Rather, it distinguishes between physical and spiritual death. It proclaims that the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ have removed forever the sting and horror of death and utter defeat. Death is swallowed in victory in Christ.

And, because Christ came forth from the grave He can help us in our every trial and heartache of life.

The message of Easter means to me that it is the Pillar and Ground of the Christian Faith. The message of Easter is positive, not negative. The empty tomb is the gateway to glory.

"But if there be no resur rection of the dead, then is Christ not risen: and if Christ be not risen, then is our preaching in vain, and your faith is also vain . . . if Christ be not raised, your

faith is vain; ye are yet in your sins. "Then they also which are






