Olden and Carbon high school students were challenged to select their careers carefully this week when Dr. Ted Nicksick, president of Ranger Junior College spoke at the annual Career Day program at the Olden school.

Two Accidents Reported By DPS One Fatality

One fatality resulted from a total of 16 accidents that occurred on Eastland County highways during the month of March, according to a report from the Department of Public Safety.

Six personal injuries and nine property damage accidents were included in the total number of 16. A total of 14 persons were injured and property accidents resulted in damages totaling \$10,660.00.

Total damage for the first three months totaled \$34,520.00 compared to the \$14,560.00 for the same period in 1962.

The 1963 fatality compared with none reported in January, February and March of 1962.

Eight personal injuries were reported during the three month period of 1963, while 13 were reported in 1962.

The 25 total for 1963 topped that of 23 in 1962.

A total of 39 accidents occurred in 1963 compared to the 31 in 1962.

Persons injured in 1963 were 27 while only 11 were injured during the same three month period of 1962.

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County Employment Tops 7,000; Industry Jobs Off

All population figures in Eastland County are up over 1960 except in two areas — manufacturing and agricultural employment.

Total county population reported by the Texas Employment Commission for April 1, 1962, is 20,045. That represents 519 more people in the county than was reported on the same date in 1960 (19,526). There were 19,640 that date in 1961, the Commission says.

The county labor force is up 175 over 1960. There were 7,255 "available" workers on April 1, 1962; 7,110 in 1961; and 7,080 in 1960, they report. Unfortunately unemployment is also up too, but with a very low figure of only five. There were only that many more unemployed in '62 (250), than in 1960 (245). Unemployment was greater in 1961 when 270 persons were without jobs on April 1.

Total employment in the county was up 170 and topped the 7,000 mark (by 5) for the first time in a long time. In 1960, the census reported 6,835 employed people; and 6,840 in 1961.

Totals were down in manufacturing (by 50) and agricultural (by 115). Both areas have declined in the past two years.

Non-manufacturing employment was up 335, with 5,485 reported in 1962; 5,295 in 1961; and 5,150 in 1960.

The report indicates that the area employment is trending toward service rather than farming and manufacturing.

Summer Rate Being Studied By Commission

Eastland residents may be in for a bargain water rate during the months of June, July and August.

During a special called city commission meeting Friday afternoon, Mayor Don Pierson proposed a reduced water rate, and the commission moved to study the matter and to take action at the next meeting date (May 20).

Pierson's proposal would increase the amount of water from 3 to 4,000 gallons for the minimum, at \$3.65, and reduce the per 1,000 gallon cost for all used over the minimum.

Presently water users pay \$3.65 minimum and 45 cents for each of the next four thousand gallons, and 40 cents a 1,000 for all over 10,000.

The new rate would be 45 cents for the first 1,000 over the minimum; 40 cents for the next 1,000; 35 cents for the next; and on down to 15 cents per thousand for all over 10,000.

"The rate will protect the revenue of the city and offer more water for less money," Pierson said, "if the people will use the water."

The other action the commissioners accepted a bid for a 1963 Ford standard size, for police use; granted permission to the fire department to install a base radio station in the fire hall; agreed to study air conditioning the city hall and metering all presently un-metered water distributed by the city.

Pecan Budding And Grafting School Attracts Good Crowd

Some 30 cities were represented by the approximately 100 persons who took part in the 7th annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School held at Cisco Junior College Thursday, April 18, by County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Mrs. Cooper veteran orchard expert, discussed the two methods most used in propagation of pecan trees during a morning session lecture session at the college cafeteria. These methods were the inlay graft, used principally in top working trees, and the patch bud, used both for top-working and for nursery budding.

Mr. Cooper had a supply of cold storage budwood to demonstrate how buds are cut, lifted and inserted. He showed the best kind of tools, including a double-bladed knife, for use in pecan budding.

