New Postal Rates Effective After July 1

Effective July 1, 1961 an extensive revision will be made in the postage rates on international mail. Money order fees and domestic special delivery fees, according to Ranger Acting Postmaster Ella White.

Fees for money orders from \$0.01 to \$10 will be \$0.20 domestic and \$0.40 for International; \$10.01 to \$50 will be \$0.30 domestic and \$0.60 international; \$50.01 to \$100 will be \$0.35 domestic and \$0.70 international.

Special delivery rates will be \$0.30 up to two pounds; \$0.45 for two pounds to two pounds; and \$0.60 for over ten pounds. This is first class and airmail.

New rates will be effective on all international mail which comes under the following classification: Letter mail, post cards, books and sheet music, publishers second class, controlled circulation publications, matter for the blind, samples of merchandise, commercial papers, small packets and 8-ounce merchandise packages.

Application for Tax Accountants Due by Aug. 1

Internal Revenue Service wants to remind those who wish to take qualifying examinations for practice before the Treasury Department that they must apply before Aug. 1, 1961.

The 1961 Special Enrollment tests will be given on Sept. 27 and 28. Applications can be obtained from M. O. Tessman, Special Enrollment Coordinator for the Dallas District, P. O. Box 594, Dallas. The applications must be mailed to the Director of Practice, Internal Revenue Service, Washington 25, D. C., before Aug. 1, 1961. A fee of \$25 must be paid with the application.

Tessman explained that this examination is for persons other than attorneys and Certified Public Accountants who wish to practice before the Treasury Department. He said that graduation from college and or four years of practical accounting experience will qualify applicants to take the examination.

Tessman cautioned those interested to carefully read Circular 230 which he sends with the examination application blank. Internal Revenue cannot return the \$25 fee to applicants who do not qualify for the examination.

The meeting was called by H. J. Tanner of Eastland. It will be held in Tanner's Club 21 office at 317 South Seaman beginning at 10 a.m.

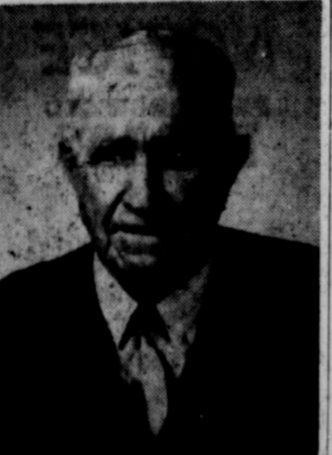
Chief business will be the election of county chairman.

I Give You Texas
By **BOYCE HOUSE**

Early in the War with Mexico, the American troops, under General Zachary Taylor, were encamped along the Rio Grande and in Matamoras the soldiers were entertained by a theatrical troupe.

Among the performers was Joseph Jefferson, then a youth of 18, who was destined to become immortal for his "Rip Van Winkle."

The company included Jefferson's mother - was in Galveston when news came that Taylor's army was advancing on the Rio Grande and the manager decided that the players should follow the army. The trip was made by steamer from Galveston to Point Isabel (now Port Isabel) which Jefferson described in his "Autobiography" as flat and sandy, "covered with tente and boiling over with military preparations."

The actors could hear the booming of the cannon as the Battle of Palo Alto was fought and, the next morning, Jefferson saw an ambulance arrive with the wounded Major Samuel Ringgold, who died soon afterward.

After the Battle of Resaca de la Palma, Matamoras was occupied and then the troupe established itself there and "acted to the most motley group that ever filled a theater."

A vivid picture of the city was given by Jefferson: "The dwelling houses in Matamoras were generally one story high, built of brick, plastered, and painted yellow; one door and an iron-barred window in front on the street and the same at the back, leading to a courtyard which was used in common by the occupants of the house for washing, ironing, cooking and eating. We occupied one of these establishments."

"In the morning, little tables, with white cloths, were brought out and set for breakfast in the open air. The different families would sit at them and drink their hot coffee, eat their fruit and bread, smoke their cigarettes, and talk away as gaily as if no war were going."

"The courtyards were entered by a large gate, and hired out to passing caravans of muleteers or rancheros, who occupied the mid-

die of the space. Here they also took their meals and sold their fruit, vegetables, chickens and dry goods of cheap and gaudy-colored Mexican blankets, sombreros and baskets.

"The courtyard at night was a lovely sight. The little houses surrounding it were all lighted up within, the doors wide open so that we could see the families, men, women and children, knitting, smoking, dancing, singing and playing cards - always for money (everybody gambled in Mexico); and groups of muleteers in the center were seated around their camp-fire, which would blaze and shed its light over the scene."

When the army advanced into Mexico, Matamoras was silent and deserted, so the manager of the theatrical company departed with all the funds, including the back salaries of the actors. So ends this story of the drama beside the Rio Grande.

