By checking accreditation reports for the 1960-61 year and prior years, it has been determined that in several instances courses are offered only on alternate years.											

The reorganized district would have these curriculum advantages:

All present offerings and some broadening courses (Elementary Mathematical Analysis: Analytical Geometry, Advanced Biology, Advanced Chemistry, Advanced Physics, Advanced Science, Speech, Journalism, Spanish III, Spanish IV, Latin III, Latin IV, Shop, Industrial Arts, Fine Arts, Health and Physical Education) can be included in the curriculum.

Additional facilities will be available at a lesser cost by equipping one high school rather than several science laboratories and equipment, library materials, vocational course materials, etc.)

A reduced faculty evolving from consolidation will afford the opportunity of obtaining special services personnel (counselor, nurse, supervisor, librarian); therefore, a better program of instruction and guidance is provided.

Teachers may be assigned to teach in their areas of specialization. (There is greater efficiency in preparing for fewer areas than for many.)

A financial economy results from the improved organization of facilities and the reduced number of teachers. (At present 65 1/2 staff members are utilized in the six schools, grades 7-12). Under the proposed reorganization, a broader program may be instituted with a staff varying from 15 to 55. Note a reduction of vocational units from 11 1-2 to 5 1-2.

The reorganized school district will be in a position to offer an improved instructional program resulting from:

Combining small classes, placing teachers in their areas of specialization, broadening the curriculum, providing special services, teaching certain programs more adequately due to proper facilities, and reducing the number of classroom teachers and vocational teachers, while at the same time providing for better utilization of the staff with the greatest possible return for the tax dollar expended.

Staff adequacy. The proposed reorganizing of the six Eastland County school districts not only brings together into one district pupils in large enough numbers to meet standards of adequacy, thus permitting a broader, richer, more comprehensive curriculum, but it

also provides the basis for a more efficient, economical use of the professional staff.

An examination of Texas Education Agency reports lends weight to this contention.

A cursory examination of these data might lead one to conclude that the situation in the six existing districts is better staff-wise than it would be if the district is reorganized. However, a careful study of the facts permits these conclusions:

Teachers may be assigned to teach only in their areas of specialization, whereas at the present time teachers work in areas for which they are inadequately prepared, or in areas for which they are totally unprepared.

The staff-pupil ratio of one staff member to each 28 pupils in membership, or one staff member to each 22 in average daily attendance not only meets State and Southern Association accreditation standards, but it approaches the "quality standards" of 50 staff members to each 1,000 pupils in membership.

A broader selection of vocational teachers is possible. Under the present arrangement only homemaking and vocational agriculture teachers are employed, but if reorganization is effected, all people who want and need homemaking and agriculture could take it and in addition, those who want and need vocational distributive education and/or vocational industrial education would have an opportunity to pursue such courses.

Special service teachers—librarians, nurses, visiting teachers or itinerant teachers—could be increased.

At the present time no special education teachers are employed. It would indeed be an unusual situation if there are not enough mentally retarded children, or sufficient numbers of pupils with speech difficulties, or enough handicapped children in the various categories included in the Foundation Program law, to qualify the new district for at least two such teachers. The advantage lies in the fact that such pupils would be within one district. As it is now, they are

MORAN BUSINESS WOMAN IS PIONEER IN MISTLETOE BUSINESS



ELSIE ROGERS

It's Mistletoe time again in the Moran area and for the 40th year Mrs. Elsie Rogers is in the big middle of the gathering and marketing operation.

It was in 1921 on December 15 that Elsie made her first shipment of the parasitic growth which infests mesquite trees in the area. It was just nine days after Elsie, then Elsie McClelland, was married, that she and her husband made their first venture into the business which has meant much to her and the residents of the Moran area. The shipment went to a florist at Staten Island, N. Y. Now Mrs. Rogers ships the tradition filled plant to all states in the Union except Arizona, Alaska and California. In addition she ships to Canada and Old Mexico.

Since first shipment sold, she said, for approximately one cent per pound. Mistletoe, like everything else, has advanced many times in price. When asked what she did with the first check

for her product, Mrs. Rogers said that she bought a new hat from a merchant who owned and operated a store in the building now housing her profitable gift and flower shop.

Mrs. Rogers' Mistletoe business, which is seasonal in nature, adds hundreds of dollars annually to farmers, ranchers and residents of the Moran area. She pays each gatherer on the basis of quality and selects the top plants for shipment. The Mistletoe is packaged in 1 1/2 ounce plastic bags, four ounce boxes and in bulk. Most of the shipments are by air express and reach the purchaser only hours after it is gathered.

Purchasers are eager to purchase Mistletoe which is gathered in the Moran area, because it is of the best quality of anywhere in the Nation. Mistletoe gathered in other areas has the reputation of deteriorating more rapidly, it was reported.

In 1957, Mrs. Rogers decided to open a gift and florist business in Moran, and now she operates her business next door to the post office. She has added clothing and notions to her business and has, she reported, enjoyed a steady growth since she opened for business.

In addition to operating the store and the Mistletoe business, Mrs. Rogers assists her husband, Luther Rogers, in the operation of their stock farm about a mile south of Moran. She has two daughters, Mrs. C. W. Fenton, and Mrs. H. W. Tennis, both of Odessa.

C. S. McClenny Dies At Roscoe Thursday

C. S. (Charlie) McClenny, a long time resident of the Stephens County area 11 miles north of Cisco, died early Thursday in a Roscoe Nursing Home after being in ill health for several years. He was 96 years of age and was known throughout this region.

Mr. McClenny lived on and operated his farm for many years before retiring in 1930 and moving to Loraine and later to Big Spring. He still retained possession of his farm. He was born Dec. 22, 1864.

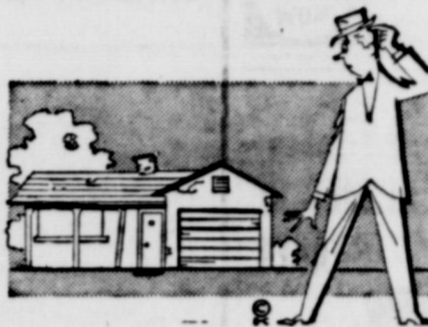
