## Christian Church Finishes First Phase Of Expansion

Recently the church purchased a new parsonage at 610 S. Dixie, enabling them to use the old parsonage, located directly behind the sanctuary for badly needed class room space.

New doors were added to the building, some painting was done, and new equipment was purchased for the Primary and Willing Workers classrooms.

The work was under the direction of Jack Chamberlain who donated three weeks of labor to the project.

He personally did most of the work valued at about \$700.

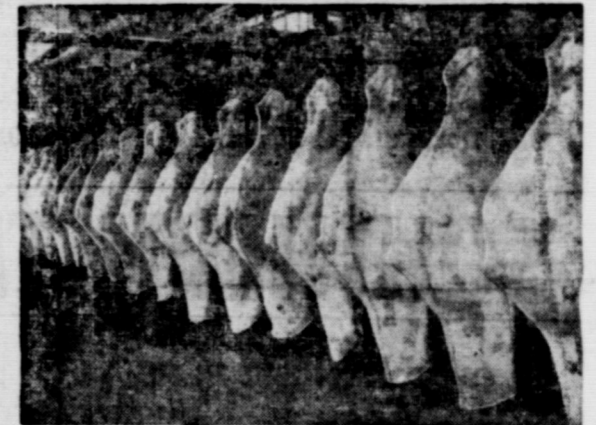

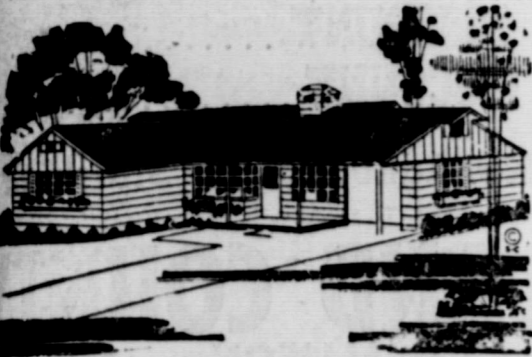

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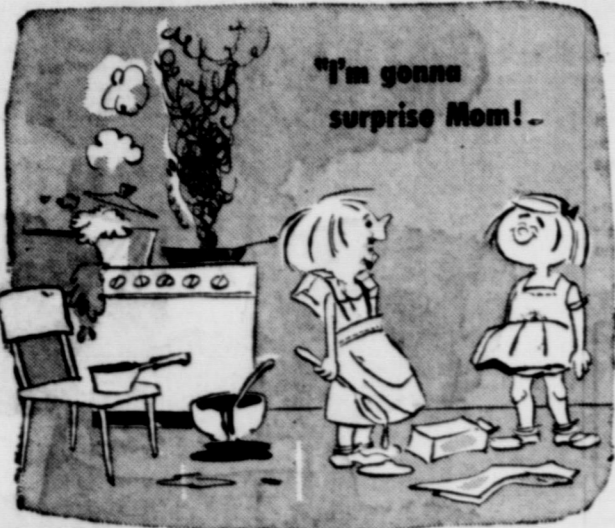
