AN ORDINANCE
FIXING THE WATER RATES TO BE CHARGED TO USERS OF CITY OF EASTLAND WATER, EFFECTIVE WITH WATER BILLS FOR THE MONTH OF JUNE, 1955, AND UNTIL CHANGED BY ANY FUTURE ORDINANCE
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS.
Section 1. That the water rates be charged and collected by the City of Eastland Texas, are hereby fixed and set forth below:
WATER RATES
(A) DOMESTIC, COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL RATES:
The following rate is applicable to all domestic and commercial customers within the city limits of Eastland, Texas, either within or without the city limits of Eastland, Texas.
MINIMUM BILLING \$3.00 PER MONTH PER METER. FOR ANY AMOUNT OF WATER REGISTERED ON THE METER FOR THE MONTH UP TO 3,000 GALLONS. THE NEXT 7,000 GALLONS AT 40c PER THOUSAND; ALL OVER 10,000 GALLONS AT 35c PER THOUSAND GALLONS.
The following rate is applicable to all Domestic and Commercial customers outside the City of Eastland, Texas, city limits:
MINIMUM BILLING \$5.00 PER MONTH PER METER FOR ANY AMOUNT OF WATER REGISTERED ON THE METER FOR THE MONTH UP TO 3,000 GALLONS. ALL OF THE WATER REGISTERED ON THE METER FOR THE MONTH OVER AND ABOVE THE 3,000 GALLONS IS TO BE BILLED AT THE RATE OF 40c per 1,000 GALLONS. ALL INDUSTRIAL WILL BE BY CONTRACT.
Section 2. All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
Section 3. This is an ordinance providing for the immediate daily operation of a municipal department to-wit: The waterworks department, and is therefore declared to be an emergency measure requiring suspension of the rule requiring reading of ordinances at more than one meeting, and said rule is suspended, and this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Record Keepers Rush Season Starts In August

AUSTIN — Most people are partial to months of late summer and fall. But not State Health Department birth record keepers. To the staff of the department's Bureau of Vital Statistics, August through October is the roughest time of the year.

The reason: parents who know their children must have birth certificates before they can enter school for the first time but who put off making requests for certified copies until the last minute. Last year bureau personnel processed more than 40,000 requests during those three months. For a limited staff, that means hours of night and week-end work without overtime pay.

Bureau personnel shudder when they think of the estimated 227,000 kids who will be eligible to enter the first grade in September. Many of them have copies of birth records already and will create no problem. Others live in areas where local school boards do not require proof of age before admitting the child to the hallowed halls of learning.

But the majority don't have certified proof of age, despite the fact that they live in areas where school officials insist on such proof. It's this category that gives bureau statisticians and clerks sleepless nights.

Says Bureau Director W. D. Carroll: "We're ready to give immediate service to applications which come in before the fall rush."

Carroll, a long time veteran of vital statistics work, directs the affairs of the bureau where more than ten million birth and death records — some dating back to early 1903 — are on file.

Several hundred parents have already taken advantage of the spring lull in bureau activities by requesting and receiving certified copies of birth records for their children, Carroll says.

The first one came in on March 24 from Mr. and Mrs. Alvin M. King of Port Lavaca. Their son is due to enter the first grade in September. They wanted to make sure they could prove he is six.

"All we need is the child's name and date and place of birth, and the mother's maiden name and the name of the father," Carroll said. That information, together with the statutory fee of fifty cents, will buy anyone a copy of their birth certificate — provided the bureau has the certificate on file.

There's just one more thing: if you don't want to write to Austin, check with your local registrar. Chances are he can supply the record for you.

In either case, do it soon. That fall bind can get mighty tight.

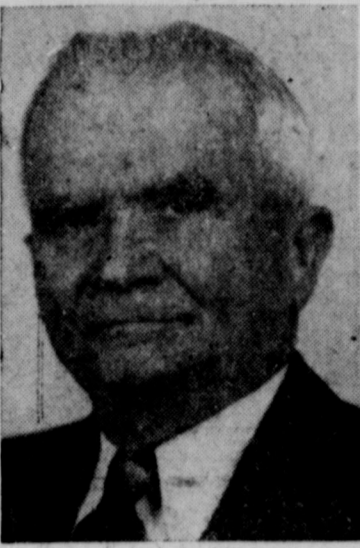

Many of the students are graduates of other colleges, holding bachelors, masters and Ph.D.s; still they regularly attend these homecomings at Gorman.