Best time for budding trees is shortly after growth starts in the spring — April 15 to May 15 — for top-worked projects, Mr. Cooper said. This type of work should start with topping the trees during a dormant season.

Patch budding also can be used after trees are dehorned by cutting back the limbs in dormant seasons. As the young sprouts develop a bud, they can be budded in August or early September. The buds are set and allowed to unite for growth in the following spring, he said.

Mr. Cooper pointed out that papershell pecans are growing in value each year and that the planting and developing of an orchard of improved trees "represents an investment that will improve with the years."

The county agent was introduced by Don Kincaid, chairman of the agriculture committee of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the meeting. Kincaid extended a welcome to the visitors.

After lunch at the cafeteria, the group assembled at the Kent Word orchard south of Cisco and spent some two hours practicing budding on small trees there.

Medical Care Is Estimated At \$1,577,000 In This County

How much do residents of Eastland County spend a year for medical, dental and hospital care? What is their annual health bill, taking into account the amount they spend for health insurance?

According to recent studies, made by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and by the University of Michigan, the cost is going up rapidly in the local area and in most other sections of the country.

Because of the higher prices, especially for hospital care, the millions of Americans who see doctors, buy drugs or go to the hospital each month are finding that their health dollar is buying only two-thirds as much as it did 10 years ago.

In Eastland County, on the basis of the latest figures, the out-of-pocket expenditures for medical care amount to approximately \$84 per person per year, or 6.0 percent of net income.

Some 68 percent of this represents direct payments and the remainder the cost of health insurance.

In line with the rising prices that have been noted national-

ly, the current cost locally compared with capita 10 years ago.

These sums apply to private expenditures for health care. They include government medical care through private channels.

The Social Security Administration finds that the cost of medical care coming more expensively during the period of one year in the United States went up 9.8 percent.

home care, 8.9 percent; payments to physicians, 10.1 percent; and eyeglasses, 10.1 percent.

The net cost of insurance, meaning the difference between the cost for insurance and the amount paid by the carrier, rose 15.7 percent.

The American Medical Association, according to the latest figures, is spending \$1.5 billion a year for medical care. About 28 percent of this is met through health insurance.

In Eastland County, the overall cost of medical care in the one-year period estimated at \$1,577,000.

Social Security Payments Now \$217,450 For County

Monthly old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits in Eastland County now top \$217,450, R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager of social security in Abilene, said today on releasing his annual county benefit data report.

The new monthly figure represents an increase of 12 percent in beneficiaries and 12 percent in dollar amount over

the corresponding year.

"This increase is reflected in the law and to the benefit of our aged population," said Tuley. "As most of our population is now in the 65-74 age group, there is no longer that social security is helping to supplement income and spending many residents in County."

Survivors include her husband; one son, Rev. Fisher; one sister, Mrs. Ida Walker of McAllen; two grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

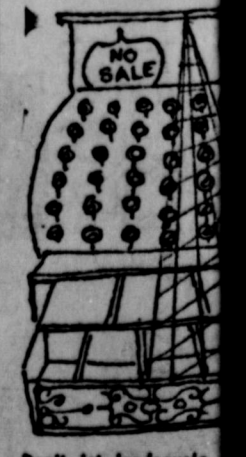

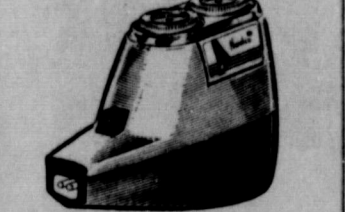

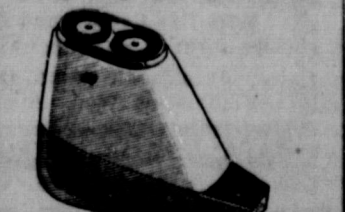

How long can you expect to keep your new refrigerator or range?

About 16 years if you follow the pattern of the average owner. This means you may trade it in, sell it, or give it away before it is completely worn out.

