## Senate Bill 80—No. 1

# School Incentive Aid Plan Originated In This County

(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of articles which will give both the pros and cons of the incentive school consolidation plan.)

What is Senate Bill 80? It's a bill offering school districts incentive aid payments for voluntary consolidation.

Those are big words, and the next question which comes into

the mind of any individual is, "What incentives are involved?" There's a real story back of Senate Bill 80. The bill passed the present state legislature and was signed into law by the governor during the last week of the regular session. The bill was sponsored in the Senate by Sen. Tom Crighton and in the House by Rep. Scott Bailey. The real man back of the bill was Dr. James C. Whittington of Eastland, now-

Dr. Whittington came up with the idea of forming one high school in Eastland County more than a year ago. He was instrumental in getting a study group formed by the Eastland, Ranger and Olden school districts. After the study group met for awhile it came up with a report stating that under present laws it would be financially unsound for the districts to consolidate. The reason why it would be unsound is the

complicated state school laws. Under the law before Senate Bill 80 passed, consolidation actually cost school districts state aid. For instance, if two districts consolidated the state would put up funds for just one high school principal, whereas the state put up funds for two as long as the districts were separated.

That's what was behind Senate Bill 80. Under the bill any districts can consolidate and not lose any funds for 10 years. Eastland County now has nine school districts and nine high schools. Dr. Whittington and his backers point out that this is a most unusual situation. For instance, they explain that Abilene would have 45 high schools if that city had the same number of schools per capita that Eastland County does. At present there are just two high schools in Abilene, one of them being newly opened.

Whittington's plan calls for having one high school in the county, but he is quick to point out that all nine of the school districts—Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Olden, Carbon, Gorman, Desdemona, Seranton and Rising Star—would retain their elementary and junior high schools. He says the one high school should not be located in any of the towns involved, but in some central location.

While there has been no organized resistance to the Whittington movement, the argument most often heard is this: "If you take away our schools you will ruin our community."

Whittington says the communities could not be hurt, but helped. He says this area cannot attract industry without first offering a school system equal to those in larger cities.

# Abilene Sewer Farm Attacked

Rep. Scott Bailey has urged Gov. Price Daniel to include legislation dealing with water pollution in his agenda to be placed before the next called session of the 57th Legislature.

In a letter to Gov. Daniel, Bailey stated, "Recent heavy rains in the Albany and Baird vicinity indicate the possibility of extreme pollution down stream from the Abilene sewer farm."

Bailey said, "Many residents who live in the western part of Callahan and Shackelford counties have contacted me in regard to the sanitation problem caused by this situation. In some cases water wells have become polluted in the vicinity of this sewer farm."

The Eastland County House member pointed out that the House passed a bill dealing with water pollution, but the Senate failed to approve the bill. House Bill 130 would have set up a state agency to deal with pollution problems.

"I fear that the new Hubbard Creek Lake may be in danger of pollution also," Bailey continued.

