'It Doesn't Rain Oil' Eastland Lions Told

The Eastland's Lions Club learned Tuesday from Ray Pool of Lone Star Producing Co. that because "It Never Rains Oil", oil fields, unlike water wells, sooner or later run dry and must be replaced by discovering new fields.

Pool, representative of the Oil Information Committee of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Assoc., used an animated cartoon movie to show some of the facts behind percentage depletion. The film showed that the percentage depletion provision in the federal income tax law was designed to encourage oil men to search for new oil fields in the face of discouraging odds.

With the odds against a "hot" well finding any oil being nine to one, and the chance for hitting a major oil field just about one in a thousand, operator or stockholders would ordinarily be afraid to risk their money drilling for oil to replace that which had been used.

Congress could change the odds, but in 1926 enacted a provision called "percentage depletion" which allows oil producers to recover from successful wells some of the money which they may have lost on dry holes.

Percentage depletion, as explained by Pool, recognizes that a deposit of oil or gas, like coal, sulphur, gold, granite, or gravel cannot be replaced but eventually runs out or is depleted. A portion of the income produced as the deposits are depleted is exempt from income tax as a return of capital which can be used to search for new deposits.

"The benefits of percentage depletion are not limited to the oil producer," said Pool "but are shared by all Americans. Because of percentage depletion, the U. S. is in a favorable position as far as oil and gas reserves are concerned."

Wintry Blast Expected To Damage Fruit Crop

The Eastland County fruit crop was expected to be severely damaged as a result of a cold wave Monday and Tuesday that dropped temperatures to 15 degrees early Wednesday morning.

The forecast was for more of the same with possible snow or freezing drizzle. The cold wave moved into this region Sunday night dropping the thermometer to a low of 31 degrees. The mercury

went down to an even 21 degrees at 5 a.m. Tuesday.

Due to unseasonable warm weather during much of February, most fruit trees were in bloom. County Agent J. M. Cooper said it is too early to determine the amount of damage done to the crop by types of fruit trees were in bloom, including pears, plums, apricots and peaches.

Cooper said it would be two or three days after the weather thaws to determine the extent of the damage. "Orchardmen can determine for themselves by peeling the bloom," Cooper said. "If the little fruit is black then there is no hope for the crop."

There are many factors involved, Cooper said, including the vigor of the tree itself, the duration of the sub-freezing temperatures and the amount of moisture which fell before the temperature dropped. Precipitation amounted to between two and three tenths of an inch Sunday night.

Schools reported normal operations and no plans for closing were under consideration.

Railroad Denies Negligence In Answer to Petition Here

The Texas and Pacific Railway Co. this week filed an answer in 91st District Court in Eastland to an original petition filed earlier by Mrs. Jodie Robinson.

Mrs. Robinson filed a \$26,500 damage suit claiming seven counts of negligence on the part of T&P, as the result of an incident in which her husband, Jodie Robinson, was killed when the auto which he was driving was struck by a T&P freight train at the Daugherty St. crossing on Jan. 23rd.

In the petition, Mrs. Robinson asked for \$5,000 for the loss of love and affection of her husband, \$25,000 for his loss of earning and \$1,500 for burial expenses.

Mrs. Robinson is represented by the Lubbock legal firm

of Splawn and Manor.

T&P's answer to the petition contained four points, including:

1. Exceptions to the claims for loss of love and affection, stating that such is "not recoverable";

2. denying each of the material allegations concerning negligence;

3. offering to show that Jodie Robinson was negligent; and

4. calling the incident "unavoidable."

The T&P answer was filed by Earl Conner Jr. and Jackson, Walker, Winstead, Cantwell and Miller law firm of Dallas.

Survivors include his parents; one brother, Larry of the home address; his grandmother, Mrs. Creager; and a host of other relatives and friends.

