### Chamber Dues Undergo Re-Evaluation for Year

New yardsticks were used to determine the amounts of dues for chamber of Commerce members in statements mailed this week.

A general re-evaluation of the dues structure was worked out using four general determinates.

A committee made up of members from the membership and finance committees did the re-evaluation.

Estimates are that the chamber's 1962 budget of \$9,000 can be raised from the present membership and 20 cent of the potential membership.

All firms were screened and measured against the norms from the smallest one-man concern to the largest utility.

The four points of consideration are gross income, investment, and evaluation of the benefits derived from the chamber and the number of employees.

The final analysis including the 20 cent of the potential members is as follows:

(The last figure is the number of businesses in the category)

Group 1—\$4.25 per month; 27;

Group 2—\$5.70 per month; 39;

Group 3—\$8.55 per month; 18;

Group 4—\$12.75 per month; 6;

and

Group 5—\$19.15 per month; 4.

The re-evaluation was based on recommendations by the United States Chamber of Commerce, with revisions tailored to a city of this size.

**OUR BIRTHRIGHT FOR A MESS OF POTAGE**

Clearly understood faith in the worth of the individual. We made him the responsible segment of our Republic, the prime source of authority, and this noble concept of man became the fountainhead of our American character. America became a kingdom of kings wherein the citizen is the real sovereign. The only sovereign.

With our entire way of life founded on this American concept of the individual, it is not difficult to understand why the moral decay of American character increases in direct proportion to the shifting of responsibilities from the citizen to the state. Indifference and apathy corrupt the very ideal of America as a society under God made workable by individuals who are responsible for this society's welfare, and whose national characteristics stem directly from this high trust of self-government.

Compare the twentieth Century American to his predecessor of 1776. By and large, he is characterized by swift flight from responsibility, looking more and more for government "bread and circuses." The society of sovereign individuals is today a society of passive conformists. This colossal economic waste and character-destroying cancer is laying the foundation for inevitable servitude. Government paternalism, welfare state of socialism, is the front entrance to Communism, totalitarianism or Fascism. It is certainly not Americanism. It is diametrically opposed to our concept of a free society.

This large-scale movement toward federal centralization is nothing less than a manifestation of civic indifference on the part of citizens. Perhaps modernization has made it easy for government to demand and get more of our private wealth, but at the bottom of the problem is the fact that we have willfully bartered our individuality and self-reliance for a false "security," for economic "protection" and free government handouts. The government upkeep for which we are responsible is a paltry sum compared to the atrocious waste and even unconstitutional spending which has resulted from our political apathy.

We are spending billions for defense, more than half of government income. Most of it is used to combat Communism and Communist aggression, to develop nuclear weapons, and to investigate subversive activities. But how much are we spending in defense of Uncle Sam to save the American character, without which our nation will plunge into an abyss 2,000 years deep—the same abyss into which Rome fell. Who will deny that a strong, loyal American character is a better defense against foreign ideologies than armament or Congressional committees?

To compromise ideas and methods is Democracy, but to compromise principles is nothing short of destruction. The omens of this destruction are everywhere in sight. Can we deny our guilt? Could any man of American conscience?

### TESCO To File Suits Against Major Firms

Texas Electric Service Company is preparing to file the first of several damage suits against manufacturers of electrical equipment who were found guilty last year of conspiring to fix prices in violation of anti-trust laws, Beeman Fisher, president and general manager of the company, said today.

The damage suits will cover purchases of electrical equipment in the period of 1948 to 1960, Fisher said. The amount of damages to be sought will be determined after studies of purchases and prices during the specified period have been completed.

The suits will be filed in Federal District Courts where the defendant companies maintain their headquarters. Approximately 200 electrical utility companies have filed similar anti-trust damage suits against manufacturers of electrical equipment, with nearly half of them filing the suits in New York.

In February, 1961, a Federal District Court in Philadelphia found guilty and fined a number of electrical equipment manufacturers who were involved in a conspiracy to fix prices in violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

**Five Fatalities Reported During Past Six Months**

Five fatalities were reported as a result of traffic accidents during the latter half of 1961 with none reported during the first six months, according to Department of Public Safety Sgt. J. O. Tanner.

Since July, 1961 a total of 83 traffic accidents have occurred with 48 injuries resulting.

**DENTON** — Jan. 12 is the deadline for submitting applications for National Teacher Examinations to be given at North Texas State University on Feb. 10.

Application blanks and bulletins of information about the exam may be obtained by writing to Dr. Edward C. Bonk, director of guidance at NTSU, or to the National Teacher Examinations, Educational Testing Service, Princeton, N.J.

Applications must be mailed so as to be received at the Princeton office no later than Jan. 12, 1962.

The tests are administered under a national program designed to provide an aid in evaluating qualifications of prospective teachers. At the one-day testing session each candidate takes the common exams, which include tests in professional information, general culture, English expression and nonverbal reasoning.

In addition, each candidate may take one or two optional examinations which are designed to demonstrate mastery of subject matter in the fields in which the candidate is prepared.

## Good Financial Records Help In Tax Return Work

Taxpayers who kept good financial records last year should have no trouble preparing their 1961 federal income tax return. Arthur E. Fogle, Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene, Texas office of Internal Revenue Service, stressed today.

Complete records are especially important, the IRS representative said, to taxpayers who elect to itemize deductions in filing. Accurate expense records are especially essential if a taxpayer's return is selected for audit. All records should be retained for as long as they may become material in the administration of an internal revenue law.

Another advantage, he declared, is that taxpayers with good records can complete and mail their federal tax returns as soon as they receive their W-2 withholding tax certificates, thus eliminating last-minute searches for such papers as the April 16 filing deadline draws near.

### House Brought Publicity To Land County In Oil Boom Days

Texans — particularly those who live in Eastland County — will remember Boyce 65-year-old humorist who was editor of the Lone Star newspaper in Fort Worth, as a man who turned a world-famous frog into a legend of the Lone Star.

an Arkansan by birth, he came to Eastland in July of 1910. He edited papers at Ran- gers and Cisco during the oil boom.

While editing the Eastland in 1928, he learned one of the live horned frogs had been placed in the courthouse lobby in 1897, and he sent a news dispatch.

Some weeks afterward, the building was torn down and the cornerstones were opened. The "Old Rip" the horned frog it was House who told about it.

As the approaching East- land today can see signs that the Eastland seat is the home of the horned frog. Old Rip's — the frog died of pneumonia a year after discovered — rest in a marble casket on a marble table in the courthouse lobby.

also reported the fa- Santa Claus Bank Rob-

bery" at Cisco on Dec. 23, 1927, which left two officers shot fatally and three robbers dead of gunshot, execution and lynching.

The journalist recalled to another newsmen several years ago that he followed the chase of the bandits throughout the county, admitting that "I tried not to get too close."

But he nearly got shot anyway when an eager lawman pulled a riot gun out of the car too fast. The shot peppered the oak leaves of a tree over House's head.

He is credited with some unusual firsts, including promoting the first night football game at Eastland in the 1920's with electric lights strung across the football field — a hazard for punters, but a pleasure to the viewers, it was reported.

The first of his more than a dozen books was "Were You in Ranger?" published in 1935. It told of experiences during the Ranger oil boom days, a boom which had faded before House came to Ranger. He followed that book with another in 1951 "Roaring Ranger," The World's Biggest Boom."

House also was chief drum beater for Cisco's "Big Dam Lobos" when that team and the Abilene Eagles were rivals.

Long after he left Eastland County to live in Fort Worth, House returned to Central West Texas on many occasions as a banquet speaker. — Abilene Reporter News.
