Texzona Petroleum, Inc., Abilene, has completed the former Delmo Wadsworth, Monahans, No. 1 M. L. Woods, 2,386 feet from south and 540 feet from west lines of W. F. Davis survey, as a dry gas discovery from the conglomerate five miles northeast of Ranger in Eastland County.

Carbon Considers Un-Incorporation To Get Streets, Roads Maintained

The unincorporation of the City of Carbon is being considered and the county commissioners court will probably be petitioned soon, asking an election for that purpose.

Fear of impassable streets in the little town 10 miles south of Eastland is prompting citizens to consider the disbanding of the city body.

About 40 Carbonites met Monday evening at the high school and discussed the pros and cons of the incorporation. As long as the city is incorporated, the county cannot maintain its streets.

Until last fall the county had helped maintain streets in the smaller towns in the county but at that time a group asked, and was granted an injunction in 91st District Court forbidding the use of county equipment for maintenance of private property.

So the streets in Carbon have deteriorated since, and each rain makes them more impassable. The limited Carbon treasury isn't able to pay for street repairs.

A straw vote was taken at the meeting Monday night and 18 voted in favor of keeping the incorporation, and 14 voted against.

Carbon Mayor John Guy presided and spoke in favor of continuing the city body even

February Begins Wet; Over Inch Of Rain Already

(See Related Chart, Page 6) More than an inch of rain fell in Eastland early this week as February got off to a damp start.

Monday night's showers left 1.20 inches Official Weather observer James Smith reported.

January closed out as a moist month with a total of 2.48 inches, with .62 of an inch of that total resulting from 3 1/2 inches of snow.

The snow came in the middle of January (the 16th) and all other days were dry except the last two, when 1.46 fell on the 30th, and .40 on the 31st.

Heavy fog continued with the showers, and thunder and lightning was heavy Monday night. No damage was reported from the thundershowers.

Eastland County's January weather ran the entire scale of noted "Texas weather" with every conceivable display of inconsistency.

A temperature difference of 67 degrees was recorded on six days, from 5 degrees on Jan. 14 to 72 degrees during the week of Jan. 20.

Traces of rain and a full-blown sandstorm on Jan. 19 were followed by several days of early-morning fog.

On Jan. 29, however, rain, slow and gentle, began to fall with Eastland measuring 2.40 inches in two days. Other towns recorded just under 2 inches. Moisture total for the month in Eastland is 2.48 inches, including the snow.

Not to be outdone, the last day of the month had early fog which restricted visibility to about two city blocks.

You won't find it marked on calendars or in almanacs—but a distinct season has just got underway. It's the "campaigning" season, and it is traditionally marked by the passing out of candidate cards and the shaking of hands.

4,058 Poll Taxes Sold In 3 Towns

A total of 2,652 poll taxes were sold at the tax assessor-collector's office in Eastland, and reports from two substations have not been turned in.

A total of 798 was sold in Ranger and 598 in Cisco through Wednesday when that station ran out of receipts.

A tax office deputy will collect the receipt books from the sub-stations this week, it is reported. Poll taxes were sold at Cisco, Ranger, Gorman and Rising Star.

Questioned about the "shortage" of receipt books this year, a tax office deputy explained that sufficient tax receipts had not been on hand. The office had ordered four books, believed to be enough with what was already on hand. However, when the books arrived it was found that the new books contained only 50 receipts per book, rather than the customary 200.

So the substitution at Cisco ran short, as did the county tax office, and deputies were forced to use old (1962) receipt books, marking through the "1962" and writing in "1963."

continue through February, March and April, and be culminated on Saturday, May 2nd, when the Democratic Primary election is held.

The filing deadline is passed. Deadline for paying poll taxes is passed. So now it's a matter of announced candidates getting the word to the qualified voters.

And Eastland County voters will have a field day with their ballots. There are contests on the state and district levels, as well as county and precinct battles.

