Interstate 20 Hearing Set Wednesday

A public hearing to discuss the "design" of Interstate 20 through Eastland County will be held in the County Courtroom in Eastland Wednesday, Jan. 15th, beginning at 10 a. m.

Under construction from the west county boundary line to the western city limits of Cisco, Interstate 20 is due to be completed through the county by 1970, Resident Engineer R. P. (Buddy) Haun reported.

The meeting Wednesday was expected to be similar to that held in Ranger recently, at which the Highway Department officials explained that the purpose of discussing the "design" of the highway and not the "location."

The location was decided, the Department says, in a public hearing held by the Bureau of Roads in 1957.

Interstate 20 will enter the county along what is now U. S. 80, and the segment from the Callahan County line west to Cisco is scheduled for completion late in 1964. Estimates are that contracts will be let for the segment from the Baseline Road (southwest of Cisco) east around Eastland to a termination point on the east edge of Eastland, about mid-January, 1966.

842 Local S. S. Inquiries Made During 1963

A total of 842 persons in and around Eastland took pains in 1963 to find out for sure about their rights and responsibilities under social security, according to H. L. Weatherly, field representative from the Abilene district office who visits Eastland regularly.

Weatherly knows the above because he had that many personal interviews on his visits, with 180 claims applications for retirement, disability, or survivor benefits being filed with him.

He suggests that every person past the age of 62 who has not already checked up on potential social security checks, as well as those of any age under 65 who have become so severely disabled that they are unable to do any substantial gainful work, make certain to see him on one of his future visits here. He will be in Eastland on January 20 at 10 a. m. at the County Court Room.

R. A. Patterson Candidate For Post Of Sheriff

R. A. (Bob) Patterson of Ranger has authorized this newspaper to announce that he will be a candidate for the office of sheriff of Eastland County subject to action of voters in the coming May 2 Democratic primary election.

A native of Eastland County, Patterson is a graduate of Ranger High School and Ranger Junior College. He has been active in civic affairs and is post commander of the Ranger post of the American Legion.

His law enforcement experience includes duty as a special investigator for Pinkerton's National Detective Agency, Dallas, Chief of Police Ranger, and he currently is serving as city marshal at Cross Plains. Patterson also has attended courses and briefings relating to various facets of law enforcement conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"I feel that I am an experienced, physically fit officer," Patterson said in announcing his candidacy. "This is my first time to seek public office, and if elected I will work hard to make the citizens of Eastland County an honest and competent sheriff."

Patterson is a veteran of World War II and the Korean conflict. He served in the U. S. Navy as a petty officer and was awarded service ribbons for combat duty in both the European and Pacific theaters of operation with six battle stars. He also has a Navy unit commendation citation and ribbon.

A formal statement of his candidacy will be issued later.

Drive-In Window Service Begins Monday at Eastland National Bank

The convenience of drive-in banking is being added at Eastland National Bank, President H. T. Wilson has announced.

The new service begins Monday and will be available during regular banking hours, he said.

Beginning its 30th year of service in Eastland, Eastland National has expanded regularly and only recently announced the addition of savings accounts which began Jan. 1st.

Drive-in service was carefully engineered for the banking facilities and customers

will find the new service very easy to use. The drive-in attendant will be able to assist the customer with most services handled by inside tellers.

A customer will enter the drive-in entry from Commerce St. and exit onto Roswood St., Mr. Wilson said. He further suggested that customers enter by driving west on Commerce St., making a right turn into the drive-in which is wide and easy to follow, directly to the service window.

A teller will be in the window at all times, or may be summoned by means of a

push-button buzzer. Deposits, check cashings and other transactions can be handled through a special drawer, which when extended will be handy for the customer to reach from the inside of his automobile.

"We are happy to offer this new service," Mr. Wilson said, "and hope that our customers will avail themselves of the opportunity of using the quick drive-in banking facilities."

