

1. Those registering will be given free poll tax receipts stamped "poll tax not paid." Persons who already have obtained poll tax receipts and exemptions can not register.

Persons eligible for exemption certificates who failed to obtain them by the poll tax deadline Friday (Jan. 31st) can not register under the new federal system.

4. Regular poll tax receipts and exemptions can be used in all elections. This includes elections for federal offices. Persons who only regis

ter can vote only in the federal elections. 1 At the polls, voters will be divided into two classes on voter lists. Persons whose re-1 ceipts are stamped "poll tax, not paid" will be permitted to)



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