Driver and Vehicle Records Division

(Editor's Note: Following is the second of a series of articles appearing in this newspaper detailing the evolution and organization of the Texas Department of Public Safety and the numerous vital services this agency provides for the people of Texas.)

The Driver and Vehicle Records Division, composed of four bureaus, is charged with the basic responsibility of enforcement and administration of the drivers license, motor vehicle inspection and the safety responsibility laws of Texas.

Specific duties performed are those of issuance of licenses, evaluation of records in traffic safety matters, maintenance of files on drivers and vehicles, identification of problem drivers and the initiation of corrective or suspension action against those motor vehicle operators who either will not or cannot adhere to statutory minimum standards established to insure an orderly and safe flow of traffic on the public streets and highways.

Approximately 83,000 reports, applications and other type communications are received daily for analysis, evaluation, processing, issuance of license, filing or preparation of replies by the technical and clerical personnel of this division.

License Issuance and Driver

Records Bureau

As of Aug. 31, 1960, there were 4,567,899 currently licensed drivers operating motor vehicles on the public streets and highways of Texas. During the past two year period, this bureau processed applications and issued licenses to 5,614,531 Texas drivers, including 552,825 original permits issued to new drivers in the state. Slightly more than 2,632,000 reported incidents of motor vehicle accident involvements and convictions on moving traffic law violation charges were received and placed in the individual case history files of those persons experiencing such driving difficulties.

Driving records were checked and information provided in response to 561,453 requests received from licensees, enforcement agencies and courts throughout the state. Abstracts of driving records were prepared and forwarded to various individuals, agencies and organizations in response to the 1,474,552 applications received during the past two year period.

Filing of reported incidents of motor vehicle accidents and moving traffic law violation convictions in the license records of Texas drivers resulted in the files of 207,120 such persons being referred to the Driver Improvement and Control Bureau for initiation of improvement or corrective action.

The magnitude of the records

operation is reflected by the tremendous increase in the number of licensed drivers in the past 10 years — from 2,715,231 as of Aug. 31, 1950, to 4,567,899 on Aug. 31, 1960.

This continuing increase which has brought more than 1,000,000 additional records into the bureau since the Department moved into its present quarters in October, 1953, has created a serious space problem.

Driver Improvement and Control Bureau

During the immediate past biennium, this bureau analyzed, evaluated and initiated improvement or control actions against 207,120 Texas drivers whose licensing records indicated inability or unwillingness to share the streets and highways with others in a safe and orderly manner.

The effectiveness of the improvement, approach, rather than suspension of driving privilege, is reflected by the fact that it became necessary to suspend the licenses of only 50,930 of these persons who were either convicted on charges which carry a mandatory suspension of license or failed to respond to the various attempts to improve substandard driving practices.

Other improvement actions initiated against those licensees with less extensive adverse performance records included the writing of safety or remainder letters to 90,695 drivers, the citation of 39,578 licensees to report for review or special examination, personal interview with 29,598 drivers and the filing of a petition for formal hearing in 16,710 cases. A total of 10,632 Texas drivers were

placed on probation during this period.

Safety Responsibility Bureau

In the administration of the Safety Responsibility Act, it was necessary for this bureau to review, evaluate and establish case files in 261,212 reported incidents of motor vehicle accident involvement during the past two year period.

Suspension of driver licenses and motor vehicle registrations were involved in 62,052 of these cases after operators and owners of motor vehicles involved in serious accidents failed to provide evidence of financial ability to take care of damages sustained by others in one of the manners prescribed by statute, in response to a written notification from the department.

Police demand orders were prepared and forwarded to enforcement agencies for service in 35,127 cases when persons suspended for non-compliance with the requirements of the Safety Responsibility Act failed or refused to surrender driver licenses or motor vehicle registrations, after proper written demand had been made.

Motor Vehicle Inspection Records Bureau

This bureau checked and processed applications, issued licenses and established individual files on 9,150 approved motor vehicle inspection stations operated in Texas during the past two year period.

Hundreds of requests for necessary supplies and certification stickers used by the inspection stations were handled on a daily basis. In tabulating and auditing weekly reports submitted by each of the licensed motor vehicle inspection stations, it was ascertained that adjustments or repairs were required on 3,606,423 of the 8,347,894 vehicles inspected during this two year period before they could meet the minimum standards for approval as safe vehicles.

It was necessary to suspend the licenses of 164 inspection stations and to disqualify 160 mechanics for failing or refusing to adhere to minimum inspection standards, procedures and practices during the past biennium.

Former Resident Of Ranger Dies In San Antonio

Earl Thomas Walton Sr., father of Edgar Walton, Caddo Highway, Ranger, died Tuesday morning, June 13 at the home of a daughter in San Antonio.