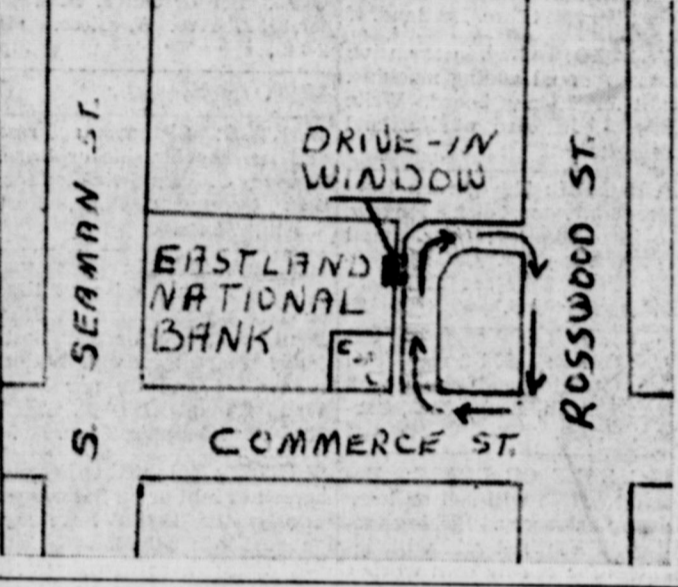
Bill Bourdeau, Ranger building contractor, was builder for the drive-in facilities, which are located at the rear of the bank.

Safest and most convenient route for going to the drive-in window is to turn from E. Main St. onto Roswood (a short north-south street one block east of Seaman); then turn right (west) onto Commerce St.; and then into the drive-in entry.

The development of the area behind the bank into the drive-in facilities and improved employee parking lot has enhanced the looks of the site.

A certain wall of block in modern design is attractive, and with the addition of posted lights, give the area an over-all colonial look.

The drive-in service window is covered with a canopy and customers will be protected from the elements by its cover as they handle their banking business.

However, the Ranger "bypass" a short segment skirting Ranger to the East, from a point on the present Highway 80 and the Lake Leon Road, northeast to a point near present Highway 80 and FM 571, is expected to be let during January of 1965.

The section eastward to the county line will probably be let in June, 1964. Last segment to be re-vamped to Interstate standards will be that from east of Eastland to a point where the Ranger bypass takes off. Contract for this area will probably be let in January of 1968.

Preliminary drawings and sketches, now on display at the Courthouse, the Cisco City Hall and the Engineer's Office in Eastland, indicate that there will be quite a few interchanges and separations on the Interstate Highway in this county.

One will be at the Baseline Road — U. S. 80 intersection, west of Cisco. Interstate 20 will then go due east, instead of veering back into Cisco (as present U. S. 80 does), and another interchange will be at other interchange is scheduled for the segment between Cisco and Eastland, probably at Plant Road.

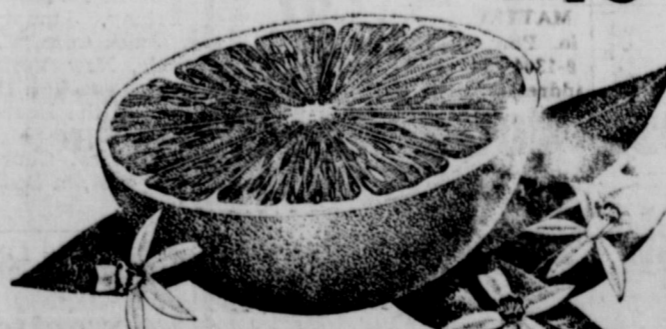

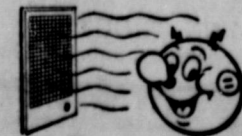

Presbyterians Begin 82nd Year

The year 1964 will mark the 82nd year since the First Presbyterian Church of Eastland was organized. The church, whose present Minister is Rev. Eugene H. Surface, is perhaps one of the oldest organized churches in Eastland. It was organized in 1882 and prior to this, Presby-

the Presbytery, but not of the local church. The Presbytery in turn sends delegates to the Synod, and to the General Assembly, which meet yearly.

There are two boards with in the local church. Session and Trustees. The pastor presides over the session. He is the Teaching Elder and is called by the local church and the call is ratified by the Presbytery. Elders of the local Session are Carl Johnston, Tom Wilson, Jack Germany, Virgil T. Seaberry, Jr., Richard Johnson, and Cyrus Frost. Trustees are John W. Thurman, J. W. Ashley, Carl Johnston, Jack Germany, and Tom Wilson.

Organist for the local church is Vance McCracken of Cisco. Services are held each Sunday with Church School at 10 a. m. and the Morning Worship at 11 a. m. The Women's Association of the church meets the first and third Tuesdays of each month.

