## Curry Trial Will Be Held In Eastland County

### May Trial Date Anticipated

Nathan Curry will be tried for murder in Eastland County.  
 Judge T. M. Collie decided after three and a half days of testimony by over 125 witnesses that young Curry can get a fair trial in his home county.  
 Curry's attorney, John Watts of Odessa, said that the decision is not appealable, but would be held as a point of error in case of a later conviction.  
 Attorney's arguments were completed at 2:30 p. m. Thursday and Judge Collie recessed the court for an hour and a half. At 4 p. m. he reconvened the court and announced that in his opinion there does not exist such prejudice in this county that would prevent Curry from receiving a fair trial.  
 District Attorney Earl Conner Jr. announced late this week that he will seek a May trial date. Judge Collie said that the exact date will probably depend on Attorney John Watts' schedule.  
 In his closing argument Watts recalled the testimony of many of his 71 witnesses in which persons had said prejudice against the youth does exist to the extent that a fair trial couldn't be held here.  
 "The liberty of this boy is at stake," Watts said, and told Judge Collie, "This trial here today is the deciding point for the boy."  
 Watts recalled the horror of the crime, the character standing of the murdered Mrs. Florence Hussey, and told how Mayor John Webb of Cisco had employed Fort Worth crime specialists to solve the "hideous" crime so that the people of Cisco might be safe.  
 He said that a regar dress where the trial is held, he

(Watts) intends to see that the confession, which he claimed was obtained illegally is not admitted as evidence. District Attorney Earl Conner Jr. objected when Watts attempted to tell about the flower pot and explain that it was not the murder weapon.  
 Watts recalled Mrs. Ellen Justice's testimony in which she said, "You can't read that (about the confession and the flower pot) without knowing that he is guilty."  
 "No man on earth but Jesus Christ Himself could help but be prejudice about Nathan after hearing and readings such things," Watts said.  
 Watts quoted Shakespeare, Nathan Hale and numerous legal cases in his argument to show that Nathan Curry couldn't get a fair trial in this county.  
 In his closing argument Conner explained that the "pendulum of sentiment" now leans toward Curry and that whereas at one time perhaps the majority of the people in Cisco might have been prejudiced against him, that today according to state witnesses, the percentage is nearer fifty-fifty.  
 "There is a growing sympathy for the boy and perhaps the state should be seeking the change of venue so that justice may be done," Conner said.  
 He asked Judge Collie to consider the extent of prejudice, and the element of time. "Time is of the essence for the defendant in any criminal case," he said.  
 "Prejudice is less today and Nathan Curry could get a fair trial in this county," he closed.  
 Watts in his closing rebuttal said, "Earl (Conner) talks as though Eastland County has a vested interest in having the boy tried here. Perhaps the county should want it moved."

## Four Accidents Are Reported Abilene Man Fatally Injured

Four separate automobile accidents, one which claimed the life of an Abilene man, occurred the past week on Eastland County highways.  
 James A. Richardson of Abilene lost his life Tuesday when he lost control of the pickup he was driving. The vehicle overturned three times coming to rest against a tree .5 miles west of Eastland.  
 Richardson was taken to the Eastland Memorial Hospital where he died from brain injuries.  
 The deceased man's brother, Charles C. Richardson, his wife and two sons, all of Houston, were enroute to Eastland Wednesday morning when they were in collision with a 1961 Chevrolet driven by Jewel Petree of Carbon, a student at Cisco Junior College.  
 This accident occurred on Highway 183, four miles south of Cisco.  
 No one was injured and minor damage was reported on both vehicles.  
 A 1954 Chevrolet driven by Theodore Hageman, 70, of Route two, Cisco and a 1963 Chevrolet pickup driven by Samuel Kenneth Acuff of McKinney collided Sunday on Highway 80, 4.1 miles west of Cisco.  
 Mrs. Bertha Hageman, 65, a passenger, was reported in serious condition with a broken collarbone and abrasions.  
 Receiving minor injuries were Mrs. Dorothy Acuff and two daughters, Sharla and Bridgett.  
 A fourth accident occurred Monday evening on Highway 16, 10.9 miles south of Strawn when a pickup struck a cow.  
 Driver of the pickup left the scene of the accident unidentified.  
 A 1962 Falcon, registered to Eunice Lloyd of Grayford, Tex., then struck the cow, completely demolishing the car.  
 An unidentified man and woman were reported to have been injured.  
 Highway Patrolman E. M. Rogers reported several people at the scene of the fatal accident. He expressed his appreciation for the aid given the injured man, but stated that several personal items belonging to the injured party were lost. He urges the public to please leave such items as they are found.

Warts can turn up anywhere on the body, but are most common on the hands, fingers and soles of the feet. Girls are four or five times more likely to have warts than boys, but in adults the incidence is about the same for both sexes. Warts are contagious and are started by contact with the virus that causes them.

The plantar warts (those on the soles of the feet) cause the most trouble. These are most common in adolescents and adults with moist feet. Plantar warts occur most of

ten at points of pressure and sometimes can be confused with painful calluses. They can be most uncomfortable, even making walking painful.

Physicians generally use either an electric needle or a freezing process to remove warts. Either process will work and the choice is up to the individual doctor.

For some unknown reason, warts sometimes can be "charmed" away by suggestion. Mark Twain readers still recall the stumpwater and dead cat remedies of Tom Sawyer. If the patient firmly believes the remedy will cure

warts, sometimes it will. Sometimes the physician will destroy the largest wart and then find that the smaller ones go away without further treatment.

If a wart is so located that it is constantly irritated and causes discomfort, such as a facial wart that gets in the way of shaving, or is unsightly, it is advisable to have it removed.

Most of the non-prescription wart remedies contain acid. These could cause harmful burns if the patient did not follow directions carefully.

If you have a wart that is located in an irritating spot or is causing an unsightly appearance, consult your doctor and follow his advice on whether it should be removed and what removal procedure to follow.

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**Senior Citizens  
May Be Missing  
Extra Income**

Some 875 persons past age 65 in the Abilene district will soon have received a reminder that they may be overlooking an income possibility from social security, reports R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager for the Social Security Administration. Such letters have been going out in small batches for the past several months.

The electronic records-keeping equipment in the Baltimore headquarters of SSA has noted that these people are over age 65, seem to have enough credits on their records to be insured for retirement benefits, apparently had little or no earnings in 1961 (the last complete calendar year fully posted), and have not filed claims as yet. Most of those contacted in a pilot study last summer hadn't filed claims because they had mistaken ideas about how long one must be covered by social security to be insured. Due to the 1960 and 1961 amendments, the time requirement has been cut in half from earlier law. Now one need have social security credits for 1/4 of the time after 1950 (or age 21, if later) and before age 62 for women or age 65 for men, to be eligible for retirement payments. The retirement test was also liberalized by those amendments, Tuley added, and everyone past age 62 should look into the possibility of collecting some social security checks even though still actively employed or self-employed for some or all of the year. The social security representative will be in Cisco at the Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday, April 10, 1963, at 10 a. m.