J. F. is the only survivor of the twins, J. H. having died in 1949.

Deer Survive Mild Winter

AUSTIN — Texas' main deer herds in the Hill Country, although dangerously concentrated in some areas, survived the winter without abnormal dieoff, reports the Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission.

He said thousands of deer were undernourished during the cold months but escaped death from starvation because there was no sustained severe freeze.

The Director said this development merely prolongs critical conditions in many locations where deer overpopulations have become acute because of the record drought and inadequate harvests.

Commission technicians long ago foresaw the crucial status created by surplus deer but were able to correct the situation in only a comparatively few places where localized regulatory authority prevailed over game. Extra harvest of antlerless deer was ordered in these instances to spare lingering death from starvation and to supply added game for sportsmen.

"It's hard to look very far ahead about the deer herd conditions in the Hill Country where conditions have been so unfavorable because of the drought and chronic overpopulation," said the Director. "Our Wildlife Biologist Bob Ramsey said the winter dieoff was about normal. This means we are carrying over a large number of animals in areas which lack the food to sustain all of them in good times, much less in the dry spell which has denuded the ranges."

He emphasized that "everything hinges on the weather." "If we get the rains from here on in," the Director observed, "we could count on plenty of fat deer for fall."

The Director stressed Ramsey's notation that a wet cycle would endanger young deer during the fawning season now just getting under way since deadly screw worms thrive during moist weather. He added that continued dry weather would benefit the fawns but would sign the death warrant for many older deer.

Ramsey reported that while the ranges were barren during the winter, thousands of deer survived by eating scraps from prickly pear and tassel cactus after ranchers, feeding cattle, had burned off the thorns. He said deer particularly benefited from small berries on the smaller tassel cactus which were scattered into inaccessible places as cattle tramped down the cactus beds.

The Director pointed out that many ranchers have been feeding deer ever since the crisis became so pronounced.

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Tuna Roll-Up Is Tempting Taste Treat For Summertime Serving

For a new and tempting taste treat for your family, try this:

TUNA ROLL-UP

- 2 7-ounce cans tuna fish
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 pimiento, chopped
- 2 tablespoons minced onion
- 3 tablespoons minced parsley
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/2 cup water
- 2 cups-biscuit mix
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 tablespoons milk

Drain tuna; flake with fork. Add salt, pepper, pimiento, onion, parsley and lemon rind; mix well.

Combine lemon juice and water. Add to biscuit mix and stir vigorously with fork to combine. Roll into 8 by 13 inch rectangle on lightly floured board. Spread with tuna mixture. Roll as for jelly roll. Dampen outside edge with egg yolk beaten with milk; press to seal. Lay seam side down in flour-ed shallow baking pan. Brush top and sides with remaining egg mixture. Bake at 400 degrees 35 to 40 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

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DIVISION OF SEPARATE ESTATES BY STATUTE EXPLAINED

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of

previously deceased children, they and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property — cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate — is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parents survive, but there are brothers and sisters and descendants, the one-half is divided among these survivors.

And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants) surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all the real estate.

