Farming Without Soil? It's Being Done Here

Farming without soil? It can't be done, you say? It is being done in Eastland County — and ironically, this most modern of farming methods is being carried on at one of the most historically significant locations in Eastland County.

C. L. Hash, 34-year-old Albany native, is growing stock feed "hydroponically" (without soil) on his farm on the banks of the old McGough Springs, seven miles southeast of Eastland.

The Springs in days of old, naturally attracted the first settlers to this area, and Hash's modern operations today may be the forerunner of farming methods of the future.

The venture is a joint undertaking by Hash and Bill McGough, a native of the county, now of Andrews.

McGough owns the land and the two young men are partners in the feed-producing, space-age style, operation.

Every day, Hash turns out a 1,000 pounds of high-protein, highly-platable feed. He uses four ingredients — Oat seeds, water, chemical fertilizer and "control".

He's had the plant in operation for six weeks and the present cycle of six days from seed to feed is proving to be a money-saver.

In an electrically-heated, thermostatically controlled 12 by 22 foot building, the trays of oat seeds grow to a seven-inch delicacy for stock in six days.

Temperature is kept at 68 to 72 degrees and with all the water inside the building, humidity is always high.

Saving? Well, Hash figures the feed is costing from \$9 to \$10 a ton, versus about \$40 a ton for alfalfa hay or \$20 for Johnson grass hay.

The facilities cost Hash \$8,000 completely installed, and "You've got to have the stock to be fed to justify the expense," he says.

Right now Hash is feeding 20 head of cattle, 117 goats and 42 hogs from the automated project. The calves didn't like the oat shoots at first, but they learned.

Today they line up at the feeding trough as soon as Hash turns on the auger that takes the ground fresh feed from the building right into the pens.

Every day Hash empties the "ripe" trays as feed, and refills them with 100 pounds of oat seeds. Chemical fertilizer is added to McGough Springs water, 225 gallons a day, and the pans are flooded automatically, from the top and soaking each in line.

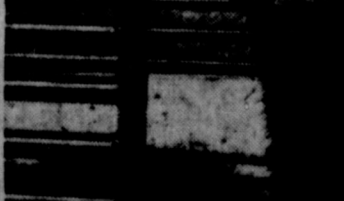
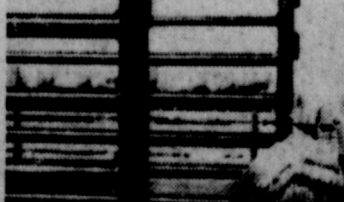
Two "coffee dispenser size" dippers of the fertilizer are used daily. Analysis is 15 per cent nitrogen, four per cent phosphate and 33 per cent potash, and the fertilizer costs \$7.50 for three pounds.

The finished feed has a 26 per cent protein content and other trace minerals which whet the appetite of the animals causing them to eat and gain from other, less rich food stuffs.

Hash and his wife, Beula Jo, have two children, Charla Jo, 3 and Mike, a Carbon High School fifth grader.

The amount of feed the plant produces, is equal to about that of a 100 acres of irrigated wheat pasture, Hash says.

Hearing for Curry Trial-Site Set Monday With 98 Witnesses

Almost 100 witnesses will testify in 91st District Court in Eastland Monday in another of what has become a long line of preliminary legal hurdles which grew out of the brutal murder of a Cisco church secretary almost two years ago.

Monday's decision will be whether Nathan Curry can or cannot get a fair trial in this county.

Basis of the plea by Curry's attorney, John Watts of Odessa, is that the case has had

so much publicity, that a jury of 12 unbiased jurymen couldn't be assembled in this county.

Without question, the case has generated publicity ever since the June, 1961, slaying of Mrs. Florence Hussey in her small home in Cisco.

But newsmen will be curtailed somewhat beginning Monday.

Judge T. M. Collie has announced that cameras, both still and motion, will be barred in his courtroom during the actual session.

Early in March when Watts came into the same courtroom and asked that Curry be released on bail, newsreel cameras ran almost constantly throughout the hearing directed at young Curry and at every principal in the case.

At that time, Curry was granted bail and released on a \$10,000 bond.

One other courtroom session in the enlogated case was played out in another court.

That was when Judge Milburn of the 90th District Court in Odessa granted Curry release from Gatesville School for boys, on a writ of habeas corpus.

Curry had been declared a delinquent by the Eastland County Court shortly after the murder and sent to the state reform school.

District Attorney Earl Conner Jr. has had 65 county residents subpoenaed for the Monday hearing, and Watts asked for 33 just this week.

The change of venue hearing has been postponed twice before. It was originally set for last Monday, and was set for Thursday on Watt's request due to illness, and then cancelled Thursday due to the illness of a relative of another attorney in the case.

There's a possibility that it could be postponed again because that person is still in critical condition.

Salt Deposit Is Located In Area Of Colony Creek

Eastland County may have another mineral available for commercial purposes — salt.

There appears to be an abundance of this commodity located just north of Eastland. There is a water basin lying along Colony Creek which is reported to have at least one pound of salt per gallon of water.

This is the report of the Corps of Engineers, according to Lee Ellis, chamber of commerce manager, who attended a Brazos River pollution seminar this past week.

Ellis reports that Engineers revealed that source of the pollution of the Brazos is believed to stem from the Eastland area salt beds. The salt flows south in Colony into the Leon River which joins the Brazos near Belton.

Ellis indicated that the Corps is considering drilling of deep wells for re-circulation of the saline water. The Eastland manager and Cisco Manager Larry Milner attended the meeting.

He has pastored churches in Illinois and was engaged in revival crusades all through that state and Texas. The public is invited to attend each service at "the country church with the country preacher."

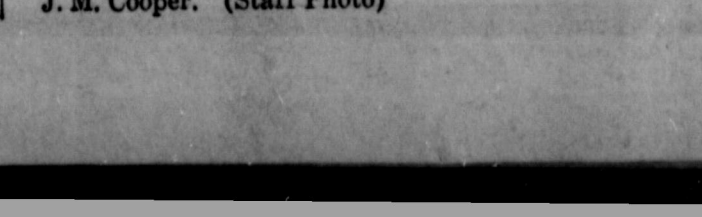
Expect Few Votes
