

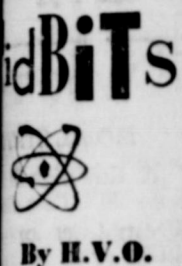

### 'BLANKET RAISE POSSIBLE'

## Sheriff's 1st Deputy Raised During Special Meet Friday

Eastland County Commission-  
ers hiked the pay of the first de-  
puty in the sheriff's department  
and tabled requests from three  
other county office holders dur-  
ing a special meeting Friday morn-  
ing.  
The commission unanimously in-  
creased the salary for the first  
deputy by \$60 a month. Deputy  
John Willingham has been draw-  
ing \$248 a month plus some ex-  
penses.  
Appearing before the commis-  
sioners court to talk salary in-  
creases for county employees were  
J. C. Allison, tax assessor-collector;  
Roy Lane, district clerk; and  
Johnson Smith, county clerk.  
The session Friday was inter-  
rupted when County Judge John  
Hart was called away to go to the  
hospital where his cousin was se-  
riously ill.  
The motion to increase the  
sheriff's deputy came before Judge  
Hart's leave-taking and the com-  
missioners moved in favor of post-  
poning any other business until

the judge could be present.  
During a regular session last  
Monday commissioners voted to  
reclassify two county employes as  
first deputies for pay purposes.  
Friday they made their resolu-  
tion for Willingham, Mrs. Laverne  
Key, secretary to District Attorney  
Earl Conner, and Mrs. Betty Wol-  
ford, secretary to Judge Hart, to  
be effective Oct. 1st.  
Smith appeared at the Monday  
meeting and requested that his  
first deputy, Mary Nicholas, be  
raised from \$248 to \$300 a month.  
He based his request on the fact  
that two deputies, Edgar Altom  
and Ott Herring, are receiving this  
amount in the county tax office,  
he said.  
Commissioner Carl Lamb was  
absent Monday and the other com-  
missioners decided to set the special  
meeting for Friday.  
Smith spoke first Friday by  
saying "You have my request."  
Judge Hart then asked Allison  
to take the floor. He said that  
he was first of all a spectator  
and that he was interested in  
an across-the-board raise for all  
employees.

## THOUSANDS THROG

# C. J. C. Blast R. J. C. 24-0 In Peanut Bowl Classic

## County Was 'Rip-less' For a Day and a Half

Things were not quite the  
same in the lobby of the Eastland  
County courthouse this week af-  
ter the mysterious disappearance  
of Old Rip.  
The famous Horned Toad which  
has brought reams of publicity to  
the City of Eastland in years  
past, was discovered missing from  
his tomb in the lobby Wednesday  
morning.  
The frog's absence stirred quite  
a bit of unrest among people in  
Eastland, and the empty remains  
of his tomb drew almost as much  
attention as did his entombed re-  
mains.  
The kidnapers of Old Rip left  
a ransom note asking for \$10,000  
in cash, and about noon Wednes-  
day a check drawn on the "Third  
National Bank of Kokomo" ap-  
peared on the tomb case.  
Later a live horned toad ap-  
peared inside the glass case  
where Rip's velvet-lined casket  
had rested.

A hastily-lettered sign appeared  
with the live frog suggesting that  
the frog was actually Old Rip  
brought back to life and vigor,  
thanks to a well-known patented  
medicine.  
Thursday morning a collection  
box appeared on the glass case  
and a sign asked for donation to  
raise the \$10,000 in cash.  
Someone apparently feared  
that the kidnapers meant business  
about cash and wouldn't take a  
check.  
The sign read "Donate to raise  
ransome money for Old Rip."

