## 6 CANDIDATES Eastland Voters Will Select Three School Trustees Saturday

Eastland voters will go to the polls Saturday for the second time this week.

The polls will open at 8 a. m. Saturday at the County Court house for the election of three Eastland Independent School District trustees.

Three incumbents are opposed by three other candidates in the race for the three-year board posts.

Incumbents are president M. H. Perry, Hood King and H. T. (Herb) Weaver. The three have combined total of 34 years on the local school board.

Running for the first time are Mike George, Willard Griffin and Dr. Bob Alexander.

E. E. (Ed) Layto will be election judge, and he has named C. M. Murphy and J. H. Pittman as election clerks.

King and Weaver are both running for their third elective terms. Both were appointed to fill unexpired terms in 1951.

Perry is seeking his fifth elective term, having been elected for the first time in 1950. He has served as board president for ten years.

A seventh candidate for school trustee, Dale Troutt, removed his name from the slate shortly after announcing and entered the city commission race.

Announcing at the same time as Troutt were Willard Griffin, co-owner and manager of Coats Furniture Ltd., and Dr. Bob Alexander, local physician.

Entering the race just before the filing deadline was George, who is manager of Hollywood-Vassarette here.

Dr. Alexander, 33, a native of the Gordon area, has been associated with B&W Clinic since coming here four years ago following his discharge from the Army.

He is a graduate of Tarleton State College, the University of Texas and the Medical Branch in Galveston.

Licensed in 1955, he entered at Breckenridge Hospital in Austin and was commissioned as captain in the Army and served in Germany.

He and his wife Sue, have two children and live at 207 S. Oaklawn.

Griffin, 38, is a native of Lampasas and has lived here almost seven years. He and his wife Onella have two children and live at 415 E. Conner.

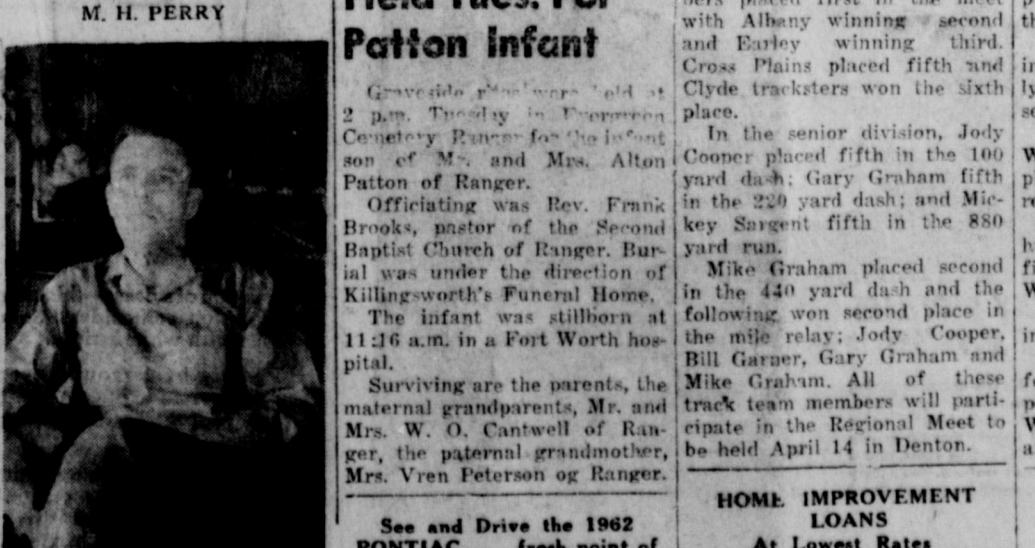
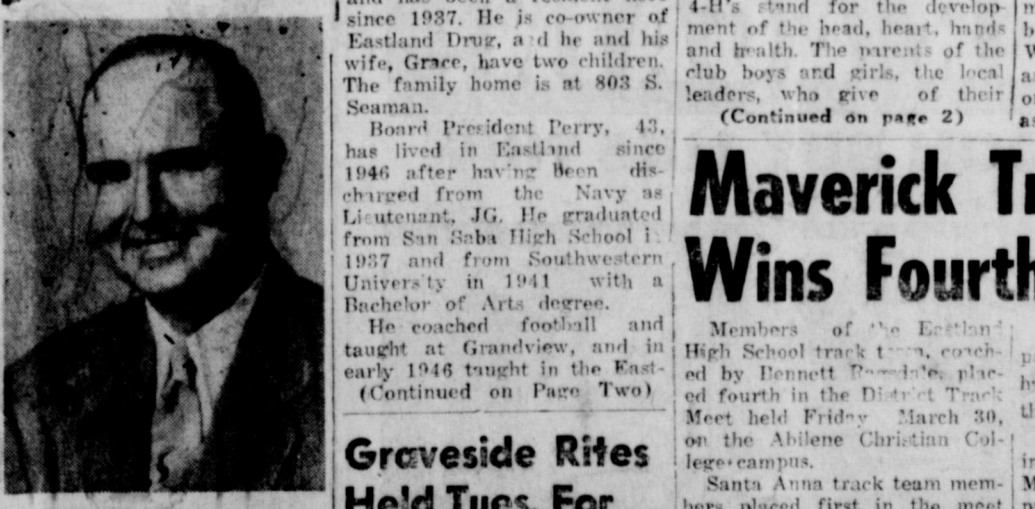
A member of First Methodist Church, he is a co-leader in the Explorer Scouts and has been an adult leader in Scout work for about ten years.