And the ballot may look different itself. Its top part may carry the races for the two federal positions, and be available to all who comply with whatever rules are made for national voting. The bottom part of the ballot would contain the state, district, county and precinct races, and be available to only those who hold poll tax receipts, it is reported. Decision on the ballot is still undecided.

Some contend that since the May election is a "Democratic Primary" there should be no difference in requirements.

U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough, will meet John Van Cronkhite, a former campaign organizer for former Gov. Allan Shivers.

Veteran Congressman Omar Burleson of the 17th District (including Eastland County) is opposed by Max Carriker of Roby.

Governor John Connally is opposed by Houston Attorney

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, Treasurer Jesse James, comptroller Robert S. Calvert, Railroad Commissioner Ben Ramsey, Supreme Court Associate Justices Ruel Walker and Robert W. Hamilton and Court of Criminal Appeals Judge K. K. Woodley are opposed in the Democratic primary.

One of the most crowded democratic state races pits former state senator Robert Baker of Houston and Bill Elkins of Greenville against Rep. Joe Pool of Dallas for

Postal Official Tells Lions Of Post Office Magnitude

The United States Post office is the greatest communications device in the world, Allan Dupree of Dallas, assistant regional director of the Post Office Department, told the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday.

Explaining what a giant the postal authority is, Mr. Dupree pointed out that there are 587,000 employees, whose salary accounts for 80 per cent of the total postal budget.

Operating in 25,000 leased buildings, the P. O. handled 70 billion pieces of mail last year. There are 32,000 rural carriers covering a million and a half miles a day, he said.

Commenting on recent statements concerning the efficiency of the British postal service over that of the U. S., Mr. Dupree said "It's just not true." The City of New York postal services handles more mail with fewer employees than the British service, he said.

Mr. Dupree especially urged the use of the ZIP code and the practice of early mailing. ("Mailing early in the day, every day, not just at Christmas, he pointed out.")

He outlined what the figures in Eastland's ZIP code stand for. The local number is 76448. The "7" refers to a general geographical area (either Texas or Louisiana); the "64" refers to the second section (Stephenville in our case); and the "48" is the post office, Eastland.

making arrangements with the county to hire the street work done.

It would take about eight hours, at some \$10 an hour, to drag all the streets; about a week to "pull" all the ditches; and about \$3.50 a running foot for "tin whistles" to drain the streets properly, he told them.

With a population of 309, Mayor Guy said that most were older people.

Several in the group were strongly in favor of disbanding the city body, and others were just as outspoken in wanting to continue as a city. The meeting was orderly and lasted about an hour and a half.

Desdemona, in the extreme southeast part of the county, tried unsuccessfully in 1935 to incorporate, and then succeeded in 1942, and has operated as such since, with the county taking care of its streets.

It was pointed out that it might be possible to get the injunction modified, and sev-

eral encouraged getting an official opinion from the state attorney general's office concerning the situation as it applies to Carbon.

Utility spokesmen told the Carbon people that their companies wouldn't raise rates if the city unincorporated and W. E. Browning of Gorman, manager for Texas Electric Service Co., said that rates in Carbon, Gorman and Desdemona are the same. If any are raised, all would be raised, he said.

The city tax is now 25 cents on the \$100 valuation, and Mayor Guy guesses that it might take an increase of up to \$1.50 to provide what the city needs to maintain streets. Editor Merritt Dunn guessed that there are 101 "taxable" homes in the town.

T. C. Wylie, operator of the peanut drying facilities in Carbon, spoke in favor of continuing the city body. "I'm an incorporation man," he said. "There'll be a burden on some if you do, and there'll be burdens on some if you don't."

Supt. Travis Spence questioned Judge Bailey and Commissioner Justice specifically about the procedure for presenting a petition.

And the meeting ended with the indication that a petition would be circulating soon in Carbon for unincorporation.





But Small One...

