Drill site is 700 feet from the north and 1,050 feet from the west lines of Lot 53, McLennan CSL Survey. It is near plugged oil producers.

BSG Co. of Grand Prairie No. 5 E. H. Layne was staked as a proposed 380-foot wildcat two miles west of Ranger.

Located near deep oil production, it spots 655 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of Mark Haley Survey, A-156.

The lease is composed of 218 acres.

In the same area, BSG Co. No. 1 J. L. Harrison was staked as a regular field re-entry project. The planned 3,500-foot venture is on a 146 acre lease.

Site is 1,150 feet from the north and 1,910 feet from the east lines of John York Survey, A-357.

It was plugged in 1966 at 4,900 feet by Texas Pacific Oil Co.

Scott L. Tallaferra, Abilene, No. 1 C. C. Coody was staked in the regular field nine miles south of Strawn.

Ausanke Oil Operations of Wichita Falls No. 2 J. Hawkins is a planned 4,000-foot wildcat for Eastland County.

Location is five miles southeast of Ranger on a 2,953 acre lease.

It spots 1,203 feet from the south and 1,251 feet from the west lines of Spires & Dooley Survey, A-77.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Tex. — Views of citizens on how to save current assets of the Texas coast while permitting its orderly economic development are being sampled in a series of public hearings.

Hearings are a major initial step in development of a Coastal Zone Management Plan.

More than 150 representatives of business, labor, agriculture, industry and environmental groups outlined expectations for the plan at a workshop here last week.

Need for a balance between economic development and protection of natural resources emerged as the key element for the CZM plan.

CZM is concerned with economic development, urban population growth, water supply, local control, residential and resort home development and power plant siting.

Hearings are slated for August 13 in Harlingen, August 28 in Corpus Christi, September 5 in Victoria, September 12 in Beaumont, September 23 in Houston, September 24 in Galveston and September 27 in Austin.

The technical phase of the program starting in the fall will seek to arrive at estimates of demands on coastal resources, assess capability of resources to support the demands and to evaluate possible management mechanisms.

After more hearings in 1975 and 1976, final recommendations resulting from the plan will be made to the legislature in September, 1976.

DPS CHECK ASKED — Gov. Dolph Briscoe asked a full report on intelligence activities of the Department of Public Safety.

Briscoe said he would not rule out a separate citizens committee inquiry into DPS surveillance of individuals, but he will look at a DPS report before asking any further probe.

Surveillance activities of DPS came under critical scrutiny due to an agent's report on Robert W. Pomeroy, who led a citizens' group opposing a nuclear power plant near Fort Worth. DPS Director Wilson Speir has apologized for the Pomeroy report, and noted that it was never made a part of DPS permanent files since Pomeroy was not engaged in illegal activity.

Meanwhile, the state Senate's Jurisprudence Committee will have a select sub-committee headed by Sen. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas checking into the Pomeroy case and, generally, into invasion of privacy issues.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. John Hill held the state Office of Traffic Safety isn't authorized to sell T-shirt with a "drive friendly" logo to finance a traffic safety program.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: Willacy County cannot use federal revenue sharing funds to support its hospital district or a non-profit clinic for low-income residents.

Texas Tech University can purchase group term life insurance from mutual companies for its faculty and

staff.
• Blood donors over 18 are entitled to the same compensation as those over 21, regardless of a state statute.

• Parttime employment as social workers is not prohibited under the dual employment prohibition of Texas law.

• A statute exempting from forced sale for taxes homesteads of persons over 65 is constitutional.

• A county may locate its juvenile detention facility in the same building as its county jail, as long as juvenile and adult offenders do not come in contact with each other.

• A district judge may assess as court costs reasonable investigators' fees for social studies called for in the family code.

APPOINTMENTS — Dr. Hugh Meredith has been named president of Sul Ross State University, effective September 1.

Kenneth Decker has been promoted to agent-in-charge of the 122-member DPA narcotics service, and Benny C. Boyd is assistant agent-in-charge.

Robert G. Welsch of Corpus Christi will succeed J. C. Roberts as Texas Highway Department district engineer in Abilene.

Rights Commission adopted a final determination of water rights in the Cibolo Creek Watershed of San Antonio River Basin.

The area was the first in the state to receive a complete adjudication of water rights under the 1967 Water Rights Adjudication Act.

The determination and the entire record of the proceedings will be filed in district court in San Antonio. The watershed contains parts of Kendall, Bexar, Comal, Guadalupe, Wilson and Karnes Counties.

PRISON PLAN CARRIED OUT — Agreed-on procedures were used to handle the Fred Gomez Carrasco siege at Huntsville prison, according to Governor Briscoe.

Briscoe said a variety of contingency plans had been approved for any emergency at the prison.