Old Rip, Eastland County's fa-  
vorite horned toad, is back in the  
courthouse where he belongs.  
He disappeared sometime late  
Tuesday night or Wednesday  
morning and was returned Thurs-  
day afternoon.  
Some cry hoax, and some have  
been brought before courts to an-  
swer to the deed.  
County Sheriff Lee Horn and a  
Telegram reporter went to the  
fourth floor of the Eastland Na-  
tional Bank Building after the  
sheriff had received an "anon-  
mous" telephone call.  
Room 400 is unused and except  
for stored building materials, is  
vacant. The casket with Rip inside  
was inside a brown paper bag on  
the floor. A note read "Too hot to  
handle. Rest in Peace." The note  
was inside the casket with the re-  
mains of Rip.  
The symbolic frog was in good  
condition and none-the-worse for  
his experience. He's proved that  
he's an attention-getter, second-to-  
none, alive or dead.

## Rena Mae Carr Is Injured In Milk Bottle Accident

Miss Rena Mae Carr, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Carr, suffered a severe cut on her left foot Friday evening as she attempted to lift empty milk bottles from the car when the bottles clashed together and one of the broken bottles fell on her foot.

Mrs. Dorothy Roberts, applied a tourniquet and the young girl was rushed to the Blackwell Hospital in Gorman. Five stitches were needed to close the wound.

### SCHOOL NURSE SAYS

## School Students in County Are Healthier Than Most

The health of the children in the Eastland County schools is "exceptional good," the County Nurse said this week.

Mrs. Tip Arther, who is the associate guardian of the health of almost 3,000 county school students, says that the average is far above normal.

As any book-keeping system does, which deals with long rolls of school students, Mrs. Arther's record are very unstable.

She had 2,665 students in her files recently, but this figure goes up and down, she says.

Take for instance, the children in the Rising Star and Gorman schools. They've all had two polio shots each and will get their third this school year, through the nurse's management.

All the schools in the county participate in the county program except the Cisco system which has its own school nurse program. The Cisco system qualifies for a nurse because it has the required number of teachers.

Mrs. Arther is in her fifth year as Eastland County's nurse. She first served during the 1950-51 school year, after which the program was dropped.

When H. E. Garrett was elected County School Superintendent in 1958, he re-instituted a nurse program and Mrs. Arther was called upon again to see after the health of the school children.

She gives eye examinations, dental checks and keeps records on each child's statistics—and this involves everything from weight to a shot record.

A graduate of St. Charles Hospital in Aurora, Ill., Mrs. Arther spent three years in the Army Nurses Corps before marrying and moving to Eastland County. She and her husband live on a farm near Morton Valley. He's County Commissioner, Precinct One.

The School Nurse is always a welcome visitor to each of the schools and estimates that she gets

to each one about "one and a half times a month."

One of her pet projects is the state's crippled children program which offers help in the form of specialists for those who need help, and the agency will care for a child up until they are 21 years old.

The county has about a dozen children who are receiving help from the agency, Mrs. Arther says.

Supt. Garrett said that the state authorizes \$3,100 a year for Mrs. Arther. She supposedly works nine months a year, but often gets called during the three summer months for special projects.

Her main problems, she says, are getting help for youngsters with unusual needs, and traveling to and from the various schools herself. It's a big county and she, of necessity, spends a lot of time on the road.

Healthy school children are an asset in anybody's book, and Mrs. Arther is a busy woman, helping keep Eastland County's that way.

