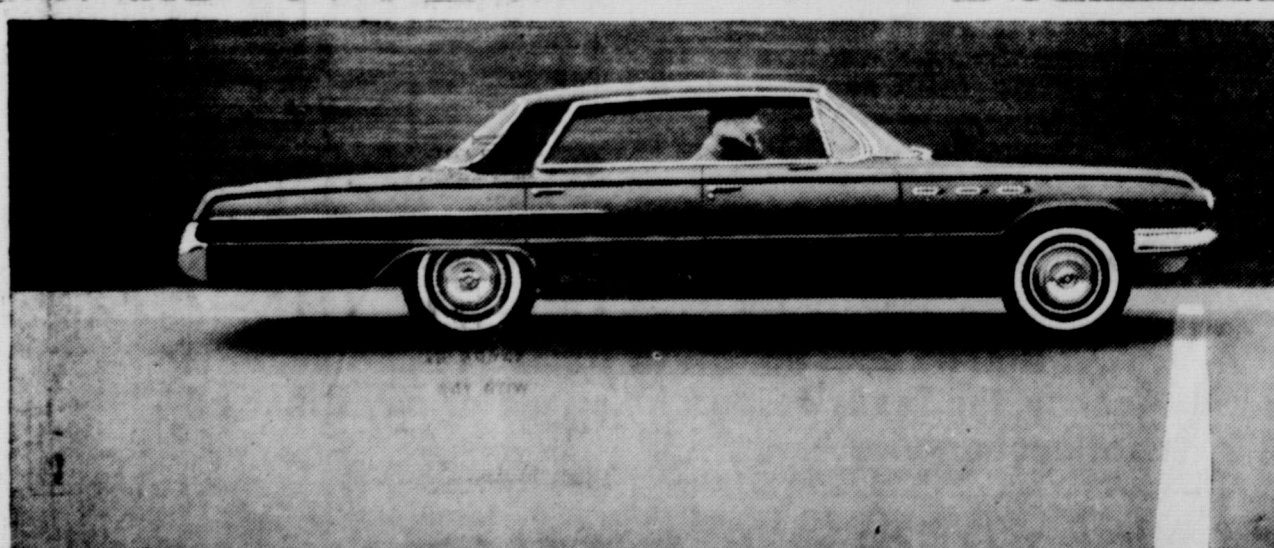

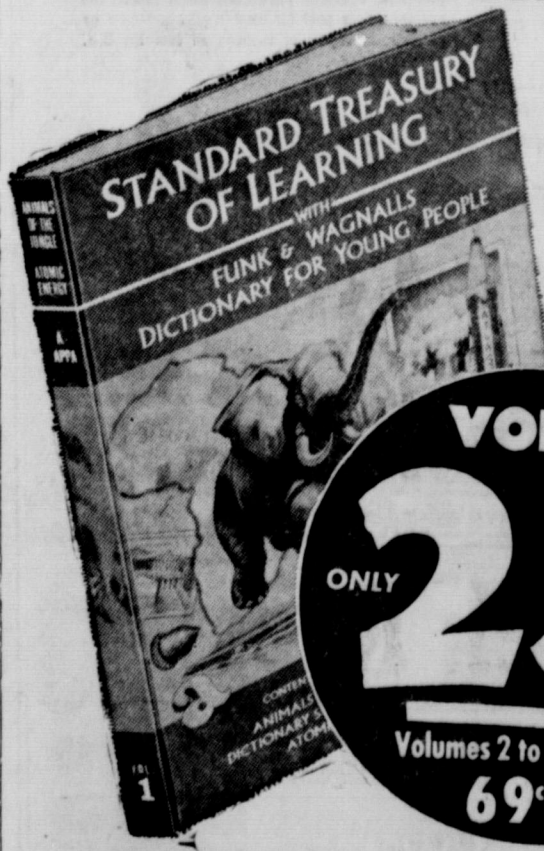

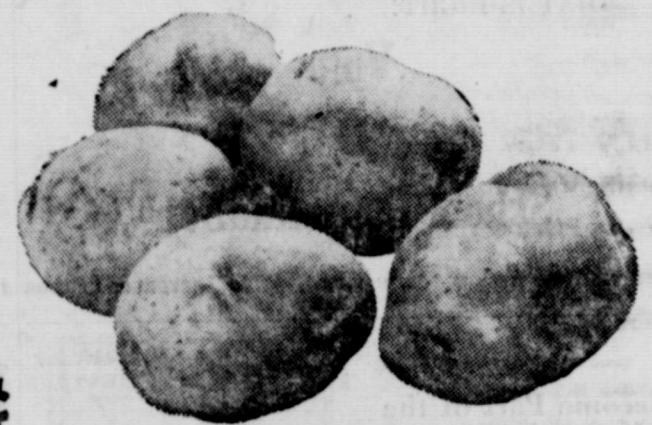