Weaver was born in DeLeon and has been a resident here since 1937. He is co-owner of Eastland Drug, and he and his wife, Grace, have two children. The family home is at 803 S. Seaman.

Board President Perry, 43, has lived in Eastland since 1946 after having been discharged from the Navy as Lieutenant, JG. He graduated from San Saba High School in 1937 and from Southwestern University in 1941 with a Bachelor of Arts degree.

He coached football and taught at Grandview, and in early 1946 taught in the Eastland.

## IN RECORD VOTE Pierson, Seaberry Win City Commission Seats

Investments man Don Pierson and Attorney Virgil Seaberry Jr. out-poled a slate of six candidates Tuesday to win City Commission seats, in what was the heaviest city vote in Eastland in many years.

In all, 770 Eastlanders went to the City Hall polls and distributed their votes this way:

Pierson, 377; Seaberry, 311; Incumbent Mayor Cyrus Frost Jr., 303; Druggist Dale Troutt, 276; Restaurant operator Harry Jordan, 131; and Plumber T. C. Brown, 92.

There was one write-in vote for A. J. Taylor.

Mayor Frost was seeking his fourth term on the commission.

Voting was heavy all day long. At 1:15 p. m., there had been 310 votes and at 6:30, 623 votes.

Guy Parker, election judge, and his clerks had the ballots tabulated within 30 minutes after the polls closed at 7.

Pierson, 36, has lived in Eastland about nine years and is associated in several endeavors including The Village Hotel, the Fiesta Bowling Lanes, Village Construction Co., and others.

He is a native of Abilene.

Seaberry, 38, is a native Eastlander and is a law partner in the Eastland firm of Turner and Seaberry.

Other commissioners who will serve with the new members are T. M. Fullen, Bob Perkins and Jack Germany.

Eastland National Bank President Tom Wilson's term expired this year, and he did not seek re-election.

The next commission meeting will be Monday, April 17th.

In 1959 there were 43 votes; in 1960, 76; and 1961, 90.

## Champion Stock Brings Premium Prices in Sale

Winning exhibitors in the Eastland Livestock Show claimed approximately \$1,800 in prize money at the show last week end, and earned good prices in sales at the Eastland Livestock Auction that followed.

The champion calf, shown by David Rogers of Ranger, brought 50 cents a pound and champion pig brought the same price.

The four champion lambs brought 50 cents a pound, with the five Eastland County banks buying the championship stock.

Jack Whitten of Eastland won the showmanship awards and a \$10 prize for the lamb division. Ricky Whitley of Cisco took the same in the swine division; and Sandra Warlock, Rising Star 4-H'er, won the prize for the calf division.

Eastland Auction Co. sponsored the showmanship prizes.

In all there were 111 lambs, 63 pigs and 23 calves sold at premium prices at the sale.

agents are to be complimented time, and the county extension and congratulated on their fine program of work. The problems arising relative to juvenile delinquency in the county are kept at a minimum because of 4-H Club and other youth activities.

Your Commissioners' Court has never refused to help our aged people of our county or any family who was in dire need of help, medical help or hospital care since I became your County Judge.

When I became your County Judge, the Commissioners' Court appointed a County Veterans officer for each American Legion Post in the county, to assist the Disabled War Veterans, their widows and dependents in securing Federal Aid. Last year these Veterans Officers secured \$570,429.00 for these disabled war veterans and their dependents of Eastland County.

We have maintained sufficient money in our Road and Bridge funds to purchase Right-of-Ways on all Farm-to-Market roads, and the County's part of Right-of-Ways on State Highways being built or improved in the county. Under our present plans, we will be able to keep an ample amount of money in the Road and Bridge funds to finance all Right-of-Way costs for several years in the future. We have done this without raising your taxes.