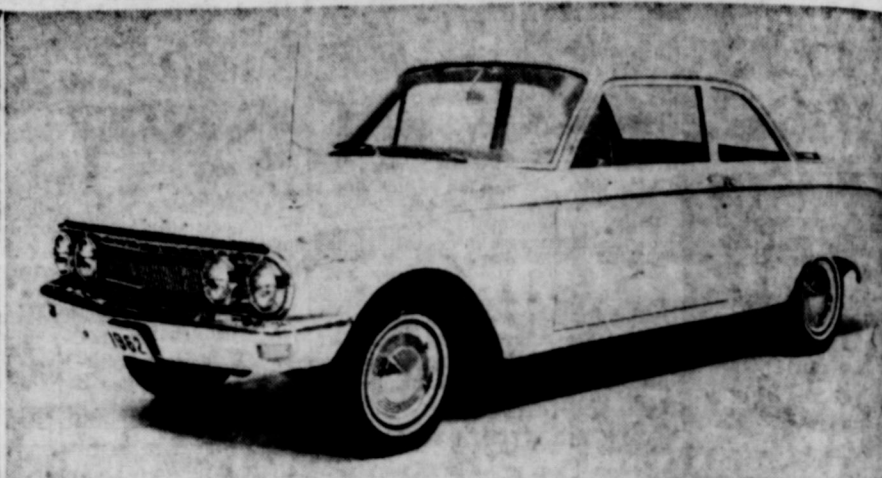
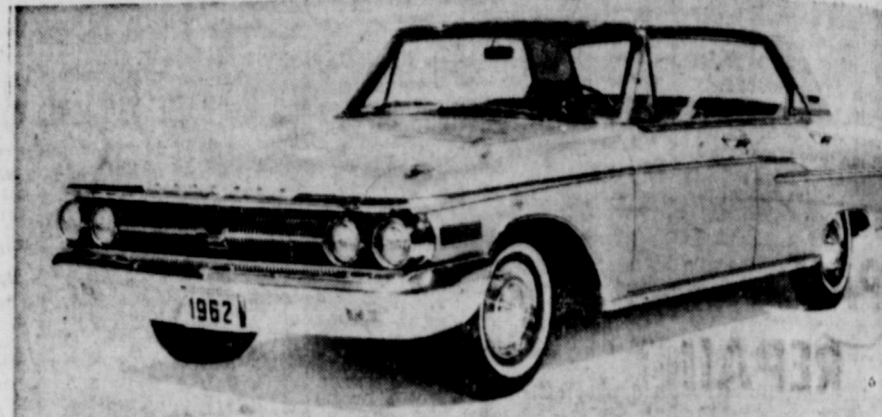

### Farmers May License Trailers For \$5 Fee

The last regular session of the Texas Legislature amended the Texas Motor Vehicle Registration Law to allow farmers to license their farm trailers and farm semi-trailers for a five dollar fee providing the gross weight is not less than 4,000 or more than 10,000 pounds.

Farm trailers weighing less than 4,000 pounds, gross weight, are still exempt from registration by statute. Those exceeding 10,000 pounds, gross weight, must register as a regular commercial trailer.

Capt. C. W. Bell, license and Weight Service of the Dept. of Public Safety, advised however that any vehicle bearing the five dollar plate must not:

- (1) exceed 30 MPH.
- (2) be operated for hire.
- (3) have steel or metal wheels in contact with the pavement and it must be equipped with an adequate hitch to remain secure to the towing vehicle and be operated and equipped in conformity with all other provisions of the law.

Violation of any of the above sections of the law nullifies the five dollar registration fees and penalties prescribed by law.

### Recent SS Change Important to Aged

"One recent change in the Social Security Act is important to all aged 62-72 persons who still have earnings," says R. R. Tuley, Jr., Manager of the Abilene social security office.

"This change concerns the 'earnings test' - the amount one may earn and still receive some payments," he said. "Earned income of \$1,200 or less in a year still has no effect on the benefits. Now, however, only \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 earned between \$1200 and \$1700 in a year.

"One dollar of family benefits is withheld for each dollar earned in excess of \$1700," he continued.

"This means that in some cases where a man and wife are both retirement age, he can earn as much as \$3,000 in a year and they can still receive some social security checks. With two or more eligible dependents in one work-

er's family, he might earn as \$4,000 and receive monthly payments for the year. No 'earnings test' is in effect after age 72."

Tuley believes that many more wage earners employed people between and 72 in this county will apply (as their friends and neighbors have done) for the to avoid any possible loss.

