Mrs. Cooper veteran orchard expert, discussed the two methods most used in propagation of pecan trees during a morning session lecture session at the college cafeteria. These methods were the inlay graft, used principally in top working tess, and the patch bud, used both for top-working and for nursery budding.

Mr. Cooper had a supply of cold storage budwood to demonstrate how buds are cut. lifted and inserted. He show ed the best kind of tools, including a double-bladed knife, for use in pecan budding.

Best time for budding trees in the spring - April 15 to May 15 - for top-worked projects, Mr. Cooper said. This type of work should start with topping the trees during a dormant season