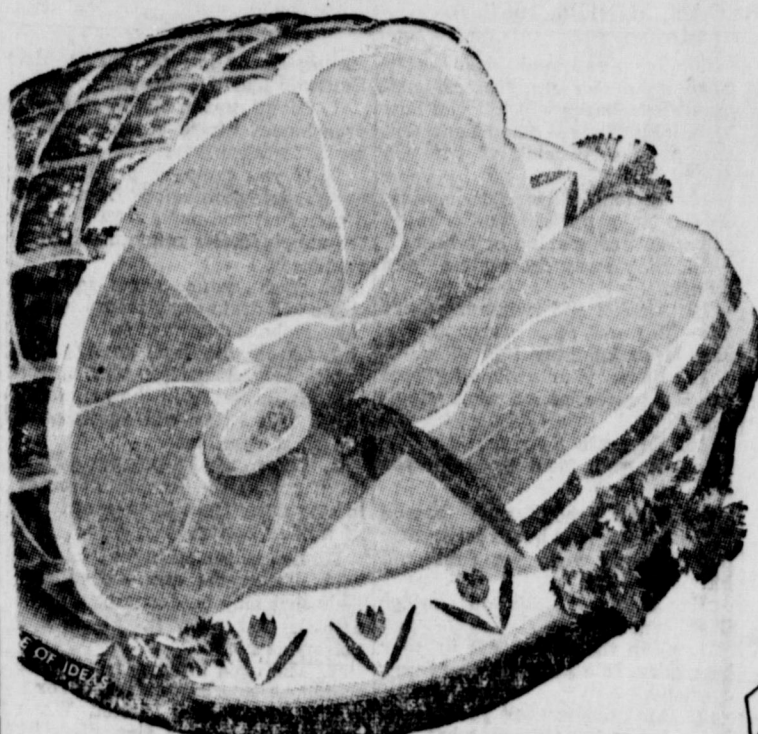

**Summer Outdoor Vacation Season Safety Rules Listed by Red Cross**

"Life preservers" for the millions of Americans who will take to the water and the woods this summer were recommended today by the American Red Cross as the outdoor vacation season begins officially with the Memorial Day holiday.

The most popular summer sports, swimming and boating, account for the majority of the 6,500 annual drownings, A. W. Cantwell, national director of Red Cross Safety Services, said.

- To prevent them and other water-related accidents, he advocated these precautions:
1. Never swim alone. At beaches, stay near a lifeguard.
  2. Stay out of the water when overheated, for an hour after eating, and during electrical storms.
  3. Stay away from the area, immediately in front of the diving board.
  4. Don't depend on a tube or inflated toy to hold you up.
  5. Don't dive in shallow water or in unknown waters.
  6. Watch your step. Walk, don't run, around pool area.
  7. Stay out of deep water if you can't swim.
  8. Beware of sunburn, even on a cloudy day.
  9. Dry off after swimming. Cover up if it's chilly.

10. In ocean and river swimming watch for riptides and currents. Lifeguards will tell you how to recognize these conditions and how to save yourself if you are caught.
  11. In long-distance swimming, always swim parallel to the shore and with a companion or a boat.
  12. Stay away from piers and pilings.
  13. Alcohol and swimming don't mix. Stay out of the water if you have been imbibing.
  14. Fence your swimming pool for the protection of small children.
  15. Separate deep and shallow water in your pool by a buoyed line.
  16. Keep handy such rescue equipment as ring buoys and reaching poles, as well as a first aid kit.
- Mr. Cantwell advised motor boat owners to:
1. Keep the passengers in your boat down to a safe number. Don't overload.
  2. Don't overpower your boat. Your dealer can tell you what size motor is safe for your boat.
  3. Equip your boat with safety items. A life jacket for each passenger and a stern light are musts. Recommended also are anchor, oars, boat hook, extra line, fire extinguisher, first aid kit and tool kit.
- For the millions of Americans who will spend their summer holidays camping, hiking in the

- mountains, or just picnicking, Mr. Cantwell had this advice:
1. Camp, preferably, in an authorized area where the water supply is certified safe.
  2. If you camp on private property, get permission from the owner first and make sure the water supply meets minimum health standards.
  3. Pitch your camp so your waste will drain away from the water supply, not toward it.
  4. Check with local health authorities or pharmacists what insect hazards there are in the neighborhood. The latter will recommend the right repellents.
  5. Learn what poison plants there are in the locality in order to stay away from them—touching as well as eating.
  6. Learn something about the wild life in the area—large animals that may be dangerous, small animals that carry rabies, and poisonous snakes.
  7. The area around a campfire should be cleared completely for a radius of at least 10-feet. When you finish with the fire, douse it with water, then shovel dirt on top of it. Smokers should make certain cigarette, cigar, or pipe ash is completely extinguished.
  8. Household cooking vessels won't work well on campfires. Special camping vessels—a kettle with legs and frying pan with removable handle—will cut down on burns, scalds, spilled and ruined food.
  9. Keep axes and knives in leather sheaths when they are not in use. Use only implements with sharp edges.
  10. Chop logs with a V-motion and keep feet off the object being chopped. Instead, brace with some other blocking material.
  11. Many creams and lotions contain special ingredients to screen out the ultraviolet rays of the sun. Use these liberally even after the skin is well tanned, for even then excessive ultraviolet sun rays can cause skin cancer.
  12. Take along a first aid kit and a Red Cross First Aid Textbook. The latter can be obtained