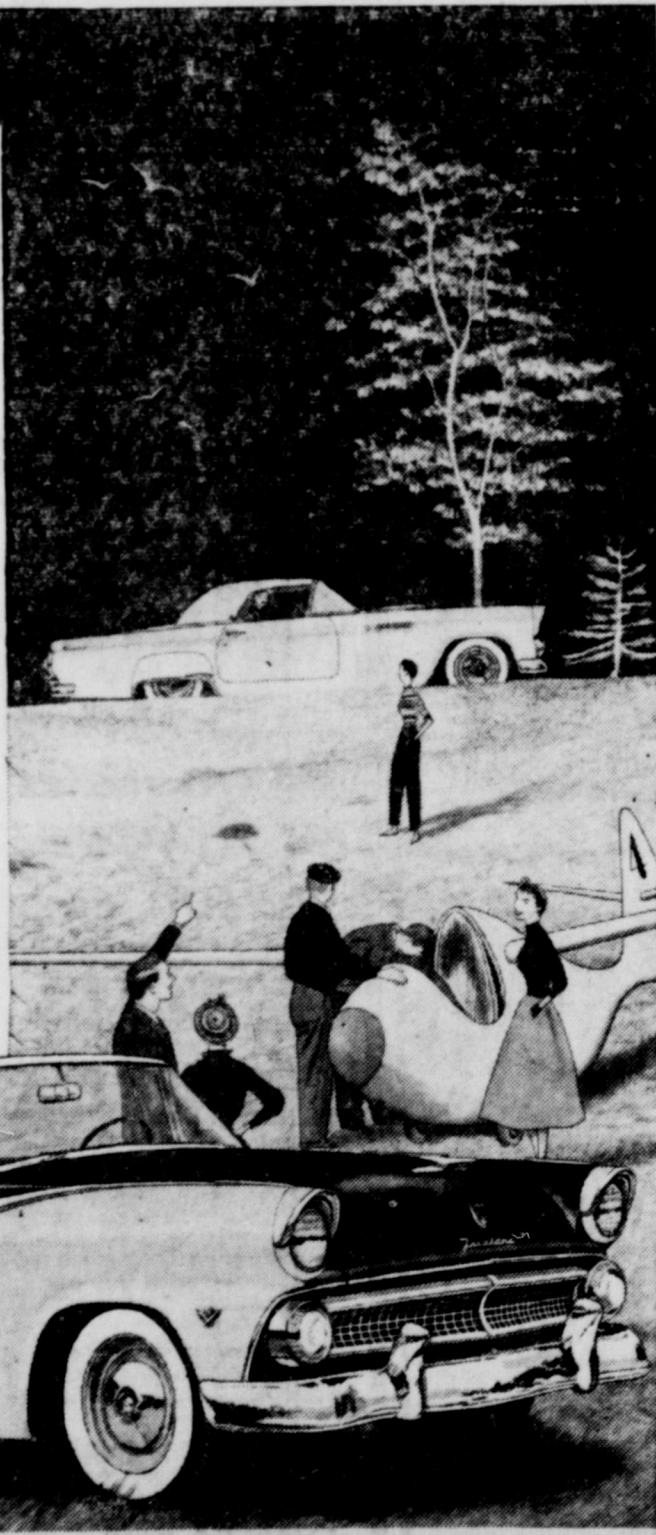

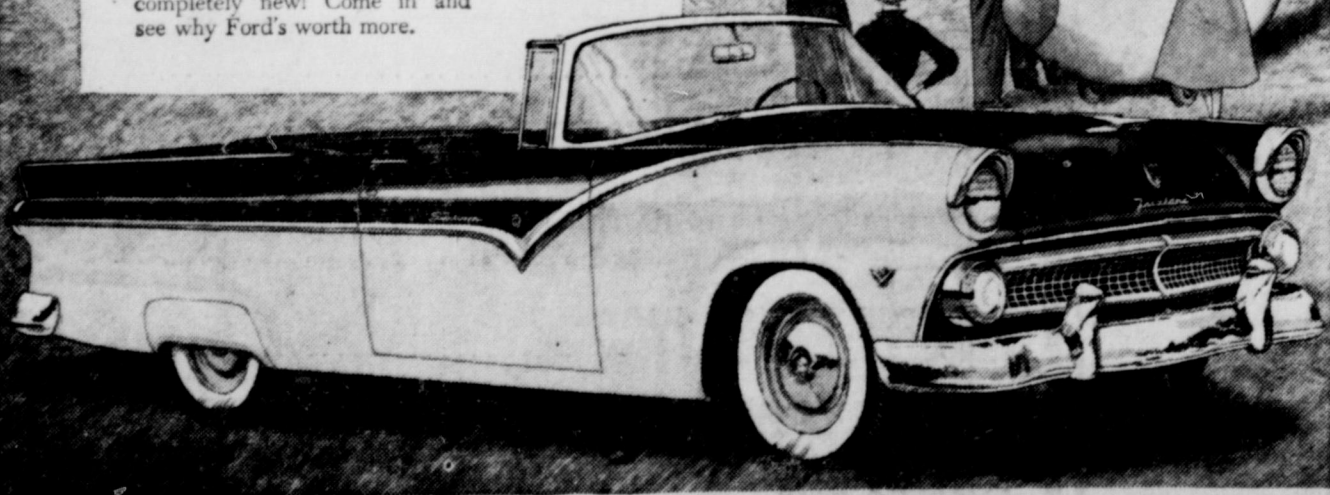

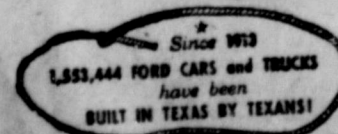