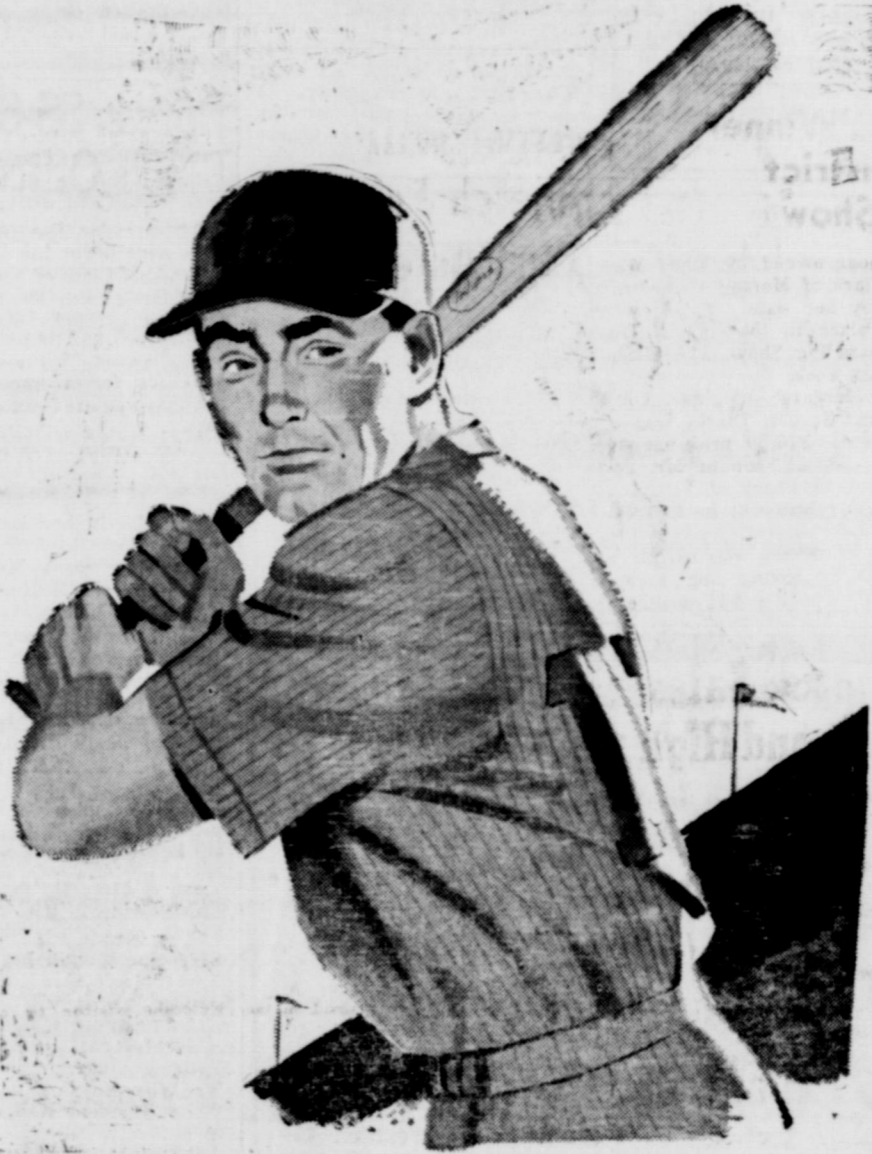

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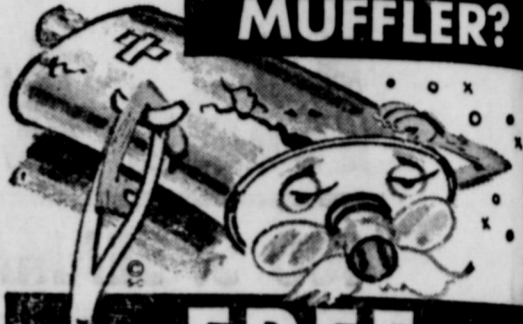
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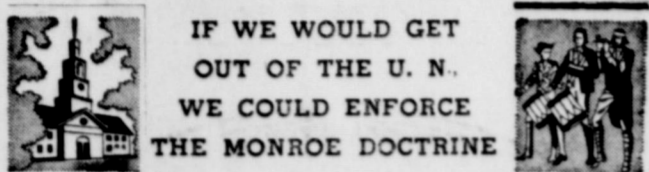