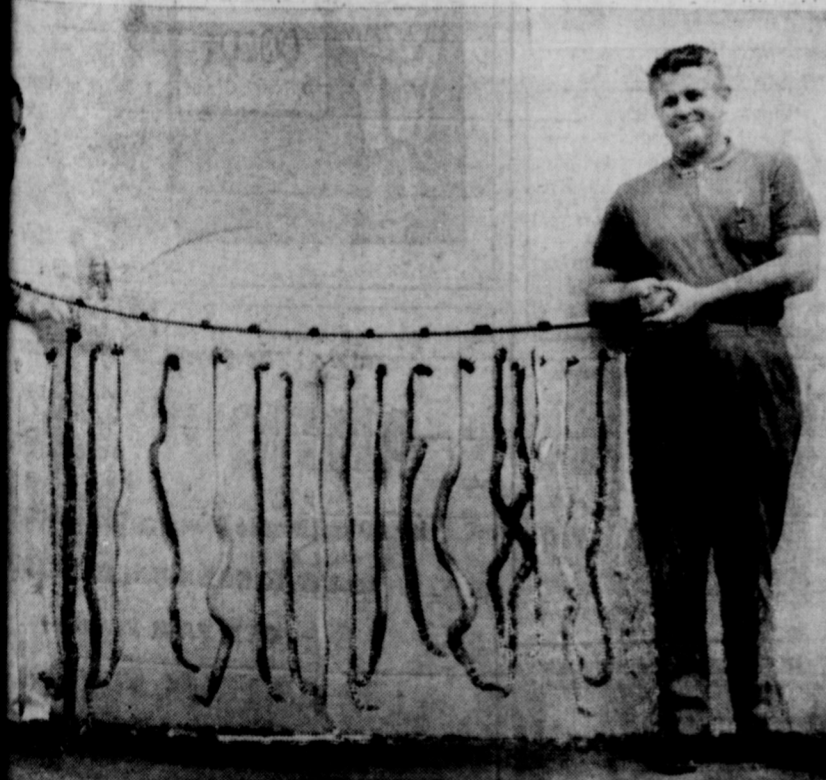
All pallbearers and honorary pallbearers were members of Lyndall's classes, track team and co-workers. Howard Payne students also furnished music for the services.

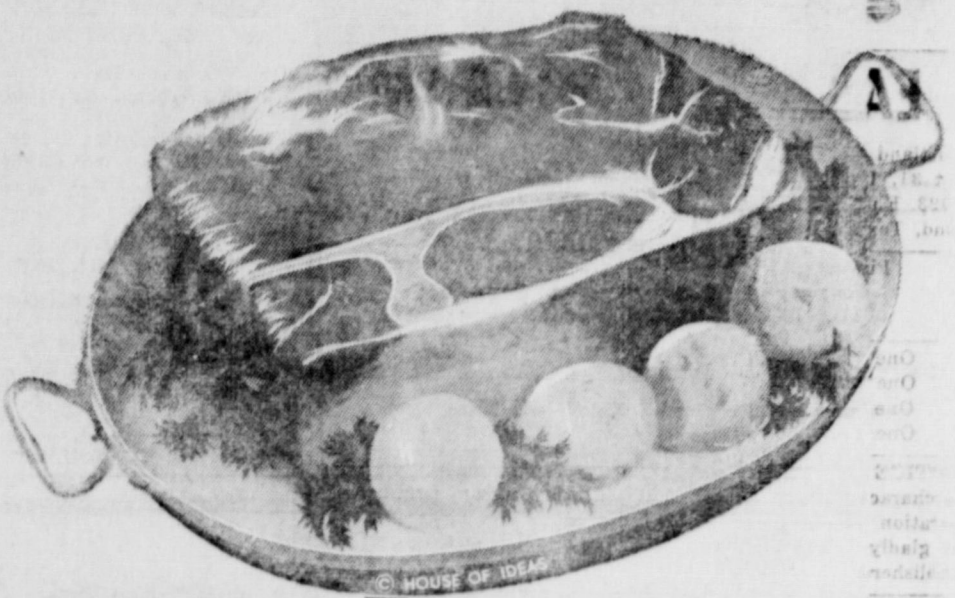

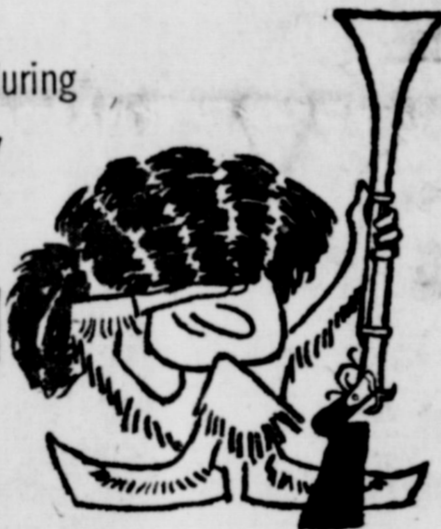

Well Completed 7 Miles NW Of Eastland

Eastland County had another substantial oil producer this week as W. M. Jarrell and Tex-Star Petroleum Co. completed their No. 1 Gordon Woods, a semi-wildcat seven miles northwest of Eastland. Production was from the Mississippi reef.

The completion test produced 135 barrels of oil in 24 hours from perforations at 4-017-28 and through a 10-4 inch choke. Pounding pressure was 850 pounds and flowing pressure was 630 pounds per square inch.

The well is a north offset to the same company's No. 1 Ex-all et al, drilled as a discovery hole recently. Low Drilling Co. of Cisco, a partner in the lease drilled both wells. The Woods from the south and west lines of Section 54, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

The well yielded flowing oil on two drill stem tests higher in the hole but in the same formation, it was reported. The operators have about 1-000 acres in their block. Plans for further development have not been announced.