IT'S BACK TO THE ENGINE ROOM FOR LESTER TROUT

"I've been in an engine room for about 40 years, and following retirement will take a short vacation and then go back to another engine room," says Lester Trout, operator in Lone Star Gas Company's Ranger Compressor Department, who retired January 31 after 20 years with the Company.

But the new engine room will be quite a bit different from the huge, noisy engine room at Plant 3 in Ranter. The new one will be filled with sounds of lawn mowers and car motors. "This spring, my brother and I are going to open a little repair shop in Eastland for lawn mowers and cars," he says. "Most of our work will be done on lawn mowers but we will be working on automobiles a lot, too."

Mr. Trout started his Lone Star career on December 21, 1943, as a relief man at Plant 103 in Ranter. He worked there until March 11, 1944, when he moved to the Compressor Department. In 1956 the referee moved to Breckenridge Compressor Station as an operator. He had been at Breckenridge until February 1, 1963, then he moved back to Ranger Plant 3. "I've always felt Ranter and Eastland were my homes and two years ago we bought a home in Eastland that we were planning to rent out until my retirement when we'd move back from Breckenridge. But the arrangement didn't work out, so when the job at Plant 3 opened, I asked for the transfer."

Born in Stephenville on January 3, 1899, he moved with his parents to Thurber when he was young. When he was 17 years old he went to work in the coal mines at Thurber. In 1919, Mr. Trout came to Ranter with the Texas and Pacific Coal and Oil Company. He next worked for the Arab Gasoline Company for 20 years until the company went out of business in 1943. Because of his engine room experience, he was hired immediately by Johnny Bates, then assistant superintendent of Plant 103.

Although he's never officially worked as a mechanic, he has always liked to "tinker" around with motors and the look and sound of his own car can attest that mechanic work is his hobby.

"My wife and I will probably take a trip to New Mexico before we settle down to the

repair shop. We want to visit with our son, Earl, who lives in Oil City, N. M. And we'll probably take other small trips, too."

Mr. and Mrs. Trout, who were married on September 17, 1919, won't have to go very far to visit any of the other of his nine children. Most live in Eastland and the other three live in nearby towns. The couple's children are Earl of New Mexico, Billie Jo of Abilene, Laverne of Breckenridge, Joy of Valley Mills, and Lester, Virgil, Gene, Barbara, Mildred, all of Eastland.

Mr. Trout had to stop and count his grandchildren "We have 20 now. My wife counted them the other day."

Every year the Trout family gets together in Eastland for a family reunion, and his mother, who is 84 years old, is the "queen of the meeting." When all of the relatives get there, "we have had as many as 130 people in attendance."

Besides his repair shop, Mr. Trout plans to "work around the place" a little and keep active in the Church of Christ at Eastland.



chicken with peaches was a very much enjoyed by my family; they all said, "Let's have this again." It is a feast for the eyes as well as the tummy as it makes such an attractive dish.

I thought your readers might like to have another recipe combining chicken and fruit. This one has long been a favorite in our house and a faithful standby when company is coming as it can be made a day ahead.

Chicken South Pacific

Ingredients:
1-3 cup margarine
1-¼ cups chopped celery
½ medium green pepper, cut in thin strips
2-3 cup drained canned pineapple tidbits
4 tablespoons flour

3-4 teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon pepper
1-3 cups chicken broth
½ cup milk
2 tablespoons soy sauce
2 cups cooked chicken, shredded (or 2 6-oz. cans)
½ cup shredded coconut
3 cups hot cooked rice
Melt margarine in saucepan, add celery, green pepper and pineapple and cook over low heat about five minutes. Add flour, salt and pepper and blend. Stir in combined broth, milk and soy sauce gradually and cook. Stir over low heat until thickened.
Add chicken and coconut and heat thoroughly. Serve over hot cooked rice. Makes six servings.