The central Presbyterian doctrine is that God is Love and is absolutely sovereign over all that He has created. His purposes cannot be hindered. His Will is being, has been, and shall be done. As an architect, God has planned the whole house from the beginning. God chose His people before creation.

When man trusts in himself rather than in God, he sins. Man sins, but he cannot save himself from sin to faith. Only God can do this. Therefore, there are no grounds of boasting of man. Utter humility before God and unspeakable gratitude to Him is a primary Presbyterian emphasis.

Education is placed along side worship in importance for man must know God's will to do it. The minister is expected to teach the people so he must complete a full course of study before the church will ordain him.

Presbyterians define a church as wherever the Word of God is duly preached and the Sacraments rightly observed. The Sacraments are Baptism and the Lord's Supper. Baptism is administered by any mode desired, but sprinkling is the ordinary mode. Infants of believing parents are baptized as a recognition that God has called them to membership in the church. This service is primarily a realization by the parents that the child has been chosen by God to be His.

The child may later ratify this membership. The church accepts all baptisms performed in the name of the Trinity. Locally the Lord's Supper is observed the first Sunday in October, the first Sunday in Lent, five weeks before Christmas, the Thursday night before Easter, the day of Pentecost, and at any other times determined by the Elders.

"The Presbyterian Church has never thought of itself as having the whole of Christian truth; truth is too vast for 'hat', says Rev. Surface. 'But it exists to make certain Christian emphasis. We regard the Bible as the church's textbook because it is the Lord of God, the only infallible rule of faith and practice.'

"Religion is not a matter of man's feelings or of man's ideas. It is a matter of doing God's will, not to save ourselves or to satisfy our feelings, but to glorify God. God's will is central, not man's salvation. Man's chief destiny is to 'glorify God and enjoy Him forever,' Rev. Surface concluded.

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terians in this vicinity met in an old log church, built about 1873 on the old Carbon Road, on a little hill just northeast of the iron bridge across the South Leon. Armed men guarded the services and the preacher laid his six-shooter on the pulpit and had his rifle standing nearby, because of hostile Indians.

Other meeting places were at the ponds in front of where the Joe Weaver home now stands and where the Junior Athletic Field is now located. After the town of Eastland was organized, services were held upstairs in the old Aut Connelley Mill Building, which is now occupied by the Corner Drug Store.

In 1919, the church took on new life by re-organization. Services were first held in the Majestic Theatre, oc-

cupied now by the A and F Store. Later, the church met in the Christian Church Building, then in the old High School Building which was located where the Eastland Memorial Hospital now stands.

The original building at Walnut and Valley Streets was built and furnished in 1921. On July 1, 1954, the present place of Divine Worship, a beautiful Colonial sanctuary was dedicated. Since that time, the property has been enhanced in beauty, worth, and efficiency by the completion of the interior of the building, including air conditioning and heating equipment, foam rubber pews, a Celtic Cross and a Baldwin Church Organ.

Presbyterian organization in West Texas took place in the First Presbyterian Church of Eastland with the formation of the Presbytery of Abilene on Nov. 20, 1884.

The Abilene Presbytery held its 75th anniversary meeting in Eastland on September 10, 1959. This meeting was the last Stated meeting of this Presbytery of Abilene before the west half became a part of the Presbytery of Plains and the east half a part of the Presbytery of Brazos in January of 1960. Of the nine charter churches, only Eastland and Strawn remain.

Rev. Mr. Surface, came to the Eastland church on February 1, 1955 as its pastor. He had supplied this church from Trinity University where he was teaching, every weekend in the year 1937-38 for 12 months, in addition to being pastor in the west portion of this Presbytery in the early 1930's.

He is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, and McCormick Theological Seminary, Chicago. He did further graduate work in the school of Theology, Southern Methodist University, Dallas. Beginning his ministry in Lamesa, he also taught Bible and philosophy at Trinity University and was pastor of churches in Oklahoma. He, his wife, Melmadoris, and son, Mark, reside in the church manse located at 206 West Burkett.

Rev. Surface serves as president of the Eastland Ministers' Association which meets the first Monday of each month at 8 a. m. at the White Elephant.

"Presbyter" is the Greek word for "elder", and is found in its various forms in the New Testament more than 70 times. It refers to the branch of the Church which has government by elders who truly represent the people. Therefore, the Presbyterian Church has representative government. The local congregation is represented in the Presbytery by one elder. The minister is a member of