He said he is convinced that under the circumstances Department of Corrections

Director W. J. Estelle Jr. "did all that was humanly possible to protect the lives of hostages and, at the same time, (to) protect the people of the State of Texas."

DPS named Ranger Capt. J. F. "Pete" Rogers to investigate how guns and ammunition were slipped into the prison to Carrasco.

A Walker County grand jury is also investigating the incident, in which Carrasco, another inmate and two women hostages were slain during a breakout attempt after the longest prison revolt of its kind in U. S. history.

SHORT SNORTS

Nearly 1.1 million Texans — 9.14 per cent of the state's population — received food stamps with a total value of \$35.1 million in May, Welfare Commissioner Raymond Vowell reported.

The Texas Folklife Festival is scheduled in San Antonio September 12-15 at the Institute of Texan Cultures.

Eleven Jewish delegates filed a federal court suit to force recess of the September 17 State Democratic Convention which falls on Rosh Hashana, a high Jewish holy day.

Texas truck and bus owners are getting calls from Internal Revenue Service on the highway use tax due August 31.

Business activity in the state reached new record levels during the first half of 1974.

Revenue from cigarette taxes increased nearly \$2 million from July 1973 to July 1974 — to \$22.5 million for the month.

Water districts, under a new order of Texas Water Rights Commission, will be allowed to raise interest rates on bond issues as long as the action doesn't affect the overall amount of the issue or raise the district's tax rate.

Texas Manufacturers Association recommended changes in legislation to enable the state to administer and enforce its own occupational safety and health program.

WASHINGTON D. C. + + THERE WAS A TIME WHEN IT WAS INSULTING to call someone a Socialist. It was a smear word resented by true liberals who advocate a system of Government regulations an control, often referred to as "democratic economic planning." If one dared to such a plan as "Socialism" he was often accused of dragging political discourse into the gutter.

IT NOW APPEARS THAT SOME OF THE INTELLECTUAL LIBERALS such as Professor John Kenneth Galbraith of Harvard University and author of numerous best sellers, has taken to speaking and writing on the virtues of Socialism, making no bones about it. In many of his works, he has not been far from writing and saying the same things he is now, but more recently, he calls it what it is. Over the years he has constantly streed the need for extending Government authority to correct the supposed failings of private enterprise. In a recent book entitled "Economics and the Public Purpose" he asserts that free market arrangements in our economy have brought about all our Country's numerous ills - - poor housing, poor, mass transit systems, poor education and welfare of all kinds - - to mention a few. Nothing will do therefor, he says, but to accept the inevitability of Socialism with circumstances thrust upon us. He says that they have thrust upon us. He says that the Free market system cannot muster enough resources, competence or general to do the things which urgently need doing.

PROFESSOR GALBRAITH IS QUITE CANDID when he recommends Government planning as to what should be produced and what should and for Government authority to make decisions over who get what and how much.

THE BASIC THRUST OF THE GOV PROFESSOR'S OPINIONS is clearly against private decision, urging the increase of governmental power and then final embrace of a "new Socialism" as a cure for what ails us.

THIS HAS BEEN THE INVOLVEMENT OF NATIONS which now have Socialist Governments. When things get to the point of causing enough people to feel that they were being unfairly treated in their society, they were willing to accept as "alternative."

This seems to be the alternative which Professor Galbraith recommends in the place of our few economy.

IF ANYTHING GOOD CAN COME OUT OF THE PROFESSOR'S IDEALS, it is that he gives us warning to strengthen our system by unfettering business which can give greater opportunity to more people to work, to produce goods and to pay taxes.

Bullock Thanks County Voters Gospel Meeting

Bob Bullock, Democratic nominee for State Comptroller, was in town this week to say "thank you" to the voters of Eastland County who gave him a 75.9 per cent majority in the May Primary.

Bullock won the Democratic nomination with the largest percentage vote of any contested statewide race. He carried all but one of Texas' 254 counties.

Visiting every county in Texas during the primary, Bullock said he "prefers to talk to the people personally instead of hiding behind words and gimmicks ground out by clever public relations people."

The size of his victory shop was the people support improvements and reforms he recommends for the Comptroller's office, Bullock said.

Bullock, 45, gained statewide acclaim as Secretary of State. He also has served as Assistant Attorney General and a member of the House of Representatives. He is a veteran of the Korean Conflict and lives in Austin with his wife Amelia and son Bobby.

During the campaign Bullock has called for an end to faulty collection methods which he says costs the state million of dollars a year by "fly-by-night" operators.

Bullock also has promised to cut down the amount of red tape facing businesses in handling and paying taxes. Other reforms urged by Bullock have included quicker processing of city sale taxes by the state.

"I'm fully confident that the people are more than anxious to see that their hard-earned tax dollars are carefully collected and wisely spent," Bullock said.