When I became County Judge and a member of the Commissioners' Court, the county owed \$708,190.00, which included the Court House debt of \$150,000.00. We have paid off the Court House debt and have paid off the balance of the \$4 1/2 million Road Board debt. On April 1, 1962, we have cash on hand, \$287,865.20. The total indebtedness of the county is \$97,786.09. Only five counties of the 254 counties of this state have a lower tax rate than Eastland County. So, you can see that the financial condition of Eastland County is in the best shape than for many years.

If I happen to fail to see you during the campaign, I am now asking your help and support on May 5th.

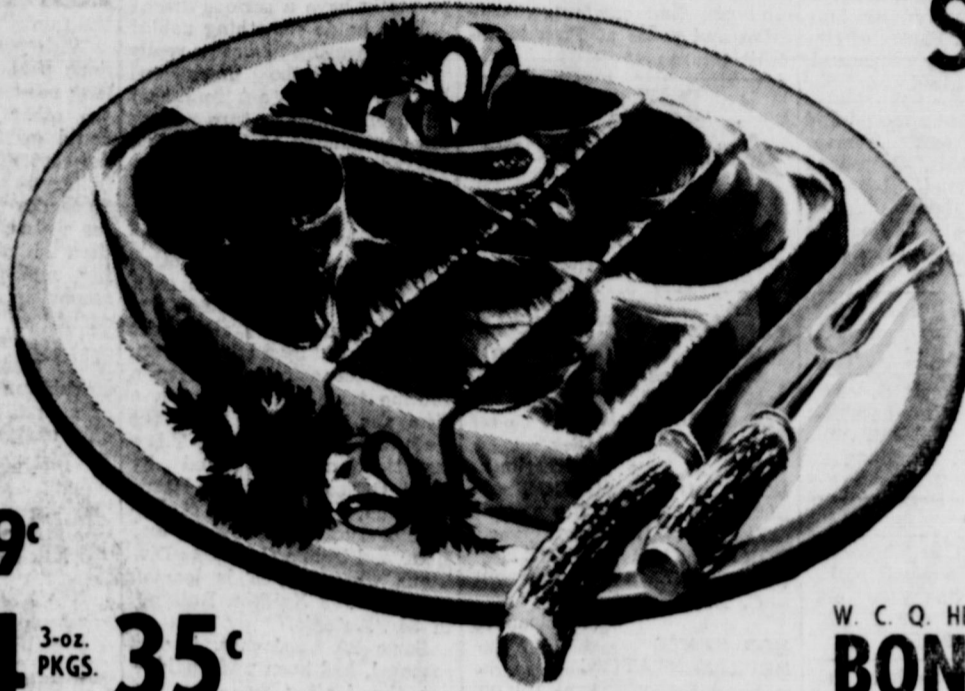

Date for the annual Pecan Budding School has been set for April 17 in the Cisco Junior College Cafeteria, according to Eastland County Agriculture Agent J. M. Cooper, who will instruct those attending the one day affair.

## 'All-Stars' Announced

Names of the 20 bandsmen who earned "All-Star" ratings have been announced.

The local stage band was selected one of the four first-rank groups, out of 11 competing here last Saturday.

Bands from Stephenville, San Saba, Eastland and Gorman were selected the best of 11 competing in the Invitational Stage Band Festival.

Stephenville picked up honors in the 3-A class, while San Saba won Class 2-A honors. Eastland was judged the best in Class A and Gorman earned top rating in Class B.

Other bands participating in the event included Breckenridge, Ranger, Cisco, DeLeon, Hamilton, Cross Plains and Santa Anna.

Phill Hewett, Eastland band director, was in charge of the event.

Judges for the festival were Gene Smith, Director of Ector High School Band in Odessa; and John Giardona of the Texas Christian University stage band at Fort Worth.

Some 700 students and visitors attended the event. An all-star band composed of 20 students was selected after the performance and received sleeve patches for their uniforms.

The budding school will again be sponsored by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce jointly with the Agriculture Extension Service Cooper said.

The morning session starting at 9 a.m., in the college cafeteria, will be devoted to lectures and demonstrations on when, where and how to bud, types and kind of budwood, when not to bud, covering the bud, when and how to force the buds into growth and the difference between budding and grafting.

After lunch in the cafeteria the group will practice budding in the Kent Word orchard, 3 miles south of Cisco in the Leon River bottom.

A plentiful supply of cold storage pecan budwood of the new varieties such as the Wichita, the Comanche, the Choctaw and the T-110 will be available for those desiring it. The grand champion entry of nuts at the Texas Pecan Show at Texas A & M College in January was of the T-110 variety. It, along with the other new varieties was developed at the U. S. Pecan Field Station at Brownwood, Cooper explained.

A. Z. Myrick, chairman of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce Agriculture Committee will welcome the group to Cisco to initiate the days activities. Myrick said the pecan growers of nearby counties are as welcome to attend as those from Eastland County.