Many things affect the service life of an appliance. One is how well it fits the owner's needs and preferences. Research findings show, for example, that a range acquired with the purchase of a home may be kept a shorter time than one the homeowner chooses and buys separately.

Here are estimates of the "service life expectancy, purchased new, under one "owner" of several other types of household equipment:

Electric washing machines, automatic and semi-automatic, 11 years; dryer, 14 years; wringer and spin-dryer washing machines, 10 years; Freezers, 15 years; Vacuum cleaners, upright, 18 years, tank, 15 years; sewing machines, electric, 24 years; Toasters, automatic, 15 years; television sets, 11 years and living room wool rugs, 14 years.

These statistics should help the homemaker plan her budget. Some appliances will last longer than the average and some not as long, but if the homemaker is wise she will provide for replacement as items approach their average life expectancy.

How do the new long-life light bulbs compare with the customary kind? In the amount of light they give? In their life span? And their cost?

Consumer specialists in the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Rural Electrification Administration say the regular-type bulb is still your best bet — if you're looking for

a good, inexpensive light bulb costs about 25 cents. During the lifetime of the bulb (about 750) hours it will use up to 5 to 6 times its original cost in electricity.

This ratio, the experts say, is better than that of the long-life bulbs which cost consumers more both to buy and use.

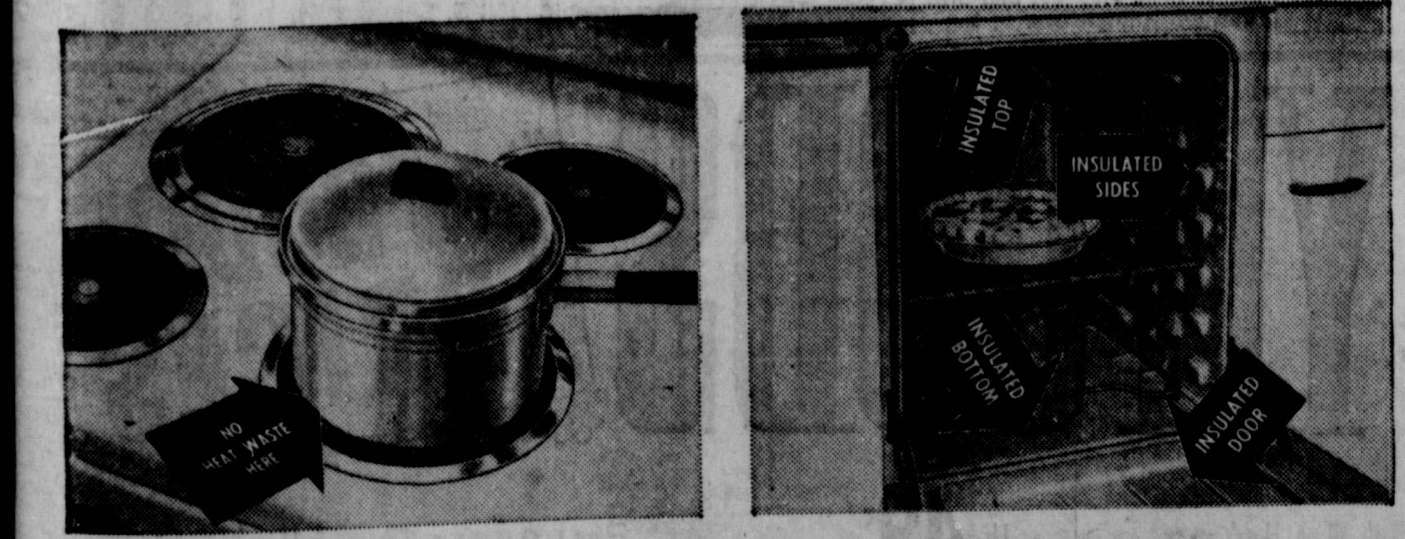