Seven School Districts Form Co-op

Seven school districts in Stephens and Eastland counties have joined together to provide special services for some of their students.

The seven districts together are known as the East End Co-op because they are located on the eastern edge of Region 14 Education Service Center whose headquarters are in Abilene. The East End Co-op headquarters are in Gorman.

The districts are Breckenridge, Eastland, Cisco, Car-

bon, Gorman, Moran and Ranger.

THE PURPOSE of the co-op is to allow the seven schools to implement a program the Texas Education Agency calls Plan A. Cedric Bettis, supervisor of the East End Co-op said Plan A is a comprehensive special education program to benefit persons between the ages of 3 and 21 who have learning disabilities.

Bettis said the program was begun in 1970 by the state leg-

islature and should be in effect in all schools by 1976.

Bettis said that school districts must have an average daily attendance (ADA) of 3,000 to qualify for Plan A. Since many small school districts don't have that ADA, they are allowed to form co-ops to meet the requirements. Bettis said the East End Co-op has a total ADA of 4,088.

THE EAST End Co-op which opened its doors July 1, is one of six co-ops in the Region 14 Education Service Center area. The others are Comanche Co-op, Haskell-Knox Co-op, Taylor-Callahan Co-op, Tri-County Co-op and West Central Texas Education Co-op. Also Abilene Independent School District and Snyder Independent School District in Region 14 have Plan A.

The objective of Plan A, Bettis said, is to "identify youngsters who have learning disabilities and get them back into the mainstream of education." In fact, Bettis said, "we have a desire to work ourselves out of a job."

The way Plan A will work in the East End Co-op is that each school district will have at least one resource room which is a room specially equipped to work with various handicaps.

THE SEVEN schools will have 13 Plan A teachers and this year four of the schools will have three speech therapists working in them.

Persons 3 to 21 who have handicaps will be referred to the co-op by parents, churches, school officials, community groups and other organizations.

A committee called the Admission, Review and Dismissal Committee in each school reviews each case. Then the student will have an individual educational plan drawn up for him. Parental permission is required for all students entering Plan A.

BETTIS SAID each student will work either on one-to-one

basis with his Plan A teacher or will be placed in a small group with other students who have similar problems.

The length of time a student spends in the resource room each day will depend on the severity of his handicap, Bettis said. He emphasized that the student will not be separated from his normal grade placement. Most students will work in the resource room for a certain time each day and then return to their normal classes.

Bettis said each student's record will be reviewed every 90 days to see how he is progressing.

IN ADDITION to the Plan A teachers in the schools, at least two schools, Eastland and Breckenridge, will have homebound teachers for students who are unable to attend school. Bettis said other schools in the co-op would also have homebound teachers if the need arises.

Bettis said about 650 students will participate in Plan A in the co-op this year.

The Texas Education Agency has budgeted \$222,294 for the co-op to operate on for the 1974-75 school year. Bettis said G. W. Maxfield, superintendent of Gorman schools, will serve as fiscal agent for the co-op. Members of the executive board include the superintendents of the seven schools.

In addition to Bettis, other personnel in the administration office are Sam Eller, diagnostician; Johnny Creager, counselor; and Linda Gibbs, clerical aide.

Plan A teachers will have in-service training Aug. 19 and 20 in the Texas Electric building in Eastland.

In Europe Folks of Normandy called a gay blade "Robert" which was abbreviated "Robin". This name was used in many ways, one of which was to describe the American Red Breasted Thrush. So, our new country's Robins cocky, Giddy ways in a duel, or in courtship earned him his name from the first settlers.

The 8 to 10 inch Robin is the official announcer of Spring to those in the North. And to our area too, even though he is with us year round.

His Life cycle covers territory from the tree line in Canada to Central America. Part of this Birds life is in his summer home where ever it may be, while another segment is spent in his winter home, both of which are around people.

A third portion of his life finds him reverting back to nature and to nature's wilds ways at the end of mating season. During this time Robins join in loose flocks and inhabit woods where his domesticity temporarily is fortified, while he renounces man, he recent friend. This time of wildness however is native to his being, while his seasonal habitation around and with man is the exception.

So familiar to us is all the Brick red breast, yellow Bill, black head gray back and streaked, whitist throat. This description makes his identification unmistakable. The duller female is always about. Robin's erect military carriage, with the staccato run an stop, while stabbing its food on the ground, is unlike any other bird. Insects and fruit make up the bulk of his diet, and generally our Robin looks pretty healthy. Like many other birds, He stakes his territory, and guards it with vigor, even attacking his own image at times.

The nests are built 5 to 15 feet off the ground, and are shaped while wet by Robin turning inside with wings aflutter. The mud an dgrass nests are finished off with fine grass and feathers. We will deal further with Robin in our next article.