Mr. Walton was born April 4, 1882 in Missouri. He moved to Ranger in 1919, where he lived until 1936. Active in church work, he served as an Elder and leader of the church choir of the Christian church.

Funeral services were held Wednesday morning, June 14, in Harlandale Christian Church in San Antonio.

Surviving are his wife; two daughters, Mrs. O. L. Jordan of San Antonio and Mrs. J. A. Stacks of Dallas; three sons, Edgar of Ranger, and Roger and Earl of San Antonio; twelve grandchildren and eight great grandchildren.

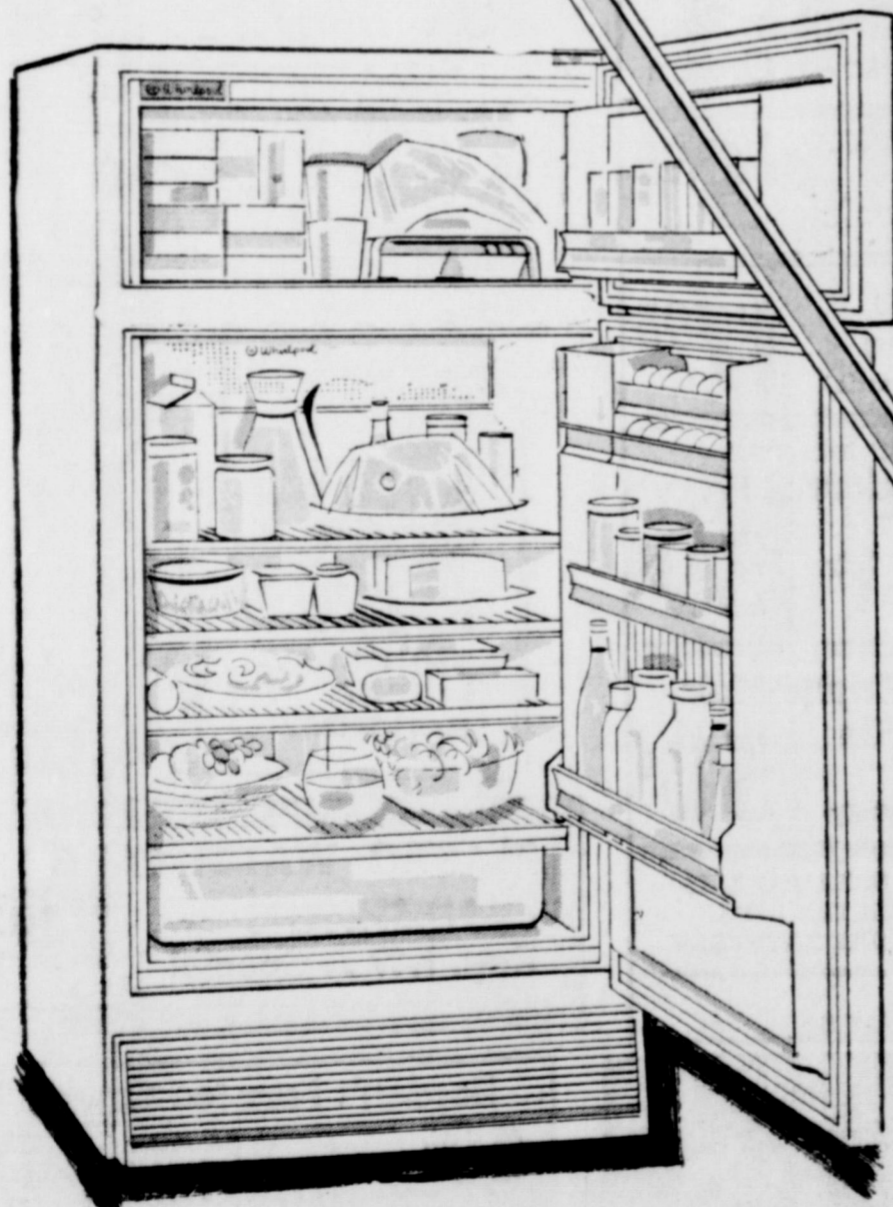

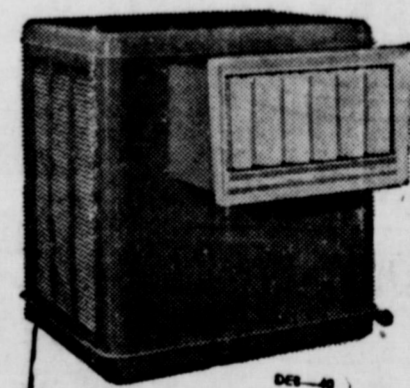
