### POINTS SPELLED OUT

## If Water-Flooding Comes, Water Sales Will Climb

The City of Eastland is in the enviable position of getting ready to go into the water-selling business in a big way.

The city commission hammered out plans to be included in a contract with a drilling company which is proposing water-flooding of the old oil field in the Lake Eastland area.

Recently the Great Western Drilling Co. suggested the program and representatives inquired about buying water from the city for the project.

Commissioners took a long, hard look at the possibility of salt water as a result of the oil-field opening.

No contract has been entered into, but the city fathers want to make sure that every necessary point is included at contract making time.

(Water-flooding consists of pumping saline water into abandoned wells to force remaining oil deposits to come to the surface. In old fields where sub-surface

pressure has been lost, this process, can, in many instances, reopen the field.)

The city owns 250 acres in the field, and therefore would be the biggest recipient should the field produce oil again.

The commission will ask for five specific points from the drilling company.

A requirement for periodic salinity and mineral contamination tests at the expense of the drillers will be asked for.

This is to insure that the salt water used in the process doesn't find its way into the lake and thereby contaminate the water stored there.

Tests will be conducted before the project begins and every 90 days during the program at ten different locations in the field.

Should contamination be found during any of the tests, the city is asking for the right to call a halt to the drilling and flooding, until corrective measures can be made.

Commissioners agreed to ask 35 per cent per 1,000 gallons of treated and filtered water, or 25 cents for raw water to be used.

It is indefinite whether the company will agree to these rates. Last month, representatives indicated they wanted "the best possible" rate.

The city would deliver the water to the nearest water main at the field. Mayor Cyrus Frost said that existing lines would provide the transport.

The city will ask that the drilling company agree not to buy water from any other source throughout the project.
