Poll Tax Deadline Is Friday -- Sales Up; More Urged

The Tax Collectors office renorted 1,601 poll taxes sold in that office through Wednesday noon, with no reports available from the four sub-stations. Cisco's C-C office had run out of receipts Wednesday.

Deadline for the sale of tax receipts is midnight Friday Jan. 31st, and the tax office at the courthouse will close at 5 p. m. as customary, it is

Sale of tax receipts had picked up "a little" this week, a deputy said, but total sales still lag, compared to past years and to other areas.