County Women And Girls Learning Clothing Skills In HD and 4-H Clubs

"Over 75 percent of the homes in Eastland County have sewing machings..."

This statement was taken from Your County Program, a study of Eastland County, developed by the Eastland County Program Building Committee.

Through Home Demonstration Club and 4-H Club program, approximately 309 Eastland County women and girls improved their skills in selecting and buying clothing and accessories and clothing construction and grooming.

Through Home Demonstration Club programs, the women learned how to "Select a Street Dress" and the "Care of the Feet and Selection of Shoes". They also studied

"Grooming" and "Up-Dating a garment".

In September, the club members, and several other interested persons, attended a program on "Laundering Special Fabrics" where they learned the latest and best methods of laundering clothing.

Through the 4-H Clothing programs, the girls enrolled in the nine community 4-H Clubs and the two school 4-H Clubs, learned how to sew, plan and buy their clothing and to take care of their clothes and be well groomed. Thirty-nine of these girls modeled their garments, made during the year, in the County 4-H Dress Revue in April. The garments modeled ranged from simple-to-make, gathered skirts to completely lined dresses and suit ensembles.

During 1964, the Home Demonstration and 4-H Club members will continue to study and improve their homemaking skills as a result of their club program.

Home Demonstration Clubs and 4-H Clubs are just one of the many groups or audiences with whom the County Home Demonstration Agent and the Assistant County Home Demonstration Agent worked with during the past year. The agents worked with all

groups of interested persons — urban as well as rural.

Home Demonstration Club membership is open to any homemaker, urban and rural who is interested in learning and developing new and better skills in homemaking. During 1963 approximately 139 women actively participated in the activities of the eight Home Demonstration Clubs throughout the County.

Membership in 4-H Clubs is open to girls and boys between the ages of 9 and 21 who are interested in Home Economics and Agriculture and their related fields. Approximately 170 girls actively participated in the 4-H Club program during 1963 in Eastland County.

During 1964, the Home Demonstration and 4-H Club members will continue to study and improve their homemaking skills as a result of their club program.

Civil War Week To Be Observed

The Eastland County Historical Survey Committee will participate in Texas Civil War History Appreciation Week, April 20-26, 1964. Mrs. Bernice McCrea, chairman, has announced. This observance is sponsored by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and its Civil War Centennial Advisory Committee.

This observance, part of the Civil War Centennial, has been designated as a time when each county historical survey committee in Texas will sponsor at least one public review of Texas Civil War history. Talks on "Texas in the Civil War" will be made before school assemblies and various civic, cultural and study groups.

Essay and poster contests will be sponsored in high schools, and first prize in each category will be a scholarship for one year's tuition in a state supported college or university of the student's choice plus an expense paid trip to Austin for the winner and a teacher or parent during the week to attend award ceremonies in the Governor's office. A \$100 U. S. Savings Bond will be given in lieu of the tuition if the winners prefer.

Chairman Mrs. McCrea states that the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee is planning the following activities during Texas Civil War History Appreciation Week: Sponsoring the essay and poster contest in Eastland, Ranger, Rising Star, Gorman, and Cisco with a \$10 prize for county winner in each contest; program with speaker: "Texas and the Civil War including Eastland County's part, April 18 at 10 a. m. at the Texas Electric Service Building in Eastland.

4-H'ERS INVITED TO COMPETE IN CIVIL DEFENSE CONTEST

4-H boys and girls, accustomed to living in the nuclear age, will have an opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge of civil defense and emergency preparedness in a new contest, just announced by

the Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas.

Interested 4-H members should discuss this with their 4-H adult leader, assistant county agricultural agent, Roger Blackmon, and ask for a copy of MP-664, A Guide for 4-H Civil Defense.

The finals of this contest will be held during Texas 4-H Roundup, June 2 and 3, 1964, on the Texas A&M University Campus. Prior eliminations will be held in each county, with winners of the county contest competing for state honors.
