Social Security Payments Now \$217,450 For County

Monthly old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits in Eastland County now top \$217,450, R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager of social security in Abilene, said today on releasing his annual county benefit data report.

UF Here Among 73 In State

Eastland United Fund was among the 73 organizations in the state that topped their 1962-63 campaign goal, and the per capita giving of Eastlanders was only 33 cents below the national average.

During the drive last fall, Eastland topped its \$7,300 goal with \$8,059 — or 110.4 per cent, according to the Texas United Fund final report, just released.

The year before, Eastland topped its goal by 107.4 per cent.

The median Eastland donation was \$2.12 — based on population and total amount contributed. The national average for communities of less than 25,000 is \$2.45, the report said.

JAYCEE ELECTION Politics Take Many Turns Leading to Saturday Vote

A few tickets are still available for Saturday night's Jaycee election banquet at which candidates, managers and club members climb into the boiling political arenas to pick their leadership for the coming year.

Glyn Gilliam and Glenn Scallorn were named candidates for the president's post, but an, as yet unannounced, third candidate appears to be in the race.

The election banquet will be at Lone Cedar Country Club beginning at 7 p. m. Tickets may be secured from members of the club.

The nominating committee named two candidates for each office with a campaign manager for each. The "mystery" group is expected to make its nominations from the floor (as is permitted), but have not made public their slate of officers.

Other posts and candidates include: John Bailey and Dick Johnson are seeking the first vice presidency posts.

Tommy Magness and Roger Blackmon, second vice president; and Ben Lancaster and Dick Dixon, secretary-treasurer.

The campaigning has been going on furiously since the nominations, and it appeared at mid-week that legal action might result from the melee.

Smith, also retiring president, indicated that the "splinter" group may not be permitted speaking time at the regular campaign session because they have failed to make previous arrangements with the club.

The splinter group had two campaigns going this past week, its spokesman said, one was the active "buying" of votes of Jaycee club members and the other was the active solicitation of funds for that purpose.

HALLMARK'S APPEAL

In his defense, Grover Hallmark appealed to the County Court and the following decree was signed by the County Judge:

It is so ordered by the Court.

EASTLAND MEMORIAL LAB IS A BUSY, VITAL SITE

"Clinical laboratories are a very important part in the practice of modern medicine." That's the report of Mrs. Cletis Williamson of Ranger, who is in charge of the laboratory at Eastland Memorial Hospital.

With the discovery of the wonder drugs and the many newer drugs which are constantly being discovered, the laboratory's importance is increasing.

Such is the case at Eastland Memorial. The "lab" is a very busy place. Other technicians are Mrs. Elizabeth Hatcock, also of Ranger, and Mrs. Sheri June Cate of Eastland.

The local hospital laboratory is equipped and staffed to furnish the doctor with accurate reports on hundreds of different kinds of tests on human blood and other body fluids.

The blood count presents the doctor a general picture of the patient's blood condition, such as anemia, infections, malaria, leukemia, and may indicate infection in other areas of the body.

The blood count or any other laboratory procedure of the body fluids does not in itself form a final diagnosis of the patient's condition, but is a diagnostic aid to the physician in forming his diagnosis correlated with his clinical findings, the local technicians will tell you.

"Not many years ago the transfusion of human blood from one person to another was a dangerous procedure and often cause reactions and other complications," Mrs. Williamson said.

Because of the hazards involved, this procedure was seldom resorted to. Today with discovery of many new blood types and other blood factors, such as the RH, the transfusion of blood is a completely

He lived with his parents in a public housing unit and at-

tended public schools where he participated in the free lunch program.

He entered the Army and upon discharge, retained his national life insurance. Later he enrolled in the State University, working part time at the State capitol to supplement his G.I. educational

check.

Upon graduation, he married a public health nurse and bought a home with an F.H.A. loan, then obtained a small business loan to go into business.

His baby was born in a city hospital. Later he bought a small ranch with the aid of the Veterans Land Program and obtained emergency feed from the government.

Later he put part of his land in the soil bank and payments soon paid off his ranch. His father and mother lived on the ranch very comfortably on their social security checks. R.E.A. lines supplied the electricity, the government helped him clear his land, the county agent showed him how to terrace it, and the government built him a fish pond. Then one day he wrote his congressman—

"I wish to protest these excessive governmental expenditures and attendant high tax-

es. I believe in rugged individualism. I think people should stand on their own feet without expecting a hand-out. I am opposed to all socialistic trends and demand a return to the policies of States Rights."
